Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill includes an appropriation clause appropriating \$44,517 General Fund to the Department of Revenue for FY 2022-23.

Points to Consider

General Fund Impact

The Joint Budget Committee has proposed a budget package for FY 2022-23 based on the March 2022 Legislative Council Staff revenue forecast. The budget package includes two set-asides:

- 1. \$40.0 million General Fund for bills that create ongoing obligations; and
- 2. \$900.0 million General Fund for bills that create one-time obligations in FY 2022-23.

The \$40.0 million *appropriations* set-aside includes an additional \$6.0 million General Fund to provide a 15.0 percent General Fund reserve for those appropriations. The \$900.0 million *obligations* set-aside does not include an additional amount for a General Fund reserve and, assumes, but does not require, that obligations be addressed through statutory transfers rather than appropriations. Therefore *appropriations* from the \$900.0 million set-aside require an additional 15.0 percent to maintain the statutory General Fund reserve.

This bill creates an ongoing obligation and requires a General Fund appropriation of \$44,517 for FY 2022-23, reducing the \$40.0 million set aside by the same amount.

TABOR/ Excess State Revenues Impact

The March 2022 Legislative Council Staff (LCS) revenue forecast projects a TABOR surplus liability of \$1.6 billion for FY 2022-23 and \$622.6 million for FY 2023-24. These sums must be refunded to taxpayers out of the General Fund. This bill is estimated to decrease General Fund revenues by \$228,171 in FY 2022-23 and by \$485,184 in FY 2023-24, which will result in a decrease in the TABOR surplus liability of an equal amount.
