## **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 24-1016** 101 CONCERNING RECOGNITION AND REMEMBRANCE OF COLORADO 102 MILITARY VETERANS WHO SERVED IN THE VIETNAM WAR. 1 WHEREAS, United States military involvement in the Vietnam 2 War began in South Vietnam in 1964 and continued throughout the 3 region until 1975, involving North Vietnamese Army and Viet Cong 4 guerrilla forces in armed conflict with United States Armed Forces and 5 the Army of the Republic of Vietnam; and 6 WHEREAS, During this period, more than 2.7 million American 7 soldiers, both volunteers and draftees, served tours of duty in Vietnam, 8 with a total of more than 9 million active duty military personnel, in what 9 was an extremely long, difficult, and complex war; and 10 WHEREAS, More than 58,220 members of the United States

1 2 3 4 5 6	Armed Forces, including 623 Coloradans, lost their lives in the Vietnam War, and more than 300,000 members of the United States Armed Forces were wounded; in addition, more than 1,500 members of the United States Armed Forces are listed as prisoners of war or missing in action in the Vietnam War and remain unaccounted for, including 24 Coloradans; and
7 8 9 10	WHEREAS, According to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, more than 6 million veterans of the United States Armed Forces who served during the Vietnam era are still alive today, including, as of 2020, more than 117,000 Coloradans; and
11 12 13 14	WHEREAS, Formal acknowledgment of Vietnam War veterans is as important now as ever, not only for the veterans who served but for all citizens; bipartisan legislation signed in 2017 permanently enshrines March 29 as National Vietnam War Veterans Day; and
15 16	WHEREAS, April 30, 2024, marks the 49th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War; now, therefore,
17 18 19	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
20	That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, hereby:
21 22	(1) Honor the service and sacrifices of Colorado military veterans who served in the Vietnam War alongside South Vietnamese soldiers;
23 24	(2) Recognize the challenges faced by many veterans, both while serving in the Vietnam War and upon returning home;
25 26 27 28	(3) Express our appreciation for the fortitude of Colorado veterans; their activism on behalf of fellow veterans; their patriotism; their accomplishments and contributions; and the leadership they have shown their families, community organizations, and the state; and
29 30	(4) Encourage all Coloradans to remember the sacrifices made by Vietnam War veterans.
