## **HOUSE RESOLUTION 16-1007**

101 CONCERNING EXPANSION OF THE PINON CANYON MANEUVER SITE.

- WHEREAS, The Pinon Canyon maneuver site, located on over
   two hundred thirty-five thousand acres in southeastern Colorado, opened
   in 1985, and, combined with Fort Carson's training areas, is the second
   largest department of defense maneuver training site in the nation for
   soldiers from Fort Carson and other military bases; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The area that makes up the Pinon Canyon maneuver 7 site is home to a diverse ecosystem of big and small game, fisheries, and 8 non-game wildlife, and also boasts displays of forest, rangeland, and 9 mineral resources; and
- WHEREAS, The Pinon Canyon maneuver site also provides demonstrable evidence of almost four thousand years of human history, and several hundred properties on the site are eligible for designation on the national register of historic places, including ninety-eight archeological sites; and
- WHEREAS, Prior to the creation of the Pinon Canyon maneuversite, the land area was lightly populated and devoted almost exclusively

- 1 to ranching and livestock grazing, sometimes by families that had owned
- 2 their land within the site area for generations; and
- WHEREAS, Purchase of the land that became the Pinon Canyon maneuver site was completed in 1983 and approximately half of the land area that became the site was acquired by the department of the Army by condemnation as many landowners were unwilling sellers; and
- WHEREAS, The optimal way to ensure that the magnificent and
  rare natural and human treasures of the Pinon Canyon maneuver site are
  preserved for future generations would be to require the United States
  Army to complete an environmental impact assessment for expansion of
  the maneuver site area and for Congress to pass laws to pay landowners
  the full measure of the compensation they are owed for these lands; and
- WHEREAS, Senator Cory Gardner, when he was a Congressman
  in the United States House of Representatives, offered an amendment to
  the "National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013" that
  would have required this assessment by the United States Army and
  subsequent vote by Congress; and
- WHEREAS, Section 8 (17) of article I of the United States Constitution allows the state legislatures to withdraw consent by a state to the exercise by the federal government of exclusive jurisdiction over particular land and the state of Colorado has not given its consent to the acquisition of, or exclusive jurisdiction over, land sought by the United States department of defense for purposes associated with the expansion of the Pinon Canyon maneuver site; now, therefore,
- Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventieth
  General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
- (1) That any plans that the federal government may have for the
  expansion of the Pinon Canyon maneuver site should allow for and
  incorporate community input; and
- 30 (2) It is important for Congress to remember that the state of
  31 Colorado retains sovereignty over any decisions made regarding land
  32 within its territorial boundaries and that the Colorado General Assembly,
  33 per section 8 (17) of article I of the United States Constitution, must give
  34 its consent to any expansion of the Pinon Canyon maneuver site by the
  35 federal government.
