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# DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS

#### DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs has approximately 5,500 Army and Air National Guard members trained and ready for federal active duty abroad and for preserving life and property during natural disasters and civil emergencies at home in Colorado.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S OFFICE**

- Provides general administrative support to Department divisions including: human resources, budgeting, accounting, and administrative support;
- Provides safekeeping of public arms, military records, and relics and banners of the State;
- Administers the National Guard Tuition Assistance Program; and
- The Adjutant General, as the commander of the State's military forces, provides day-to-day command and control, guidance, policies and procedures, administrative support, and logistics support to the Army National Guard, the Air National Guard, and the Civil Air Patrol.

#### **ARMY & AIR NATIONAL GUARD**

- Maintains a reserve of trained forces for the U.S. Armed Forces which are called to active duty by the President;
- Protects life and property during natural disasters and civil emergencies when activated by the Governor; and
- Maintains all military equipment for the State's military forces.

#### CIVIL AIR PATROL

- Operates as a civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force;
- Provides volunteers for search and rescue missions, and assists federal and state organizations in disaster or emergency efforts; and
- Operates a Civil Air Patrol cadet program, and provides aerospace education.

#### **DIVISION OF VETERANS AFFAIRS**

- Provides assistance to veterans seeking benefits by acting as a power of attorney for veterans and acting as a liaison between counties and the federal government;
- Provides training and payments to County Veterans Service Officers;
- Administers the Western Slope Veterans' Cemetery and its associated fund;
- Through the Colorado Board of Veterans Affairs, disperses the Colorado State Veterans Trust Fund to provide grants for veterans' programs throughout Colorado; and
- Operates the Veterans' One Stop Center (Western Region OneSource) in Grand Junction.

#### REQUEST/RECOMMENDATION DESCRIPTIONS

S1 CASH FUND RESTORATION: [LEGISLATION RECOMMENDED] The request is for a one-time \$4.9 million General Fund appropriation to restore funds that were transferred from the Real Estate Proceeds Cash Fund to the General Fund in FY 2020-21. During the COVID-19 pandemic, H.B. 20-1406 (Cash Funds Transfer to the General Fund) transferred these funds from the Department to augment state revenues. These cash funds were from the sale of real estate acquired for military purposes, and restoring them would allow the Department to move forward with its plans for two new readiness centers. Failure to restore these cash funds would put \$46.7 million in federal matching funds at risk. Because staff's recommendation is to restore these funds through JBC-sponsored legislation rather than through the Long Bill, the requested appropriation is not reflected in the table above. However, legislation will result in the same outcome for the Department while providing greater consistency and transparency with the original means of the cash funds transfer, which was legislation.

#### Does JBC staff believe the request meets the Joint Budget Committee's supplemental criteria?

YES

[An emergency or act of God; a technical error in calculating the original appropriation; data that was not available when the original appropriation was made; or an unforeseen contingency.]

**Explanation:** JBC staff and the Department agree that this request results from an unforeseen contingency. According to the Department, the opportunity to purchase land for two new readiness centers is a time-sensitive opportunity and dependent on federal matching funds, which is contingent upon the approval of the restoration of funds swept from the Real Estate Proceeds Cash Fund in FY 2020-21.

DEPARTMENT REQUEST: The Department requests a one-time \$4.9 million General Fund transfer to restore funds that were transferred from the Real Estate Proceeds Cash Fund to the General Fund in FY 2020-21. During the COVID-19 pandemic, H.B. 20-1406 (Cash Funds Transfer to the General Fund) transferred funds from the Department to augment state revenues. These cash funds were from the sale of real estate acquired for military purposes. According to the Department, restoration of these cash funds would allow the Department to move forward with its plans to acquire new land and modernize its readiness centers. Failure to restore these cash funds would put over \$46 million in federal matching funds at risk. This supplemental request amends the Department's FY 2023-24 R1 Cash Fund Restoration request, making the transfer effective in FY 2022-23 rather than FY 2023-24.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends approving the request. However, staff recommends restoring the cash fund through JBC-sponsored legislation rather than through a Long Bill appropriation.

STAFF ANALYSIS: House Bill 20-1406 (Cash Funds Transfer to the General Fund) transferred \$42.5 million from 25 cash funds to the General Fund, including \$4.9 million from the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs' Real Estate Proceeds Cash Fund. This transfer was done in response to a significant projected decline in General Fund revenue during the COVID-19 pandemic. This supplemental request amends the Department's FY 2023-24 R1 Cash Fund Restoration request, making the transfer effective in FY 2022-23 rather than FY 2023-24.

The Department requests these funds to support two capital construction projects related to upgrading aging and inadequate facilities. The two capital construction projects specified by the Department are:

Land acquisition in support of a new Field Artillery Readiness Center – currently the 3-157<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Battalion is located at the Longmont Readiness Center, a facility constructed in 1954 that is now outdated, undersized, and lacks sufficient facilities, including parking, force

protection, storage, and maintenance bays. Additionally, there have been numerous documented safety issues with the Longmont Readiness Center. The new readiness center would replace this obsolete readiness center and free up space at the Aurora readiness center.

2 Land acquisition in Pueblo West to consolidate the Rocky Ford Field Maintenance Shop and the Pueblo readiness center - the existing Pueblo readiness center was built in 1961 on five acres of land near the State Fairgrounds, with no room to expand and no longer sufficiently scaled to accommodate the military vehicles of the Forward Support Company. Currently, maintenance for military vehicles assigned to the Pueblo readiness center is performed at the Rocky Ford Field Maintenance Shop, 54 miles away, resulting in substantial inefficiencies and reduced readiness. The cash fund restoration is pivotal to acquiring the Pueblo West land for the readiness center. Failure to acquire this land would result in the loss of \$46.75 million in federal matching funds.

Additional information relevant to this request will be conferred during Andrea Uhl's presentation concerning Capital Construction supplemental requests. The following table lists all of the cash fund transfers included in H.B. 20-1406, and identifies the two transfers that have been reversed or partially reversed to date.
