Bill Topic: USE OF COLORADO PRESCHOOL PROGRAM POSITIONS

This bill requires candidates for a school district's existing full day kindergarten program to satisfy certain eligibility requirements. It may change how school districts spend funds, but not the total amount of funding available. This impact continues in future years.

Appropriation Summary: No appropriation required.

Fiscal Note Status: This bill reflects the enacted bill.

Summary of Legislation

Under this bill, a child must satisfy certain eligibility requirements for a district to use funding under the Colorado Preschool Program (CPP) to enroll that child in the district's existing full day kindergarten program.

Background

According to the 2018 Colorado Preschool Program Legislative Report, the CPP provides funding for 26,308 students in 175 school districts. The preschool programs are administered on-site by school districts, and by community and head start agencies. ECARE expanded the CPP, allowing school districts to use two preschool program positions to enroll students into a full-day preschool program or a full day of the district's existing full-day kindergarten program.

School District Impact

The new CPP criteria may shift how school district funds are allocated between kindergarten and preschool slots under the CPP. However, it will not affect total funding to school districts and decisions on how ECARE slots are used will be made at the local level.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on April 9, 2018, and takes effect August 8, 2018, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
