Summary of Legislation

The *reengrossed* bill requires the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) to keep all personal identifying information related to blood alcohol content (BAC) test results confidential. The test results that CDPHE stores in their database may only be released to the individual who is the subject of the test, his or her attorney, a named party in a civil or criminal case to which the test results are directly related, or a prosecuting attorney, law enforcement officer, state agency, or state and local public official legally authorized to use such information to carry out his or her duties. CDPHE may release non-personal identifying information from the database.

State Revenue

This bill reduces state cash fund revenue in the CDPHE by a minimal amount. CDPHE may charge an individual for the actual costs associated with a records request, including for BAC test records. Under the bill, these records would be confidential and CDPHE would deny these requests. As a result, the CDPHE may experience a reduction in revenue. Any decrease in revenue is expected to be minimal.

TABOR Impact

This bill reduces state cash fund revenue from fees, which reduces the amount required to be refunded under TABOR. TABOR refunds are paid out of the General Fund.

State Expenditures

This bill reduces workload for CDPHE and the Department of Law. Currently, whenever someone other than the parties named above request an individual's records, the CDPHE must file paperwork with the Attorney General's Office in the Department of Law in order to deny the request for confidentiality reasons. Under the bill, CDPHE will be able to deny these requests outright. The change in workload for both agencies is expected to be minimal and requires no change in appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect August 10, 2016, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 11, 2016, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.
