Summary of Legislation

The Department of Revenue, which contains the state's Division of Motor Vehicles, currently promulgates rules related to the licensing of commercial drivers. This bill requires the department to promulgate rules requiring commercial driver schools to include training on the recognition, prevention, and reporting of human trafficking. The department must collaborate with organizations that specialize in the recognition and prevention of human trafficking and other state agencies when promulgating these rules. The department must also publish information about human trafficking in a manner that is likely to be read by licensed commercial drivers or people training to obtain such licenses.

Background

The Driver Testing and Education Unit in the Driver License Section of the Division of Motor Vehicles is responsible for the oversight of the testing performed by third-party testing organizations. The training and education performed by these third-party organizations is overseen by the Division of Private Occupational Schools in the Department of Higher Education.

Truckers Against Trafficking currently publishes a notice regarding human trafficking in the state's Commercial Driver License Manual.

State Expenditures

In FY 2018-19 only, the Department of Revenue will be required to conduct rulemaking and to publish information related to the prevention of human trafficking. Rulemaking and a new publication of the commercial driver licensing manual occur regularly each year, so this workload can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect August 8, 2018, if the General Assembly adjourns on May 9, 2018, as scheduled, and no referendum petition is filed.
