A BILL FOR AN ACT

CONCERNING UPDATES REGARDING PRADER-WILLI SYNDROME.

Bill Summary

The bill updates information associated with Prader-Willi syndrome to conform to current laws and regulations.

- 1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
- 2 SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25.5-6-402, amend

I	(4)(d); and repeal $(4)(a)$ and $(4)(e)$ as follows:
2	25.5-6-402. Legislative declaration - Prader-Willi syndrome.
3	(4) The general assembly further finds and declares that:
4	(a) Prader-Willi syndrome is a genetic condition that occurs in
5	approximately one in fifteen to twenty-five thousand people worldwide,
6	and there are up to three hundred seventy-five individuals living with this
7	syndrome in Colorado;
8	(d) The most critical hallmark of Prader-Willi syndrome is
9	overeating. Individuals with Prader-Willi syndrome cannot tell when they
10	are full and will continue to eat without stop STOPPING, leading to A
11	ruptured stomachs STOMACH and even death. Other symptoms include
12	significant developmental and cognitive delays, skin picking, sleep
13	problems, obsessive-compulsive behaviors, hypothyroidism,
14	hypogonadism, and low muscle tone.
15	(e) The state of Colorado does not currently recognize
16	Prader-Willi syndrome as an intellectual and developmental disability.
17	SECTION 2. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
18	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
19	preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
