Summary of Legislation

This bill, **recommended by the Joint Budget Committee**, modifies the manner in which fiscal notes and appropriations that affect the Department of Corrections (DOC) are made. Specifically, the bill requires that parole cost estimates be included and directs the DOC and Division of Criminal Justice (DCJ) within the Department of Public Safety to provide assistance to Legislative Council Staff in calculating these increases.

It also makes technical clarifications that for purposes of appropriations, state correctional facilities include any facility under the supervision of the DOC that is operated by a county, city and county, or private corporation; and that five-year appropriations clauses are required only for the DOC.

State Expenditures

Beginning in FY 2016-17, the bill increases workload for Legislative Council Staff and the Departments of Corrections and Public Safety. This analysis assumes that the DCJ, in cooperation with the DOC, will provide incarceration and parole length of stay data to Legislative Council Staff on an annual basis and that Legislative Council Staff will use this information to calculate increased parole costs in each fiscal note using data from the Long Bill.

The fiscal note assumes that the annual workload increase for each department is equivalent to less than 0.1 FTE, and therefore, no change in appropriations is required for any state agency.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on March 23, 2016, and takes effect August 10, 2016, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
