SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL 24-004

101 MEMORIALIZING FORMER REPRESENTATIVE AND SENATOR JIM DYER.

- WHEREAS, Jim Dyer, the former Representative and Senator, departed this life on April 29, 2023, at the age of 85; and
- WHEREAS, Edward James Dyer, Jr., known to everyone as Jim,
- 4 was born December 9, 1937, in St. Joseph, Missouri, to Edward James
- 5 Dyer, Sr., and Eleanor Grace Brown Dyer; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Senator Dyer was raised in Kansas and graduated
- from Hayden High School in Topeka, Kansas, where he played football
- 8 and was student council president; and
- 9 WHEREAS, After high school, he attended St. Benedict's College
- in Atchison, Kansas, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English
- 11 literature in 1959; and

2	Officer Candidate School; and
3 4	WHEREAS, In 1963, Senator Dyer began his first tour in Vietnam as a lieutenant in the United States Navy; and
5 6 7	WHEREAS, He served two more tours in Vietnam after transferring to the United States Marines in 1964 and rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel; and
8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, During his three tours in Vietnam, Senator Dyer was awarded the Soldier's Medal, three Bronze Stars, the Air Medal, the Gallantry Cross with Palm from the Republic of Vietnam, and the Order of Military Merit from the Republic of Korea; and
12 13 14	WHEREAS, To the men who served with Senator Dyer, his care for others was a distinguishing characteristic; he made it known to his troops that he was there for them; and
15 16 17 18	WHEREAS, General Ron Fogleman, former chief of staff of the United States Air Force, called Senator Dyer a "very loyal guy when it came to taking care of his troops and not forgetting them he just never forgot his troops"; and
19 20 21	WHEREAS, On December 10, 1966, Senator Dyer married Shari Ferguson, and they had three sons, Jim in 1968, Andy in 1970, and Matt in 1974; and
22 23	WHEREAS, In 1977, while serving in the Marines, Senator Dyer attended the U.S. Naval War College; and
24 25 26 27	WHEREAS, After retiring from the armed forces, Senator Dyer and his wife moved with their three sons to Durango, Colorado, where he sold heavy equipment while pursuing a second degree in career counseling from Fort Lewis College; and
28 29	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer graduated from Fort Lewis College in 1986 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in career counseling; and
30 31	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer was elected to the Colorado House of Representatives in 1988 to represent District 59, which includes

1 2	Archuleta, La Plata, Montezuma, and San Juan counties; he was re-elected five times and served in the House for 12 years; and
3	WHEREAS, In 1998, Senator Dyer was elected to the Colorado
4	Senate, representing District 6, comprising Archuleta, Delta, Dolores, La
5	Plata, Montezuma, Montrose, Ouray, San Juan, and San Miguel counties;
6	and
7	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer had friends on both sides of the aisle
8	and cared deeply about his district; and
9	WHEREAS, During his time in the General Assembly, Senator
10	Dyer served on many committees, including the House Agriculture,
11	Livestock, and Natural Resources committee; the House Appropriations
12	committee; the House Business Affairs and Labor committee; the Senate
13	State, Veterans, and Military Affairs committee; the Senate
14	Transportation committee; the Senate Government, Veterans, and
15	Military Relations committee; and the Senate Agriculture and Natural
16	Resources committee, on which he served as chair; and
17	WHEREAS, Both during and after his terms in the Colorado
18	House and Senate, Senator Dyer wrote a weekly column for the Durango
19	Herald, often discussing what was happening at the capitol; and
20	WHEREAS, In 2001, Governor Bill Owens appointed Senator
21	Dyer to serve on the Public Utilities Commission, at which point he
22	resigned his seat in the Senate; and
23	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer was a member of the Marine Corps
24	Association, the National Rifle Association, the Veterans of Foreign
25	Wars, and the American Legion; and
26	WHEREAS, He loved his brother Marines and returned to
27	Vietnam after he left the Senate; and
28	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer was known for his care for others, his
29	loyalty to his constituents and colleagues, and his deep patriotism; and
30	WHEREAS, Senator Dyer characterized himself as a poet/warrior,
31	and others describe him as a man who cared about all the right things,
32	who made a positive impact in the places he went, who made a
33	difference, and who was loved and respected; now, therefore,
