CONCERNING RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 1, 2022, AS "BARNEY FORD DAY".

WHEREAS, The State of Colorado celebrates Black leaders and their accomplishments during Black History Month; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford was born enslaved 200 years ago in 1822, escaped at age 26, and wrote to his enslaver, "If I can do better by myself than I can with you, I feel that I am at liberty to do so; for this is common to all free men."; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford was one of the first 50 African Americans to arrive in Denver in 1860 and was soon called the "King of Restaurateurs"; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford suffered several significant business losses due to the Great Denver Fire, bankruptcy, and financial ruin, yet remained undeterred in his pursuits; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford was the first African American Coloradan to serve on a grand jury, and he was nominated to the territorial legislature in 1873; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford was one of the territory's Black leaders who petitioned for universal suffrage in the state constitution; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford impacted not just Colorado but the nation with his far-reaching influence and pioneering efforts for Black civil rights; and

WHEREAS, A stained glass portrait of Barney Ford hangs in the Colorado House of Representatives chambers in honor of his impact; and

WHEREAS, Barney Ford's legacy remains important today as Colorado citizens take stock of where racism persists, and his legacy gives visibility to the people and organizations creating change; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:


