BILL TOPIC: STUDENT EXEMPTION FROM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

NOTE: This bill was not enacted into law; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.

Summary of Legislation

Under current law, a student may be exempted from the immunization requirements for school attendance under either a medical or personal belief exemption. This bill specifies that a certification of a medical exemption submitted by a physician or advanced practice nurse or a statement of a personal belief exemption submitted by a parent, guardian, or emancipated student can be in letter form and that a form furnished by the Department of Public Health and Environment or the State Board of Health is not required. Correspondingly, the bill clarifies the rulemaking authority of the State Board of Health concerning the frequency that exemptions are submitted, rather than the frequency that exemption forms are submitted.

State Expenditures

The bill will increase workload in the Department of Public Health and Environment by a minimal amount in FY 2017-18 only to update the existing forms and immunization information on its website to reflect the changes under the bill. No change in appropriations is required to accomplish this work.

School District Impact

The bill will increase workload for schools and school districts by a minimal amount to train staff on the allowable ways that immunization exemptions may be submitted. Further, compiling data and tracking immunization statistics may take additional staff time when a variety of letter and certification formats are submitted compared with a standardized form developed by the state. These school district impacts are assumed to be minimal.

Effective Date

The bill was lost on second reading in the Senate on April 19, 2017.
