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**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 18-1008**

101     **CONCERNING RECOGNIZING THE POSITIVE IMPACTS OF ADAPTIVE**  
102             **SPORTS PROGRAMS ON VETERANS IN COLORADO.**

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1             WHEREAS, Approximately 1,330,645 service members have been  
2     wounded in our nation's conflicts since World War I; and

3             WHEREAS, The brave men and women who serve our country  
4     through the military often place their lives at great risk to ensure our  
5     continued freedom as United States citizens; and

6             WHEREAS, Sadly, some of these brave service members of the  
7     United States armed forces are permanently injured while in service and  
8     must undergo extensive rehabilitation in order to rebuild their lives,  
9     regain independence, and maximize their quality of life; and

1           WHEREAS, More than 1.1 million veterans live with a  
2 service-connected disability in the United States, with more than 76,000  
3 of those veterans residing here in Colorado; and

4           WHEREAS, More than 56.7 million individuals in the United  
5 States live with a disability, with more than 458,800 of those individuals  
6 residing in Colorado; and

7           WHEREAS, Recreational therapy and adaptive sports have been  
8 proven to improve physical and mental health, increase independence,  
9 and combat dependence on opioids, antidepressants, sleeping aids, and  
10 many forms of self-medication; and

11           WHEREAS, The diverse and awe-inspiring geography of  
12 Colorado allows for varied and unique opportunities for recreational  
13 therapy and adaptive sports, including but not limited to camping, outdoor  
14 climbing, wheelchair rugby, alpine skiing, wheelchair lacrosse, fishing,  
15 mountain biking, cross-country skiing, horseback riding, wheelchair  
16 basketball, hunting, and road biking; and

17           WHEREAS, The efforts to adapt athletic and recreational activities  
18 to those living with disabilities have led to the innovation, creation, and  
19 production of adaptive sports equipment, much of that equipment  
20 produced by leaders in the industry who are based here in Colorado; and

21           WHEREAS, Many organizations contribute to the adaptive sports  
22 programs for the state, including A1 Scuba in partnership with WAVES  
23 Project; Adaptive Adventures; Adaptive Sports Association Durango;  
24 Adaptive Sports Center Crested Butte; Breckenridge Outdoor Education  
25 Center; Challenge Aspen Military Opportunities; Colorado Adaptive  
26 Sports Foundation; Disabled Sports USA; Foresight Ski Guides;  
27 Harlequin Wheel Chair Rugby; Ignite Adaptive Sports; National Sports  
28 Center for the Disabled; Paradox Sports; Project Healing Waters; Rolling  
29 Mammoth Wheel Chair Lacrosse; Ski for Light; Sled Hockey; Steamboat  
30 Adaptive Recreational Sports; Team Semper Fi & Team America's Fund;  
31 Telluride Adaptive Sports Program; Vail Veterans Program; and  
32 Wilderness on Wheels.

33           WHEREAS, Adaptive sports programs in Colorado facilitate more  
34 than 1,173 veteran-specific camps or events, serving more than 1,311  
35 disabled veterans and 11,764 in the disabled community at large; and

1           WHEREAS, Adaptive sports programs utilize the good will  
2 abundant in Colorado's citizens and create the opportunity for more than  
3 2,760 volunteers to serve nearly 103,991 hours annually; and

4           WHEREAS, While the positive social contributions of adaptive  
5 sports programs are apparent, these organizations are also an economic  
6 factor in the state of Colorado, with their combined annual budgets  
7 totaling more than \$11.9 million; now, therefore,

8           *Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-first*  
9 *General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:*

10           That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly:

11           (1) Recognize the positive social and economic impact that  
12 adaptive sports programs have in the state of Colorado;

13           (2) Commend the honorable work that adaptive sports programs  
14 do in the service of our disabled veterans and the disabled community at  
15 large; and

16           (3) Encourage our fellow Coloradans to support the work and  
17 foster the continued growth of adaptive sports programs in the Centennial  
18 State.
