A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING THE USE OF UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS TO PERFORM
102	GOVERNMENT FUNCTIONS RELATING TO FIREFIGHTING, AND, IN
103	CONNECTION THEREWITH, REQUIRING THE CENTER OF
104	EXCELLENCE WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO
105	PERFORM A STUDY AND OPERATE A PILOT PROGRAM.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov/.)

The bill requires the center of excellence (center) within the division of fire prevention and control within the department of public safety (department) to conduct a study concerning the integration of unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) within state and local government operations that relate to public safety. At a minimum, the study must:

- Identify the most feasible and readily available ways to integrate UAS technology within local and state government functions relating to public safety; and
- İ. Include consideration of privacy concerns, costs, and timeliness of deployment.

The bill also creates an UAS pilot program (pilot program) to integrate UAS within state and local government operations that relate to public safety. The bill requires the center to operate the pilot program. The division of employment and training within the department of labor and employment may provide resources for training and development of eligible candidates of the pilot program.

On or before September 1, 2018, the center shall submit a report to the wildfire matters review committee and to the judiciary committees of the house of representatives and senate, or to any successor committees. The report must address each item of the center's study, as well as the results of the pilot program.

- 1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
- 2

SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly

- 3 hereby finds that:
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(a) In response to recent devastating fires and floods and the 5 significant expenditures associated with them, the general assembly has 6 substantial investments in firefighting and other made 7 emergency-response technology;

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Although emergency-response operations are steadily (b) 9 improving, newer technologies, including unmanned aircraft systems 10 (UAS), are becoming available to further decrease response times and 11 save lives and property from future catastrophic disasters;

- 12 (c) Last year, the United States Congress enacted the "Federal 13 Aviation Administration Extension, Safety, and Security Act of 2016",
- 14 H.R. 636, section 2204 of which requires the administrator of the federal

aviation administration to enter into agreements with other federal
 agencies to "continue the expeditious authorization of safe unmanned
 aircraft system operations in support of firefighting operations"; and

- 4 (d) A memorandum from President Barack Obama, dated 5 February 15, 2015, and entitled "Promoting Economic Competitiveness 6 While Safeguarding Privacy, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties in 7 Domestic Use of Unmanned Aircraft Systems", stated that "UAS 8 technology continues to improve rapidly, and increasingly UAS are able 9 to perform a variety of missions with greater operational flexibility and 10 at a lower cost than comparable manned aircraft. A wide spectrum of 11 domestic users...are using or expect to use these systems, which may play 12 a transformative role in fields as diverse as urban infrastructure 13 management, farming, public safety, coastal security, military training, 14 search and rescue, and disaster response".

(2) The general assembly further finds that:

- 16 (a) The use of UAS by public safety organizations will create
 17 opportunities and jobs;
- (b) The state should support the integration of UAS as a matter of
 economic development to develop the workforce, especially in rural areas
 where disasters sometimes occur;
- (c) Persons who will find work as UAS operators need
 specialized, portable skills that involve public safety objectives as well as
 technical, operational concerns; and
- (d) The promotion of UAS by the general assembly is consistent
 with the objectives of the "Colorado Career Advancement Act", part 2 of
 article 83 of title 8, Colorado Revised Statutes, and the work force
 development program set forth therein.

(3) Now, therefore, the general assembly declares that this act is
 intended to help make Colorado the nation's center of expertise for the
 integration of UAS into firefighting and other emergency operations,
 building on the progress already made by the center of excellence for
 advanced technology aerial firefighting within the department of public
 safety.

7 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-1228,
8 amend (3); and add (2.5)(c) and (2)(d) as follows:

9 24-33.5-1228. Colorado firefighting air corps - creation -10 powers - aircraft acquisitions required - center of excellence -11 unmanned aircraft systems study and pilot program - Colorado 12 firefighting air corps fund - creation - report - rules. (2.5) (c) (I) IN 13 ADDITION TO PERFORMING THE FUNCTIONS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION 14 (2.5)(b) OF THIS SECTION, UPON RECEIVING SUFFICIENT MONEY IN THE 15 FORM OF GIFTS, GRANTS, AND DONATIONS, THE CENTER OF EXCELLENCE 16 SHALL CONDUCT A STUDY CONCERNING THE INTEGRATION OF UNMANNED 17 AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS WITHIN STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS 18 THAT RELATE TO FIREFIGHTING. AT A MINIMUM, THE STUDY MUST:

19 (A) IDENTIFY THE MOST FEASIBLE AND READILY AVAILABLE WAYS
20 TO INTEGRATE UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS TECHNOLOGY WITHIN
21 LOCAL AND STATE GOVERNMENT FUNCTIONS RELATING TO FIREFIGHTING,
22 INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO SEARCH AND RESCUE, ACCIDENT
23 RECONSTRUCTION, EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, AND TACTICAL
24 OPERATIONS; AND

(B) FOR EACH APPLICATION OF UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS
THAT THE CENTER OF EXCELLENCE IDENTIFIES PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION
(2.5)(c)(I)(A) OF THIS SECTION, INCLUDE CONSIDERATION OF PRIVACY

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1 CONCERNS, COSTS, AND TIMELINESS OF DEPLOYMENT.

2 (II) NOT LATER THAN ONE MONTH AFTER COMPLETING THE STUDY 3 DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (2.5)(c)(I) OF THIS SECTION, THE CENTER OF 4 EXCELLENCE SHALL SUBMIT A REPORT DESCRIBING THE RESULTS OF ITS 5 STUDY TO THE WILDFIRE MATTERS REVIEW COMMITTEE CREATED IN 6 SECTION 2-3-1602 AND THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEES OF THE HOUSE OF 7 REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATE, OR TO ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES. THE 8 REPORT MUST ADDRESS EACH ITEM DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (2.5)(c)(I)9 OF THIS SECTION, AS WELL AS THE RESULTS OF THE UNMANNED AIRCRAFT 10 SYSTEM PILOT PROGRAM DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (2.5)(d) OF THIS 11 SECTION.

12 (d) (I) AS PART OF THE STUDY DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION 13 (2.5)(c)(I) OF THIS SECTION, UPON RECEIVING SUFFICIENT MONEY IN THE 14 FORM OF GIFTS, GRANTS, AND DONATIONS, ON AND AFTER THE EFFECTIVE 15 DATE OF THIS SECTION, THE CENTER OF EXCELLENCE SHALL OPERATE AN 16 UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM PILOT PROGRAM, REFERRED TO WITHIN THIS 17 SECTION AS THE "PILOT PROGRAM", TO INTEGRATE UNMANNED AIRCRAFT 18 SYSTEMS WITHIN STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS THAT 19 RELATE TO FIREFIGHTING.

20 (II) AS PART OF THE PILOT PROGRAM, THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC 21 SAFETY SHALL DEPLOY AT LEAST ONE TEAM OF UNMANNED AIRCRAFT 22 SYSTEM OPERATORS TO A REGION WITHIN THE STATE THAT HAS BEEN 23 DESIGNATED BY THE DIVISION AS A FIRE HAZARD. THE PILOT PROGRAM 24 MUST TRAIN THE UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM OPERATORS TO OPERATE 25 UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS IN VARIOUS CONTEXTS RELATING TO 26 FIREFIGHTING, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO SEARCH AND RESCUE, 27 ACCIDENT RECONSTRUCTION, EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, AND TACTICAL

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OPERATIONS. UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM OPERATORS MAY BE
 COMPENSATED BY THE CENTER DURING THEIR TRAINING.

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4 (3) (a) The division shall administer the Colorado firefighting air 5 corps fund, which fund is hereby created in the state treasury. The 6 division is authorized to MAY seek and accept gifts, grants, 7 reimbursements, investments, bond revenues, sales proceeds. 8 commissions for services, sponsorships, advertising fees, licensing fees, 9 profits, or donations from private or public sources for the purposes of 10 this section. The fund consists of all moneys MONEY that may be 11 appropriated to the fund by the general assembly, and all private and 12 public funds received through gifts, grants, reimbursements, investments, 13 bond revenues, sales proceeds, commissions for services, sponsorships, advertising fees, licensing fees, profits, or donations that are transmitted 14 15 to the state treasurer and credited to the fund. All interest earned from the 16 investment of moneys MONEY in the fund are IS credited to the fund. The 17 moneys MONEY in the fund are hereby IS continuously appropriated for 18 the purposes indicated in paragraph (c) of this subsection (3) SUBSECTION 19 (3)(c) OF THIS SECTION. Any moneys MONEY not expended at the end of 20 the fiscal year remain REMAINS in the fund.

(b) The general assembly finds that the implementation of this
section does not rely entirely or in any part on the receipt of adequate
funding through gifts, grants, or donations. Therefore, the division is not
subject to the notice requirements specified in section 24-75-1303 (3).

(c) The division shall use the moneys MONEY in the Colorado
 firefighting air corps fund for the PURPOSES OF SUBSECTION (2.5) OF THIS
 SECTION AND FOR PAYING THE direct and indirect costs of maintaining the

Colorado firefighting air corps, including expenses associated with
 acquisition, retrofitting, labor, equipment, supply, transportation, air,
 mobilization, repair, maintenance, and demobilization.

4 SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
5 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
6 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
