## A BILL FOR AN ACT

101	CONCERNING THE CREATION OF A TASK FORCE TO REPORT ON
102	MEASURES TO IMPROVE SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION, AND, IN

# **Bill Summary**

The bill creates a Colorado school transportation modernization task force (task force) to create a report containing findings and recommendations to improve public school transportation services for students.

The task force must prepare, publish, and share the findings of its the report by January 31, 2024, with the education committees of the general assembly, the state board of education, and the governor.

STUDENTS OF COLOR, STUDENTS FROM 19 UNDER-RESOURCED COMMUNITIES, AND STUDENTS WITH A DISABILITY ARE 20 DISPROPORTIONATELY IMPACTED BY THE TRANSPORTATION SHORTAGE 21 AND STRUGGLE TO ACCESS SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF THEIR CHOICE AND 22 CAREER PATHWAY PROGRAMS BECAUSE OF THEIR LIMITED ACCESS TO 23 TRANSPORTATION.
