**Opioid and Other Substance Use Disorders Study Committee.**

The bill:

- ! Expands the housing voucher program currently within the department of local affairs to include individuals with a substance use disorder and appropriates \$4.3 million each of the next 5 fiscal years to support the program (**section 1**);
- ! Requires each recovery residence operating in Colorado to be licensed by the department of public health and environment (**section 2**); and
- ! Creates the opioid crisis recovery fund for money the state receives as settlement or damage awards resulting from opioid-related litigation (**section 3**).

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-32-721, **amend**  
3 **(3)(b) and (4)(b); and add (4)(e) and (4)(f) as follows:**

4 **24-32-721. Colorado affordable housing construction grants**  
5 **and loans - housing development grant fund - creation - housing**  
6 **assistance for a person with a behavioral, mental health, or substance**  
7 **use disorder - cash fund - appropriation - report to general assembly**  
8 **- definition.** (3) (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section,  
9 the division, in its discretion, may transfer twenty percent of the balance  
10 of ~~moneys~~ THE MONEY in the fund into the housing investment trust fund  
11 established in section 24-32-717 (1)(a), which balance is calculated as of  
12 July 1 of the state fiscal year in which the money is transferred. For any  
13 given state fiscal year, no more than three percent of the ~~moneys~~ MONEY  
14 appropriated ~~from~~ TO the fund may be expended for the administrative  
15 costs of the division in administering the fund.

1 (4) (b) In conjunction with its other programs to provide  
2 assistance in obtaining housing and subject to available appropriations,  
3 the division OF HOUSING shall establish a program that provides vouchers  
4 and other support services for housing assistance for:

5 (I) ~~a person~~ AN INDIVIDUAL with a mental health disorder,  
6 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER, or co-occurring behavioral health disorder  
7 who is transitioning from the department of corrections, the division of  
8 youth ~~corrections~~ SERVICES in the department of human services, A  
9 MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTE, A PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITAL, or a county jail  
10 into the community; OR

11 (II) AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS HOMELESS OR IN AN UNSTABLE  
12 HOUSING ENVIRONMENT AND IS TRANSITIONING FROM A RESIDENTIAL  
13 TREATMENT PROGRAM OR IS ENGAGED IN THE COMMUNITY TRANSITION  
14 SPECIALIST PROGRAM CREATED PURSUANT TO SECTION 27-66.5-103.

15 (e) IN ADDITION TO ANY MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE DIVISION  
16 OF HOUSING PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4)(d) OF THIS SECTION, FOR THE  
17 2019-20 FISCAL YEAR, AND FOR EACH OF THE FOLLOWING FOUR FISCAL  
18 YEARS, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL ANNUALLY APPROPRIATE ONE  
19 MILLION DOLLARS FROM THE MARIJUANA TAX CASH FUND CREATED IN  
20 SECTION 39-28.8-501, C.R.S., TO THE DIVISION OF HOUSING FOR THE  
21 VOUCHER PROGRAM SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (4)(b) OF THIS SECTION.

22 (f) THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LOCAL  
23 AFFAIRS SHALL REPORT TO THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND  
24 HUMAN SERVICES AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEES ON  
25 HEALTH AND INSURANCE AND PUBLIC HEALTH CARE AND HUMAN  
26 SERVICES, OR ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES, UNDER THE "STATE  
27 MEASUREMENT FOR ACCOUNTABLE, RESPONSIVE, AND TRANSPARENT

- 1 (SMART) GOVERNMENT ACT", PART 2 OF ARTICLE 7 OF TITLE 2, ON:  
2 (I) THE NUMBER OF PROJECTS FUNDED UNDER THIS SECTION;  
3 (II) THE NUMBER OF UNITS IN EACH PROJECT FUNDED UNDER THIS  
4 SECTION;  
5 (III) THE NUMBER OF QUALIFIED INDIVIDUALS HOUSED AS A  
6 RESULT OF THIS SUBSECTION (4); AND  
7 (IV) TO THE EXTENT PRACTICABLE, THE NUMBER OF INDIVIDUALS  
8 WHO, AFTER RECEIVING A VOUCHER UNDER SUBSECTION (4)(b) OF THIS  
9 SECTION, RETURNED TO THE FACILITIES FROM WHICH THE INDIVIDUALS  
10 WERE TRANSITIONING.

11 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 25-1.5-108.5 as  
12 follows:

13 **25-1.5-108.5. Regulation of recovery residences - definition.**

14 (1) (a) AS USED IN THIS SECTION, "RECOVERY RESIDENCE", "SOBER LIVING  
15 FACILITY", OR "SOBER HOME" MEANS ANY PREMISES, PLACE, FACILITY, OR  
16 BUILDING THAT PROVIDES HOUSING ACCOMMODATION FOR INDIVIDUALS  
17 WITH A PRIMARY DIAGNOSIS OF A SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER THAT:

- 18 (I) IS FREE FROM ALCOHOL AND NONPRESCRIBED OR ILLICIT DRUGS;  
19 (II) PROMOTES INDEPENDENT LIVING AND LIFE SKILL  
20 DEVELOPMENT; AND  
21 (III) PROVIDES STRUCTURED ACTIVITIES AND RECOVERY SUPPORT  
22 SERVICES THAT ARE PRIMARILY INTENDED TO PROMOTE RECOVERY FROM  
23 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS.

24 (b) "RECOVERY RESIDENCE" DOES NOT INCLUDE:

- 25 (I) A PRIVATE RESIDENCE IN WHICH AN INDIVIDUAL RELATED TO  
26 THE OWNER OF THE RESIDENCE BY BLOOD, ADOPTION, OR MARRIAGE IS  
27 REQUIRED TO ABSTAIN FROM SUBSTANCE USE OR RECEIVE BEHAVIORAL

1 HEALTH SERVICES FOR A SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER AS A CONDITION OF  
2 RESIDING IN THE RESIDENCE;

3 (II) THE SUPPORTIVE RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITY FOR INDIVIDUALS  
4 WHO ARE HOMELESS OPERATED UNDER SECTION 24-32-724 AT THE FORT  
5 LYON PROPERTY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING SUBSTANCE ABUSE  
6 SUPPORTIVE SERVICES, MEDICAL CARE, JOB TRAINING, AND SKILL  
7 DEVELOPMENT FOR THE RESIDENTS;     

8 (III) A FACILITY APPROVED FOR RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT BY THE  
9 OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES;

10 OR

11 (IV) PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING UNITS INCORPORATED  
12 INTO AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS.

13 (2) A RECOVERY RESIDENCE MAY ADMIT INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE  
14 RECEIVING MEDICATION-ASSISTED TREATMENT, INCLUDING AGONIST  
15 TREATMENT, FOR SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS.

16 (3) EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020, A PERSON SHALL NOT OPERATE  
17 A FACILITY USING THE TERM "RECOVERY RESIDENCE", "SOBER LIVING  
18 FACILITY", "SOBER HOME", OR A SUBSTANTIALLY SIMILAR TERM, AND A  
19 LICENSED, REGISTERED, OR CERTIFIED HEALTH CARE PROVIDER OR A  
20 LICENSED HEALTH FACILITY SHALL NOT REFER AN INDIVIDUAL IN NEED OF  
21 RECOVERY SUPPORT SERVICES TO A FACILITY, UNLESS THE FACILITY:

22 (a) IS CERTIFIED BY A RECOVERY RESIDENCE CERTIFYING BODY  
23 APPROVED BY THE OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH IN THE DEPARTMENT  
24 OF HUMAN SERVICES AS SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION;

25 (b) IS CHARTERED BY OXFORD HOUSE OR ITS SUCCESSOR  
26 ORGANIZATION;

27 (c) HAS BEEN OPERATING AS A RECOVERY RESIDENCE IN

1 COLORADO FOR THIRTY OR MORE YEARS AS OF THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF  
2 THIS SECTION; OR

3 (d) IS A COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATION THAT PROVIDES  
4 REENTRY SERVICES AS DESCRIBED IN SECTION 17-33-101 (7).

5 (4) THE OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH IN THE DEPARTMENT OF  
6 HUMAN SERVICES SHALL, BY RULE, DETERMINE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR  
7 A RECOVERY RESIDENCE CERTIFYING BODY SEEKING APPROVAL FOR  
8 PURPOSES OF SUBSECTION (3)(a) OF THIS SECTION, WHICH RULES MUST  
9 INCLUDE A REQUIREMENT THAT A RECOVERY RESIDENCE CERTIFYING BODY  
10 INCLUDE A REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE OFFICE ON ITS BOARD.

11 (5) A \_\_\_\_\_ RECOVERY RESIDENCE OWNER, EMPLOYEE, OR  
12 ADMINISTRATOR, OR AN INDIVIDUAL RELATED TO A RECOVERY RESIDENCE  
13 OWNER, EMPLOYEE, OR ADMINISTRATOR, SHALL NOT DIRECTLY OR  
14 INDIRECTLY:

15 (a) SOLICIT, ACCEPT, OR RECEIVE A COMMISSION, PAYMENT,  
16 TRADE, FEE, OR ANYTHING OF MONETARY OR MATERIAL VALUE,  
17 EXCLUDING THE SUPPORTIVE SERVICES REQUIRED TO PLACE THE RESIDENT:

18 (I) FOR ADMISSION OF A RESIDENT, EXCEPT FOR STATE OR FEDERAL  
19 CONTRACTS THAT SPECIFICALLY REIMBURSE FOR RESIDENT FEES;

20 (II) FROM A TREATMENT FACILITY THAT IS LICENSED OR CERTIFIED  
21 BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT FOR THE  
22 TREATMENT OF SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS; OR

23 (III) FROM A FACILITY APPROVED FOR RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT  
24 BY THE OFFICE OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN  
25 SERVICES.

26 (b) SOLICIT, ACCEPT, OR RECEIVE A COMMISSION, PAYMENT,  
27 TRADE, FEE, OR ANYTHING OF MONETARY OR MATERIAL VALUE FROM A

1 TOXICOLOGY LABORATORY THAT PROVIDES CONFIRMATION TESTING OR  
2 POINT-OF-CARE TESTING FOR RESIDENTS.

3 **SECTION 3.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add 27-82-114** as  
4 follows:

5 **27-82-114. Opioid crisis recovery funds advisory committee -**  
6 **creation - membership - purpose.** (1) THERE IS HEREBY CREATED THE  
7 OPIOID CRISIS RECOVERY FUNDS ADVISORY COMMITTEE, REFERRED TO IN  
8 THIS SECTION AS THE "COMMITTEE", WHICH IS CREATED TO ADVISE AND  
9 COLLABORATE WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ON USES OF ANY  
10 CUSTODIAL FUNDS RECEIVED BY THE STATE AS THE RESULT OF  
11 OPIOID-ADDICTION-RELATED LITIGATION AND FOR WHICH THE USE OF THE  
12 FUNDS IS NOT PREDETERMINED OR COMMITTED BY COURT ORDER OR  
13 OTHER ACTION BY A STATE OR FEDERAL COURT OF LAW.

14 (2) (a) THE COMMITTEE CONSISTS OF MEMBERS APPOINTED AS  
15 FOLLOWS:

16 (I) THIRTEEN MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR,  
17 INCLUDING:

18 (A) ONE MEMBER LICENSED TO PRACTICE MEDICINE PURSUANT TO  
19 ARTICLE 36 OF TITLE 12;

20 (B) ONE MEMBER LICENSED TO PRACTICE PHARMACY PURSUANT  
21 TO ARTICLE 42.5 OF TITLE 12;

22 (C) ONE MEMBER LICENSED TO PRACTICE AS A NURSE PURSUANT  
23 TO ARTICLE 38 OF TITLE 12;

24 (D) ONE MEMBER LICENSED AS A DENTIST PURSUANT TO ARTICLE  
25 35 OF TITLE 12;

26 (E) ONE MEMBER LICENSED AS A VETERINARIAN PURSUANT TO  
27 ARTICLE 64 OF TITLE 12;

- 1 (F) ONE MEMBER LICENSED AS A PHYSICAL THERAPIST PURSUANT  
2 TO ARTICLE 41 OF TITLE 12;
- 3 (G) ONE MEMBER REPRESENTING A LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH  
4 AGENCY;
- 5 (H) ONE MEMBER WHO HAS BEEN AFFECTED BY THE OPIOID CRISIS;
- 6 (I) ONE FAMILY MEMBER OF A PERSON WHO HAS BEEN AFFECTED  
7 BY THE OPIOID CRISIS;
- 8 (J) ONE MEMBER REPRESENTING AN ADVOCACY ORGANIZATION  
9 FOR PEOPLE WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS;
- 10 (K) TWO MEMBERS APPOINTED FROM NOMINEES SUBMITTED BY  
11 STATEWIDE ORGANIZATIONS REPRESENTING COUNTIES, WITH ONE MEMBER  
12 REPRESENTING THE WESTERN SLOPE AND ONE MEMBER REPRESENTING THE  
13 EASTERN PART OF THE STATE; AND
- 14 (L) ONE MEMBER FROM AN ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS  
15 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROVIDERS;
- 16 (II) TWO MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF  
17 THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES, ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT  
18 AN ASSOCIATION OF SUBSTANCE USE PROVIDERS;
- 19 (III) TWO MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF  
20 THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT, ONE OF WHOM  
21 IS A PAIN MANAGEMENT PATIENT;
- 22 (IV) ONE MEMBER APPOINTED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF  
23 THE DEPARTMENT OF REGULATORY AGENCIES;
- 24 (V) ONE MEMBER APPOINTED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE  
25 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CARE POLICY AND FINANCING;
- 26 (VI) ONE MEMBER FROM THE STATE SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREND  
27 AND RESPONSE TASK FORCE, CREATED IN SECTION 18-18.5-103, APPOINTED



1 BY THE ATTORNEY GENERAL;

2 (VII) ONE MEMBER FROM THE CENTER FOR RESEARCH INTO  
3 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER PREVENTION, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY  
4 SUPPORT STRATEGIES, CREATED IN SECTION 27-80-118 (3), APPOINTED BY  
5 THE DIRECTOR OF THE CENTER;

6 (VIII) ONE MEMBER FROM EACH SAFETY NET HOSPITAL THAT  
7 PROVIDES ADDICTION SERVICES, APPOINTED BY THE HOSPITAL;

8 (IX) ONE MEMBER FROM THE COLORADO DISTRICT ATTORNEYS'  
9 COUNCIL, OR ANY SUCCESSOR ORGANIZATION, APPOINTED BY ITS  
10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR;

11 (X) TWO MEMBERS REPRESENTING LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES,  
12 ONE OF WHOM IS APPOINTED BY THE COLORADO ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS  
13 OF POLICE, OR ANY SUCCESSOR ORGANIZATION, AND ONE OF WHOM IS  
14 APPOINTED BY THE COUNTY SHERIFFS OF COLORADO, OR ANY SUCCESSOR  
15 ORGANIZATION; AND

16 (XI) ONE MEMBER REPRESENTING THE COLORADO MUNICIPAL  
17 LEAGUE, OR ANY SUCCESSOR ORGANIZATION, APPOINTED BY THE  
18 PRESIDENT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE COLORADO MUNICIPAL  
19 LEAGUE OR THE PRESIDENT'S DESIGNEE.

20 (b) THE ATTORNEY GENERAL SHALL NOTIFY THE APPOINTING  
21 AUTHORITIES IF THE STATE RECEIVES A SETTLEMENT OR DAMAGE AWARD  
22 FOR WHICH THE USE OF THE CUSTODIAL FUNDS IS NOT PREDETERMINED OR  
23 COMMITTED BY COURT ORDER OR OTHER ACTION BY A STATE OR FEDERAL  
24 COURT OF LAW. THE APPOINTING AUTHORITIES SHALL MAKE THEIR INITIAL  
25 APPOINTMENTS TO THE COMMITTEE NO LATER THAN NINETY DAYS AFTER  
26 RECEIVING THE NOTICE.

27 (3) EACH MEMBER OF THE COMMITTEE WHO IS APPOINTED

1 PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION SERVES AT THE PLEASURE  
2 OF THE APPOINTING AUTHORITY THAT APPOINTED THE MEMBER. A  
3 VACANCY SHALL BE FILLED IN THE SAME MANNER AS THE INITIAL  
4 APPOINTMENT.

5 (4) IF THE STATE RECEIVES CUSTODIAL FUNDS FROM A  
6 SETTLEMENT OR DAMAGE AWARD FROM OPIOID-ADDICTION-RELATED  
7 LITIGATION AND THE USE OF THE FUNDS IS NOT PREDETERMINED OR  
8 COMMITTED BY COURT ORDER OR OTHER ACTION BY A STATE OR FEDERAL  
9 COURT OF LAW, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL SHALL CONVENE AND CALL A  
10 MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE, AND ANY SUBSEQUENT MEETINGS AS  
11 NECESSARY, TO SEEK INPUT AND RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE  
12 COMMITTEE ON THE PROPER EXPENDITURE OF THE FUNDS RECEIVED.

13 (5) (a) EACH MEMBER OF THE COMMITTEE SHALL MAINTAIN  
14 CONFIDENTIALITY THROUGHOUT THE PROCESS OF DETERMINING THE  
15 PROPER EXPENDITURE OF CUSTODIAL FUNDS. MEMBERS SHALL NOT  
16 DISCLOSE THE CONTENTS OF ANY REQUESTS FOR FUNDING WITH ANYONE  
17 OUTSIDE OF THE COMMITTEE.

18 (b) EACH COMMITTEE MEMBER SHALL AFFIRM THAT THE MEMBER  
19 DOES NOT HAVE A PERSONAL OR FINANCIAL INTEREST REGARDING ANY  
20 ORGANIZATION THAT MAY REQUEST FUNDING. MEMBERS SHALL DISCLOSE  
21 ALL POTENTIAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST SITUATIONS TO THE ATTORNEY  
22 GENERAL BEFORE REVIEWING FUNDING REQUESTS.

23 **SECTION 4.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 27-80-119 as  
24 follows:

25 **27-80-119. Recovery residence certification grant program -**  
26 **created - rules.** (1) THERE IS HEREBY CREATED IN THE OFFICE OF  
27 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH IN THE DEPARTMENT THE RECOVERY RESIDENCE

1 CERTIFICATION GRANT PROGRAM TO PROVIDE GRANTS TO RECOVERY  
2 RESIDENCES FOR THE PURPOSE OF GAINING CERTIFICATION AS A RECOVERY  
3 RESIDENCE AS REQUIRED IN SECTION 25-1.5-108.5.

4 (2) GRANT RECIPIENTS MAY USE THE MONEY RECEIVED THROUGH  
5 THE GRANT PROGRAM TO PAY FEES RELATED TO GAINING CERTIFICATION  
6 FROM AN APPROVED RECOVERY RESIDENCE CERTIFYING BODY, AS  
7 DETERMINED BY THE OFFICE PURSUANT TO SECTION 25-1.5-108.5 (4),  
8 INCLUDING THE PAYMENT OF MEMBERSHIP DUES.

9 (3) THE OFFICE SHALL ADMINISTER THE GRANT PROGRAM AND,  
10 SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, SHALL AWARD GRANTS AS  
11 PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION. FOR THE 2020-21 FISCAL YEAR AND EACH  
12 FISCAL YEAR THEREAFTER, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL APPROPRIATE  
13 MONEY FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR THE PURPOSE  
14 OF THE GRANT PROGRAM

15 (4) THE OFFICE SHALL IMPLEMENT THE GRANT PROGRAM IN  
16 ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION. PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 4 OF TITLE 24,  
17 THE OFFICE SHALL PROMULGATE SUCH RULES AS ARE REQUIRED IN THIS  
18 SECTION AND SUCH ADDITIONAL RULES AS MAY BE NECESSARY TO  
19 IMPLEMENT THE GRANT PROGRAM. AT A MINIMUM, THE RULES MUST  
20 SPECIFY THE TIME FRAMES FOR APPLYING FOR GRANTS, THE FORM OF THE  
21 GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION, AND THE TIME FRAMES FOR DISTRIBUTING  
22 GRANT MONEY.

23 **SECTION 5. Appropriation.** (1) For the 2019-20 state fiscal  
24 year, \$1,000,000 is appropriated to the department of local affairs. This  
25 appropriation consists of \$173,500 from the general fund and \$826,500  
26 from the marijuana tax cash fund created in section 39-28.8-501 (1).  
27 C.R.S. To implement this act, the department may use this appropriation

1 as follows:

2 (a) \$51,675 from the general fund for use by the division of  
3 housing for personal services, which amount is based on an assumption  
4 that the division will require an additional 0.9 FTE;

5 (b) \$6,949 from the general fund for use by the division of  
6 housing for operating expenses;

7 (c) \$938,756, consisting of \$112,256 from the general fund and  
8 \$826,500 from the marijuana tax cash fund, for use by the division of  
9 housing for low income rental subsidies; and

10 (d) \$2,620 from the general fund for the purchase of information  
11 technology services. \_\_\_\_\_

12 (2) For the 2019-20 state fiscal year, \$2,620 is appropriated to the  
13 office of the governor for use by the office of information technology.  
14 This appropriation is from reappropriated funds received from the  
15 department of local affairs under subsection (1)(d) of this section. To  
16 implement this act, the office may use this appropriation to provide  
17 information technology services for the department of local affairs.

18 (3) For the 2019-20 state fiscal year, \$50,000 is appropriated to  
19 the department of human services for use by the office of behavioral  
20 health. This appropriation is from the general fund. To implement this act,  
21 the office may use this appropriation for the recovery residence  
22 certification grant program.

23 **SECTION 4. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,  
24 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate  
25 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
