The bill makes appropriations for matters related to the legislative department for the 2017-18 state fiscal year. The bill makes an appropriation to the youth advisory council cash fund.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

1 **SECTION 1. Appropriation.** (1) For the 2017-18 state fiscal
2 year, \$43,570,138 is appropriated to the legislative department. This
3 appropriation consists of \$42,553,138 from the general fund, \$90,000
4 from cash funds, and \$927,000 from reappropriated funds. The legislative
5 department may use this appropriation as follows:

6 (a) \$14,267,528 for use by the general assembly, which amount:

7 (I) Consists of \$14,177,528 from the general fund and \$90,000
8 from cash funds generated from the sale of bill boxes, legislative
9 directories, and publications and other services provided by the print
10 shop; and

11 (II) Is based on the assumption that the general assembly will have
12 66.0 FTE;

13 (b) \$9,468,234 for use by the office of the state auditor, which
14 amount:

15 (I) Consists of \$8,541,234 from the general fund and \$927,000
16 from reappropriated funds received from various departments for audits;
17 and

18 (II) Is based on the assumption that the office of the state auditor
19 will have 75.2 FTE;

20 (c) \$1,793,686 for use by the joint budget committee, which
21 amount is:

22 (I) From the general fund; and

23 (II) Based on the assumption that the joint budget committee will
24 have 16.0 FTE;

25 (d) \$8,862,899 for use by the legislative council, which amount
26 is:

27 (I) From the general fund; and

1 (II) Based on the assumption that the legislative council will have
2 75.3 FTE;

3 (e) \$6,507,697 for use by the committee on legal services, which
4 amount is:

5 (I) From the general fund; and

6 (II) Based on the assumption that the committee on legal services
7 will have 54.4 FTE;

8 (f) \$1,335,047 from the general fund for the PERA Amortization
9 Equalization Disbursement; and

10 (g) \$1,335,047 from the general fund for the PERA Supplemental
11 Amortization Equalization Disbursement.

12 (2) The general assembly anticipates that, during the 2017-18 state
13 fiscal year, the tax levy on civil actions provided for in section 2-5-119,
14 C.R.S., will return approximately \$197,000 to the general fund to offset
15 expenses of the revision of statutes by the office of legislative legal
16 services. This figure is included for informational purposes only.

17 **SECTION 2. Appropriation.** For the 2017-18 state fiscal year,
18 \$25,000 is appropriated to the youth advisory council cash fund created
19 in section 2-2-1306, C.R.S. This appropriation is from the general fund.
20 The legislative department is responsible for the accounting related to this
21 appropriation.

22 **SECTION 3. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,
23 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
24 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
