	The bill authorizes the use of electroconvulsive treatment on minors under the age of 16 under certain circumstance. It minimally increases state expenditures beginning in FY 2024-25.

Summary of Legislation

Current law allows electroconvulsive treatment (ECT) to be being performed on minors who are at between 16 and 18 years old, have the consent of a parent or guardian, and have been approved by two medical practitioners specializing in psychiatry. The bill permits minors under the age of 16 years old to receive ECT if the following conditions are met:

- two licensed medical professionals specializing in psychiatry approve of the treatment;
- other less-invasive treatments have failed;
- ECT is necessary due to severity of the minor's condition;
- ECT is performed by at least one physician or physician's designee; and
- the minor's parent or guardian consents to the treatment.

State Expenditures

Starting in 2024-25, workload in the Department of Regulatory Agencies, the Department of Public Health and Environment, and the Behavioral Health Administration will minimally increase to update rules, procedures, and technical forms for licensed medical professions and health care facilities, and respond to complaints. Additionally, workload in the Department of Human Services will increase to the extent that minors receive ECT at the Colorado Mental Health Hospitals in Fort Logan or Pueblo. This workload is expected to be minimal and no change in appropriation is required.

Effective Date

This bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on June 3, 2024.
