Summary of Legislation

The bill requires the Department of Human Services (DHS) to create a domestic abuse task force. The task force must develop a definition of domestic abuse for state statute that reflects its impact on the emotional and developmental well-being of a child. DHS must report recommendations of the task force to the General Assembly by December 2022. On or before July 1, 2023, DHS must promulgate rules based on recommendations from the Domestic Abuse Program and Child Welfare Workgroup, and vetted by the task force, to implement assessment policies, procedures, and training for child welfare caseworkers to recognize, respond, and assess child abuse or neglect related to domestic abuse.

State Expenditures

This bill increases General Fund expenditures in DHS by \$22,500 in FY 2021-22 and \$30,000 in FY 2022-23 to create a domestic abuse task force. Costs include hiring a facilitator to manage the development of work products, coordinate meetings and record recommendations. These costs are prorated to reflect enactment of the legislation on October 1, 2021. In addition, DHS will promulgate rules, update instruments and processes, train staff, and monitor the impact of this legislation over time. This workload can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.

State Appropriations

For FY 2021-22, the bill requires a General Fund appropriation of \$22,500 to the Department of Human Services.
