	CONCERNING THE NECESSITY FOR CONGRESS TO STREAMLINE THE	
	WATER PROJECT PERMITTING PROCESS.	
	WHEREAS, The Colorado Water Plan has identified a gap	
	between water supply and demand of over 550,000 acre-feet by 2050; and	
	WHEREAS, The plan further identifies projects and processes	
	intended to reduce this gap by providing an additional 400,000 acre-feet	
	of storage by 2050; and	
	WHEREAS, Meeting the goal of an additional 400,000 acre-feet	
	of storage requires an 80% completion rate of the identified projects and	
	processes; and	
	WHEREAS, Many of these projects, as well as other water supply

3 4 5 6 7 8 9	WHEREAS, The following costs and delays jeopardize Colorado's ability to close the water supply gap: Windy Gap Firming Project: 12 ½ years and \$14 million; Northern Integrated Storage Project: 13 years and \$18 million; Chatfield Reallocation Project: 15 years and \$10 million; Gross Reservoir Enlargement: 13 years and \$20 million; Long Hollow Reservoir: 19 years and \$1.9 million; LEDE Reservoir Expansion: 8 years and \$300,000; and
11 12	WHEREAS, These permit time frames and costs are unacceptable, unnecessary, and unaffordable for Colorado communities; and
13 14 15	WHEREAS, The Colorado Water Plan advocates for effective and efficient permitting in which Colorado state agencies work together to complete their work early in the permitting process; and
16 17 18 19	WHEREAS, Federal review of proposed state water projects involves environmental review procedures that are conducted consecutively rather than in an efficient, concurrent manner, which adds significantly to the permit review time; and
20 21 22 23	WHEREAS, The state of Colorado is participating in a LEAN process with federal agencies that will result in the recommendation of several action items intended to streamline the permitting process so that it concludes within 90 days; now, therefore,
24 25	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventieth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
26 27 28 29 30	That Colorado's congressional delegation is urged to encourage the federal agencies to stay engaged in the LEAN process and support streamlining recommendations that cut waste, avoid duplication, provide greater coordination with the state, and ultimately reduce the cost and time of the water project permitting process.
31 32 33	Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this joint resolution be provided to each member of Colorado's congressional delegation and Governor John Hickenlooper.
