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#### How to Use this Document

The Department Overview contains a table summarizing the staff recommended incremental changes followed by brief explanations of each incremental change. A similar overview table is provided for each division, but the description of incremental changes is not repeated, since it is available under the Department Overview. More details about the incremental changes are provided in the sections following the Department Overview and the division summary tables.

Decision items, both department-requested items and staff-initiated items, are discussed either in the Decision Items Affecting Multiple Divisions or at the beginning of the most relevant division. Within a section, decision items are listed in the requested priority order, if applicable.

#### DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Department of Agriculture has six divisions. A brief description of each division and its associated responsibilities is provided below.

The **COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES DIVISION** provides administrative and technical support for department divisions and programs, including accounting, budgeting, human resources, communications, information technology, and legislative coordination functions.

**AGRICULTURAL SERVICES** consists of the following program areas:

- *Animal Industry Division*, i.e. Animal Health Division, provides oversight for the prevention and control of livestock diseases, operation of the Rocky Mountain Regional Animal Health Laboratory, implementation of pest control, licensing and inspection of pet care facilities, and investigations animal of cruelty claims.
- Inspection and Consumer Services Division (ICS) provides metrology and regulatory laboratory services including content analysis of feeds, fertilizers, groundwater, and pesticides. Additionally, ICS inspects: anhydrous ammonia tanks, eggs, grain warehouses, agricultural commodity handlers and dealers, door-to-door sales companies, custom meat processors, and small and large weighing and measuring devices.
- *Plant Industry Division* is responsible for organic certification, nursery stock inspection, produce inspection, certification of plant and seed exports, seed inspection and certification, commercial and private pesticide applicator testing and licensing, and inspection of pesticide product records and labels.
- *Conservation Services Division* operates the biological pest control program; the Palisade insectary; noxious weed and weed free forage programs; the groundwater protection program, the chemigation permitting and inspection program; and encourages development of agricultural-based renewable energy projects through grants.

The AGRICULTURAL MARKETS DIVISION promotes Colorado's agricultural products and services to domestic and international markets, provides export assistance, and develops value-added business ventures. The Markets Division is also responsible for promoting Colorado's wine industry, administering the Colorado Proud brand, and operating the agricultural products inspection program.

Annually, the **BRAND BOARD** inspects and verifies the ownership of approximately 4 million head of livestock at sale barns, slaughterhouses, and export sites to protect producers and buyers from fraud and theft of livestock. The Brand Board also investigates reported livestock theft, maintains brand records, and licenses livestock sales barns, processing plants, and alternative livestock farms. It will also serve as a resource to assist in criminal prosecutions against individuals accused of livestock theft. Established in 1865, the Board also maintains records for over 32,000 livestock brands and licenses and inspects livestock markets and certified feed lots.

The **COLORADO STATE FAIR AUTHORITY** is responsible for planning and operating the 11-day state fair held at the end of August and beginning of September, and coordinates special events utilizing its facilities that occur on the fairgrounds throughout the year.

The **CONSERVATION BOARD** provides administrative and financial assistance and competitive grants to the 76 state conservation districts. The Conservation Board also works with districts on noxious weed management, groundwater protection, biological pest control, and erosion prevention projects.

#### DESCRIPTION OF INCREMENTAL CHANGES

**R1 AGRICULTURE EMERGENCY COORDINATOR:** The recommendation includes an increase of \$145,386 total funds, including \$84,742 General Fund, \$30,774 cash funds, and \$29,870 reappropriated funds and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23 to hire an Agriculture Emergency Coordinator. The request annualizes to \$171,771 total funds, including \$101,202 General Fund and 1.0 FTE in FY 2023-24 and beyond.

**R2** ENHANCING RESOURCES FOR BUREAU OF ANIMAL PROTECTION: The recommendation includes an increase of \$153,775 General Fund and 0.9 FTE to hire a new Veterinary Forensic Specialist and establish compensation for a statewide veterinary network in FY 2022-23. The recommendation annualizes to \$189,624 and 1.0 FTE in FY 2023-24 and beyond.

**R3 COLORADO HEMP DECORTICATION:** The recommendation does not include an appropriation for the Department's request to establish a hemp decortication grant program. The request seeks to set up a grant program for private companies in order to defray the upfront costs up purchasing hemp decortication machines.

**R4 STATE FAIR SPENDING AUTHORITY INCREASE:** The recommendation includes an increase of \$647,281 in cash fund spending authority from the State Fair Authority Cash Fund for FY 2022-23 and beyond. The spending authority increase is requested in order to comply with audit recommendations and adapt to increasing labor and maintenance costs.

**R5** SAN LUIS VALLEY WELL MONITORING: The recommendation includes a one-time increase of \$385,000 cash funds from the Plant Health, Pest Control, and Environmental Protection Cash Fund in order to install a water quality well monitoring network in the San Luis Valley for FY 2022-23. The request also includes roll forward authority for the appropriation.

**R6 IMPROVE AGRICULTURAL PEST RESPONSE:** The recommendation includes an increase of \$66,302 cash funds and 0.9 FTE, including \$51,302 from the Plant Health, Pest Control, and Environmental Protection Cash Fund and \$15,000 from the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund for pesticide enforcement and invasive pest control. This request annualizes to \$88,416 cash funds and 1.0 FTE in FY 2023-24.

**R7 AGRICULTURE LICENSING AND REGISTRATION SYSTEM:** The recommendation includes an increase of \$247,800 cash funds, including \$123,900 from the Plant Health, Pest Control, and Environmental Protection Cash Fund and \$123,900 from the Inspection and Consumer Services Cash Fund to upgrade the Departments regulatory software to the Food and Drug Administration's multi-state licensing tool called the System for Agriculture, Food, Health, E-Inspections, and Registration (SAFHER).

**NON-PRIORITIZED DECISION ITEMS:** The recommendation includes an decrease of \$19,045 total funds, including \$25,686 General Fund, for adjustments related to budget requests from the Department of Personnel for its annual fleet vehicle request, paid family leave, Colorado WINS and the Governor's Office of Information Technology package of request items for FY 2022-23.

#### MAJOR DIFFERENCES FROM THE REQUEST

- The staff recommendation is to deny a portion of the R1, R2, and R6 requests. JBC staff's recommendations set FTE salaries to the range minimum as well as remove centrally appropriated costs, per JBC policy.
- Staff recommends denying the Department's R3 request relating to a hemp decortication grant program. JBC and OLLS staff agree that the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund does not allow for this type of expenditure.

- Staff recommends adding 1.0 of the 3.0 FTE requested in R2.
- The Committee has taken action on some, but not all of the common policies affecting this Department. The tables shown in this document are up to date as of this presentation, but staff asks permission to adjust them in the future to correlate with related committee decisions.

#### DECISION ITEMS AFFECTING MULTIPLE DIVISIONS

#### → R-01 Agriculture Emergency Coordinator

*REQUEST:* The Department requests \$167,821 total funds, including \$101,200 General Fund, \$36,751 cash funds from various sources, \$29,870 reappropriated funds, and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23. This request annualizes to \$171,771 total funds and 1.0 FTE in future years and will fund a new Emergency Coordinator position.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the Committee approve an appropriation of \$145,386 total funds including \$84,742 General Fund, \$30,774 cash funds from various sources, \$29,870 reappropriated funds, and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23. Staff's recommendation annualizes to the Departments full request in future years. The difference in staff's recommendation is the exclusion of centrally appropriated costs, per JBC policy.

ANALYSIS: The Department of Agriculture is designated in the State Emergency Operations Plan to fulfill the Emergency Support Function (ESF) #11 role at the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) for agriculture and livestock needs during an emergency. Once the plan is activated, all state departments and offices are mandated under the authority of the Colorado Disaster Emergency Act (Section 24-33.5-701, C.R.S.) to carry out assigned activities related to mitigating effects of an emergency or disaster and to cooperate fully with each other, the Office of Emergency Management, and with other political subdivisions in providing emergency assistance. The Department's ESF #11 role includes five primary response functions:

- Respond to livestock and agricultural health issues in the face of a disease outbreak affecting agriculture,
- Provide technical expertise, coordination, and support of livestock and agricultural emergency management when agriculture is impacted by disasters,
- Ensure the safety and security of Colorado's commercial agricultural food supply,
- Coordinate protection of natural and cultural resources and historic properties through the Department of Natural Resources, and
- Support ESF #6 in providing nutritional assistance and sheltering needs for companion animals.

Seven different state agencies (including agriculture) are responsible for the 15 Emergency Support Functions outlined in the State Emergency Operations Plan, and of those seven at least five (DHS, CDPHE, DPS, OIT, CDOT) have full time staff dedicated to fulfilling the requirements of the plan.

Currently the Department does not have a full time employee to respond to natural disasters affecting the agriculture industry, and these responsibilities have historically been shared between division directors when the need arises. According to the Division of Fire Prevention and Control in the Department of Public Safety the three largest fires in Colorado history occurred in 2020, with four of the top five largest fires in the state taking place since 2018. In addition, according to data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, 62.0 percent of the state is currently experiencing a "severe drought" (snowpack and water levels are low, fire seasons are extended) and at least 20.0 percent of the state has experienced what is known as an "exceptional drought" (where topsoil removal is widespread and agricultural economic losses are considered large) four times in the last twenty years.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department indicates that it will routinely monitor the success of the Department's response to hazards events, but no control or baseline data has been identified to measure against. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

#### → R-02 Enhancing Resources for Bureau of Animal Protection

*REQUEST:* The Department requests \$418,350 General Fund 2.8 FTE in FY 2022-23 to hire a Veterinary Forensic Specialist and two Bureau of Animal Protection investigators, as well as establish a veterinary contracting network across the state to respond to animal cruelty investigations. The request annualizes to \$437,540 General Fund and 3.0 FTE in future years.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends an appropriation of \$153,775 General Fund and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23 and \$189,624 and 1.0 FTE in FY 2023-24 and beyond. This recommendation includes the approval of the veterinary specialist position and veterinary network compensation components of the request. Included in the calculations for the FTE portion of the request are excluding centrally appropriated costs in the first year, per JBC policy, and setting the position at the minimum salary range point.

*ANALYSIS:* The Animal Protection Act of 1990 created the Bureau of Animal Protection (BAP). The BAP serves as a support mechanism to local law enforcement agencies in conducting animal cruelty and neglect investigations. The Commissioner of the Colorado Department of Agriculture (through Section 35-42-106 C.R.S.) appoints BAP agents who are either employees of the state, Colorado-based non-profits, counties, cities, or any other local government entity or political subdivision of the state (Section 35-42-107 (2) C.R.S. In order to become a BAP agent, applicants must complete at minimum 40 hours of pertinent training followed by 32 hours of continuing education every two years; have one year of experience in regulatory or code enforcement, animal care and control, or animal cruelty investigations; and attend CDA's most current Scope and Range of BAP Agent Authority Training. There are currently 97 BAP agents certified in Colorado, of which one is a direct employee of the Department.

The BAP program investigates mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment of all animals, with roughly 80 percent of complaints/investigations relating to the welfare of dogs and cats (companion animals), 14 percent relating to horses not in production agriculture, and 2 percent pertaining to livestock. As outlined in the table below assessments have been increasing over the last three years.

The Department has submitted this request in response to the increase in cases as well as stakeholder feedback during the BAP rulemaking process in the summer of 2020. The Department has historically provided supportive services to BAP agents in non-profits and law enforcement entities, providing veterinary forensic support by borrowing resources (staff time) from the Department's Pet Animal Care Facility Act program. Staff believes the Department can continue in this supportive role with the addition of a dedicated Veterinary Forensic Specialist to assist with BAP agents across the state, as well as compensating local veterinarians for time spent in assisting local entities in their investigations.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department does not have sufficient data to indicate that the increased staff will have an effect on the number of BAP cases. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

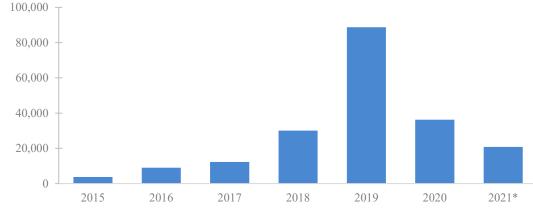
#### → R-03 COLORADO HEMP DECORTICATION

*REQUEST:* The Department requests a one-time increase of \$5,072,735 cash funds from the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund and 0.8 FTE for FY 2022-23 to establish a grant program to expand hemp decortication in the state. The Department also seeks roll forward authority on the appropriation in order to facilitate the grants across multiple fiscal years.

*RECOMMENDATION:* **JBC staff recommends denial of the Department's request.** JBC staff and the Office of Legislative Legal Services (OLLS) agree that the proposed grant program does not fall under allowable uses of the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund. If the Committee wanted to move forward with funding this request there are a couple of options to achieve this goal.

- Run a JBC sponsored bill (or placeholder) that changes the allowable uses of the Marijuana Tax Cash Fund to include the proposed grant program.
- Fund the request with General Fund instead of Marijuana Tax Cash Fund and provide roll forward authority for the grants to be dispersed over multiple years.

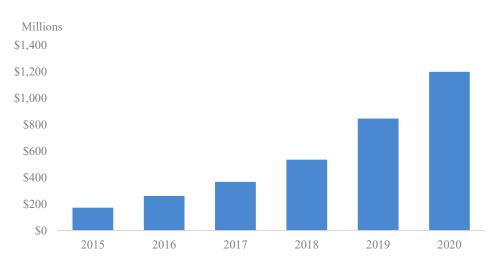
ANALYSIS: The Department of Agriculture regulates the cultivation of industrial hemp across the state through both the industrial hemp program and the certified seed program. In order to cultivate industrial hemp in Colorado producers must register annually with the Department, and pay a registration fee per acre and/or indoor square foot which is then deposited into the Industrial Hemp Registration Cash Fund created in Section 35-61-106 (1), C.R.S. Over the last several years annual hemp registrations have fluctuated, with a sharp increase since the establishment of the industrial hemp program in 2015 to a sharp decline between the 2019-20 and 2020-21 fiscal years, as illustrated in the graph below.

One assumption about the spike and subsequent drop off in hemp registrations is that there was an initial market saturation following the legalization of hemp production outlined in the 2018 Farm Bill. The 2018 Farm Bill expanded the cultivation of hemp from small scale pilot programs for "studies" in the markets response to hemp derived products to a more broad cultivation of hemp, and even allows for the transfer of hemp derived products across state lines. Important to note for purposes of this discussion is that along with the relaxing of hemp regulations under the 2018 Farm Bill the bill also removes hemp derived products as a schedule 1 substance. The result of this was that cannabinoid (CBD) oil was considered to be legalized, as long as it was produced through the approved hemp production process. While hemp registration areas have decreased in Colorado the market share of CBD products has continued to increase over the same time period, according to a study by Statista. The increase in consumer sales nationally can be seen in the graph below.



#### National Growth in US CBD Product Sales 2015-2020

Nationally, in 2019, just under 80 percent of the 500,000 total hemp registered areas were intended primarily to produce flower for CBD extraction. CBD oil is used in a variety of health and beauty

products, and to produce this oil only the flower of the hemp plant is used. To extract this oil the hemp plant is sent to an extraction facility, and in many cases the remainder of the plant is discarded without further processing. A decortication machine separates the flower from the fiber and the hurd of the plant. The hurd (the woody innermost part of the stalk) can be used for construction and building materials, animal bedding, cosmetics, and an alternative for plastics while the fiber has uses in yarn and textiles.

There are currently 10 decortication facilities in the country, and one in Colorado (Formation AG). Formation AG is located in the San Luis Valley and has a decortication machine with a current backlog of 4-6 weeks. While this indicates that there is a demand for decortication services in Colorado there hasn't been any sort of market analysis done to determine the scale of this demand. Because the processing of hemp was just allowed with the passage of the 2018 Farm Bill there is very little national or state level data available. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is expected to release its first ever national hemp survey sometime in early 2022, but as of the writing of this document staff cannot confidently say that a decortication grant program would be successful in revitalizing the state's hemp industry.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department does not have any data that indicates that a grant program for hemp decortication will /will not be effective in expanding the states hemp industry. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

#### → R-06 IMPROVE AGRICULTURAL PEST RESPONSE

*REQUEST:* The Department requests \$90,471 total funds, including \$75,471 cash funds from the Plant Control and Environmental Protection Cash Fund and \$15,000 from the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund, and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23. This request annualizes to \$88,416 total funds and 1.0 FTE in future years to fund a new position in the Pesticide Enforcement Program.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the Committee approve an appropriation of \$66,302 cash funds including \$51,302 from the Plant Control and Environmental Protection Cash Fund and \$15,000 from the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund, and 0.9 FTE in FY 2022-23, Annualizing to the Departments full request in future years. The difference in staff's recommendation is the exclusion of centrally appropriated costs, per JBC policy. Staff does not recommend roll-forward authority for the appropriation.

*ANALYSIS:* The Department is authorized to regulate pesticides under the Colorado Pesticide Applicators Act (CPAA) and licenses over 10,000 individuals and 1,200 businesses annually. The CPAA provides the authority to regulate and enforce the proper use of pesticides in accordance with pesticide labeling and established rules. In determining whether or not a violation of the act has occurred, the department obtains complainants, as well as collects records and pesticide samples. Violations of the act may result in enforcement actions that include cease and desist orders, letters of admonition, and stipulated agreements which can include civil penalties and license revocation.

Prior to the legalization of Marijuana in Colorado the Pesticide Enforcement Program had three FTE and a nominal case backlog, averaging around 40-50 complaint cases annually. Since the legalization of Marijuana in Colorado the number of pesticide cases has increased to 120-150 annually and has contributed to a current backlog of 128 cases, including 93 or which are over two years old.

The Plant Control and Environmental Protection Cash Fund has had a growing fund balance over the last couple of years and receives revenue from license and inspection fees from various industries, including seed and pesticide sectors. The fund began FY 2021-22 with a \$4.9 million balance and is projected to end the year with a \$5.3 million balance. The fund can absorb the increased costs of the new FTE without raising fees, and therefore not impact the TABOR limit.

A second part of the request is an increase of \$15,000 and roll-forward authority from the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund. The Pest Control Act provides the department the authority to prevent the introduction and dissemination of plant pests and diseases into Colorado by establishing and implementing quarantines as well as allowing counties to establish pest control districts. The Department is currently working to quarantine the Emerald Ash Borer, Japanese Beetle, and Potato Late Blight. House Bill 21-1045 (Invasive Pest Control Administration) gave the Department the authority to implement emergency measures to control and eradicate invasive pests and the ability to transfer cash funds from the Plant Health, Pest Control and Environmental Protection Cash Fund to the Invasive Pest Response Fund. However, the bill does not create spending authority for the program.

Presently, the department is preparing for the impacts of the Spotted Lantern Fly an invasive pest that has spread from the Eastern United States. A 2019 study published by the Center for Rural Pennsylvania for the Pennsylvania General Assembly estimated the overall annual economic impact of the fly to the state of Pennsylvania to be between \$63 and \$149 million dollars, with a note indicating the hardest hit industries include nurseries, fruit, and Christmas trees.

The current fund balance of the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund is \$0, but the Department intends to transfer \$15,000 in the current fiscal year into the fund, as allowable under Section 35-1-106.3, C.R.S. The Department also anticipates receiving \$75,000 from agreements with local governments and businesses to help them respond to invasive pests.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department believe that a new FTE and increased spending authority from the Emergency Invasive Pest Response Fund will reduce the Department's pesticide case backlog, but no evidence has been provided to indicate that this is the case. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

#### → R-07 Agriculture Licensing and Regulation System

*REQUEST:* The Department requests an increase of \$247,800 cash funds, with \$123,900 from the Plant Health, Pest Control, and Environmental Protection Cash Fund and \$123,900 from the Consumer Services Cash Fund in order to upgrade to a new agriculture and food-safety regulatory platform.

*RECOMMENDATION:* **JBC** staff recommends approval of the Department's request. JBC staff relayed this request to the Joint Technology Committee, who recommended that the JBC fully fund the project.

ANALYSIS: The Department of Agriculture currently has 30 regulatory program areas requiring permitting and application access, many of which use a system called AgLicense. AgLicense, which was implemented in 2014, supports 19 programs and accounts for 20,000 annual individual or business renewals and 38,000 product renewals, but cannot support all of the Department's programs. While AgLicence was initially promising the Department believes that errors caused by the system have impacted how consumers are interacting with the Department. Most notably the Department has seen a drop in online renewal rates since a system error in FY 2020-21, as indicated by the table below.

The Department, alongside the Governor's Office of Information Technology, have identified the System for Agriculture, Food, Health, E-inspections, and Registration (SAFHER) platform developed by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) as the long term permitting solution for the Department. The SAFHER system has been made available to states across the country and has been built using \$5.0 million in funds from the FDA. An analysis from Slalom Consulting estimated that for the Department to build out a regulatory platform of its own would cost around \$19.0 million. The request seeks to transfer programs onto the SAFHER system gradually, with an estimated cost of \$35,000 per program.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department plans to gage success by the number of programs on boarded to the SAFHER. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

### (1) COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Commissioner's Office, in conjunction with the Colorado Agricultural Commission, is responsible for the development and implementation of agricultural policies throughout the State. Administrative Services provides administrative and technical support for Department programs, including accounting, budgeting, and human resources. The funding for this division is from the General Fund, various cash funds, and federal grants. Reappropriated funds are received from various cash funds within the Department for centrally appropriated line items.

### (2) AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

Agricultural Services includes most of the Department's large regulatory and consumer protection programs and is comprised four operating divisions:

- Animal Industry Division is responsible for the prevention, traceability, and control of livestock diseases, as well as pest control and oversight of animal care requirements.
- **Plant Industry Division** manages statewide pest control programs; certifies and inspects plant, seed, and pesticide products; and administers the Industrial Hemp Regulatory Program.
- Inspection and Consumer Services Division provides metrology and regulatory laboratory services, and inspects a variety of agricultural products and facilities
- **Conservation Services Division** operates programs to enhance natural stewardship, including the Noxious Weed Management Program, and works with the **Conservation Board**, which provides administrative oversight and financial assistance to state conservation districts in support of local conservation initiatives.

The primary sources of funding are General Fund and two cash funds: the Plant Health, Pest Control and Environmental Protection Fund, and the Inspection and Consumer Services Cash Fund.

#### DECISION ITEMS - AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

#### → R-05 SAN LUIS VALLEY WELL MONITORING

*REQUEST:* The Department requests \$385,000 one-time cash fund spending authority from the Plant Control and Environmental Protection Cash Fund with roll-forward authority for FY 2022-23 to install a well monitoring network in the San Luis Valley.

#### RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the Committee approve the Department's request.

*ANALYSIS:* The Agricultural Water Quality Program monitors state waters for the presence of agricultural chemicals, oversees agricultural chemical regulation to prevent and mitigate their presence in state waters, and provides education and training to agricultural chemical applicators and the general public regarding water quality protection, agricultural chemical use, and other agricultural methods. Section 25-8-205.5, C.R.S. authorizes the Department to additionally monitor groundwater for agricultural chemicals, and S.B. 19-186 (Expand Agricultural Chemical Management Program Protect Surface Water) expanded the scope of the program's work to include surface water quality protection in addition to existing groundwater quality protection responsibilities.

The San Luis Valley is one of 18 well sampling regions in the state. According to the Agricultural Water Quality Program Database, since 1989, 1,507 wells have been sampled for ground water contaminants, of which 217 have been in the San Luis Valley with 44 of those wells exceeding the acceptable standard for Nitrate and 1 exceeding the standard for pesticides. A table outlining the San Luis Valley wells as compared to the statewide survey is included below.

The Department has identified the San Luis Valley as an area with elevated levels of agricultural chemicals that requires elevated monitoring. Currently the Department obtains its monitoring data from domestic wells, which are private wells on private land in which the landowner allows the state access to sample. There are a few issues with relying on Domestic wells rather than monitoring wells. The first is that Domestic wells are drilled to a depth deeper than is necessary, and therefore not providing the most reading of agricultural chemicals from surface water. The second is that wells are only sampled every few years, and in that time land ownership can change. This can lead to the loss of access for monitoring and leads to inconsistent data. The Department has also attempted to use the monitoring wells of the United States Geological Survey (USGS), but the fee to use their wells are around \$2,500, which can add to a significant cost occur the long term.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of an evidence-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department will use the 44 new wells to collect data on water contamination. Because the Department is seeking to improve upon a system that is already in place, and is attempting to collect more

consistent and accurate data, Staff agrees with the Department that this assignment level is accurate. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, staff believes this program meets the level of Evidence-informed program.

## LINE ITEM DETAIL - AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

#### ANIMAL INDUSTRY DIVISION

The Animal Industry line item funds the staff responsible for operating expenses and programs including: livestock disease prevention and control, rodent and predator control services, pet animal care facility inspection and licensing and operation of the Rocky Mountain Regional Animal Health Laboratory. This line item is supported by the following cash funds: Diseased Livestock Indemnity Cash Fund, Cervidae Disease Cash Fund, Colorado Aquaculture Cash Fund, Animal Protection Cash Fund, and Pet Animal Care and Facility Cash Fund.

*STATUTORY AUTHORITY:* Sections 35-1-108, 35-50-105, 35-24.5-104 through 108, 35-40-101, 35-42-106, 35-42.5-101, 35-80-109, 35-81-102, C.R.S.

*REQUEST:* The Department requests an appropriation of \$2,642,373 total funds, including \$2,059,956 General Fund, \$405,157 cash funds, \$177,260 federal funds, and 18.4 FTE.

#### CONSERVATION SERVICES DIVISION

## (5) COLORADO STATE FAIR

The Colorado State Fair Authority is administered by an eleven-member Board of Commissioners and is primarily responsible for putting on the eleven-day State Fair event held each August. Much of the funding for this division comes from the revenue collected during the annual fair event and from non-fair events held at the fairgrounds during the rest of the year. The Fair also receives funding from a variety of other sources including: the city and county of Pueblo, various small grants, and 25.0 percent of the interest earned on the sale of unclaimed securities (HB 08-1399, Buescher/Isgar).

## DECISION ITEMS – COLORADO STATE FAIR

#### → R-04 State Fair Spending Authority Increase

*REQUEST:* The Department requests an increase of \$647,281 in cash fund spending authority from the Colorado State Fair Authority Cash Fund in FY 2022-23 and beyond.

#### RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the Committee approve the Department's request.

*ANALYSIS:* The annual event that is now the Colorado State Fair began before Colorado was a state and even before Pueblo was incorporated as a municipality with the first recorded event occurring in 1872. Facilities at the State Fair can be rented throughout the year and host a variety of exhibitions and activities such as consumer shows, conventions, conferences, live shows, livestock exhibitions, and sporting events, among others. The Fair itself has been held annually in Pueblo every year since its inception with the exception of 1917, when the grounds were utilized by the Army National Guard preparing service-members for deployment during World War I. The current site of the State Fair has been its home since 1901. The General Assembly became involved with the state fair for the first time in 1888, when it designated Pueblo the permanent location of the fair. In 1903 the fair received its first state appropriation to pay agricultural and horticultural premiums. From 1983 to 1997, the Colorado State Fair Authority was designated as a corporate body and political subdivision of Colorado and was not subject to administrative direction by the State. In 1997, the Authority was abolished, recreated, and transferred to the Department of Agriculture.

The State Fairgrounds reside on approximately 100 acres with over 50 separate buildings and facilities. While there are some exceptions, most notably the Event Center that opened in 1995, most of these facilities are over 50 years old. There are a total of 450 stables available at the fairgrounds. The 200 stone stables were built in 1938 and the wood stables were built in 1968. The 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) dormitories were built in 1938 and underwent renovations with funds provided by the Authority and the Colorado State Fair Foundation (CSFF) in FY 2015-16.

Many buildings and about half of the total acreage of the Fairgrounds are included in the State Historic Registry. These buildings were nominated for and placed on the registry in 2006. The Colorado State Fairgrounds Historic District encompasses buildings build between 1901 and 1965, beginning with when the Fairgrounds were first opened and continuing through the period when the majority of improvements were focused on agriculturally oriented activities.

Many of the events held during the 11-day Fair provide youth enrolled in 4-H and FFA programs the opportunity to compete against one another and highlight the state's best livestock, equine, and horticulture exhibits. It also entertains attendees with rodeos, concerts, livestock horse shows, and carnival rides and games.

The State Fair is managed by the State Fair Board Authority whose responsibility is to direct, supervise, and operate the state-owned asset in a fiscally effective and efficient manner to (a) host the Colorado State Fair and Industrial Exposition, and (b) manage the fairgrounds to provide a year-round, multi-use facility to serve local, regional, and state needs. The State Fair also receives oversight from the Commissioner of Agriculture.

State funding for the State Fair includes a mix of General Fund, Marijuana Tax Cash Fund, and revenues from ticket sales, rent from concessionaires and vendors, entry fees, sponsorships, and facility rentals (deposited in the State Fair Authority Cash Fund). A treemap of the appropriation as outlined in the FY 2021-22 Long Bill can be seen below. Funding for the division has been relatively stable over the last five years, fluctuating between \$9.8 million to \$10.2 million since FY 2017-18. NOTE: The treemap below does not include capital construction projects. The majority of minor increases in the budget over time are from statewide salary survey adjustments. While these increases help support the State Fair in maintaining full-time regular employees (currently 19.6 FTE), the adjustments do not include funding for temporary employees paid hourly wages.



#### State Fair Appropriations in the FY 2021-22 Long Bill

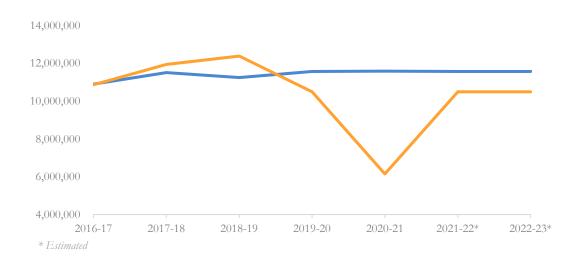
Through a FY 2019-20 performance audit, the Office of the State Auditor made a number of recommendations to improve the operation and success of the State Fair. One of these recommendations (3C) suggested that the State Fair Authority include in its strategic plan a strategy to obtain enterprise status, which will require the fair to receive no more than 10 percent of its annual revenue from combined state and local government sources (currently at 40 percent).

First he Department seeks to move towards obtaining enterprise status as outlined in the FY 2019-20 performance audit. To do this the Department is requesting \$320,000 in cash fund spending authority to attract more popular national acts to the fair as well as host and promote an ongoing home show in the spring. The Department hopes that the increased revenue from increased ticket sales will surpass the increased costs, and that increasing revenue will move the State Fair closer to enterprise status.

Secondly the Department is requesting an increase of \$197,789 in cash fund spending authority to address the rising costs of temporary labor for events. The State Fair hires approximately 600 people each year during fair time for ticket sales, security, event set up, etc. While the passage of Amendment 70 raised the minimum wage in Colorado to \$12 per hour by January 2020 the average hourly rate for State Fair temporary workers was \$17.51 for the 2019 State Fair, which was up from \$14.07 in 2017.

Finally the Department is requesting an increase of \$129,452 in cash fund spending authority to address ongoing facility maintenance. The State Fair Facility Maintenance line within the Long Bill has had a \$300,000 General Fund appropriation since FY 2016-17. Similar to labor costs, maintenance costs have been rising in recent years, which has been exacerbated by supply chain issues throughout the COVID pandemic. For example, at the end of FY 2019-20 the State Fair received an insurance payment of \$149,300 to replace the roof on the grandstand, which was damaged by a windstorm. During FY 2020-21 the State Fair issued a request for proposal to complete this project; however, the estimate to replace the roof had increased to \$220,000 (a 47.4 percent increase).

The Colorado State Fair Authority Cash fund, created in Section 35-65-107, C.R.S., is comprised of revenue from tickets to events, concessions, commercial space rental, concert revenue, etc from the State Fairgrounds, as well as 25 percent of interest earned on the Unclaimed Property Tourism Promotion Trust Fund created in Section 38-13-801.5 C.R.S. A chart depicting the State Fair Cash Fund's revenues and expenditures is included below.

*EVIDENCE BASED POLICY:* The Department indicates that funding is for the implementation of a theory-informed program as defined in S.B. 21-284 (Evidence-based evaluation for budget). The Department indicates the measure of success will be whether the State Fair reduces its reliance on state funds and increases revenue, moving it closer to enterprise status. Based on JBC staff analysis and pursuant to S.B. 21-284, assignment of a level of evidence is not applicable to this budget request.

#### Staff recommends **continuing and modifying** the following footnote:

1 Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Markets Division, Agricultural Markets, Agriculture Workforce Development Program -- This appropriation remains available for expenditure until the close of the <del>2021-22</del> 2023-24 state fiscal year.

**COMMENT:** This footnote explains legislative intent.

Staff recommends **continuing** the following footnote:

2 Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Markets Division, Agricultural Markets, Agriculture Workforce Development Program -- \$64,108 General Fund of this appropriation is designated to be used for purposes of the Workforce Development Program.

**COMMENT:** This footnote explains the legislative intent that the funding for the Adult Agriculture Leadership Grant Program and the Agriculture Workforce Development Program be kept separate after the programs were merged into one line item in FY 2021-22.

Staff recommends **adding** the following footnote:

<u>N3</u> Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Services, Conservation Services Division-- \$385,000 cash funds of this appropriation remains available for expenditure until the close of the 2023-24 state fiscal year.

**COMMENT:** This aligns with approval of the R5 decision item to drill new water quality monitoring wells in the San Luis Valley. The department anticipates that the construction of these wells will take place over two fiscal years.

#### REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION

Staff recommends continuing and **CONTINUING AND MODIFYING** the following request for information:

1 Department of Agriculture, Colorado State Fair, State Fair Facilities Maintenance – The Department is requested to provide on November 1, <del>2021</del> 2022 a report on facility maintenance projects for the Colorado State Fairgrounds. This report should include the following for each facility with planned maintenance: facility name, the type and nature of maintenance, the anticipated cost of the maintenance, the expenditures to-date on the maintenance, and the anticipated completion date.

**COMMENT:** This request will provide the Department's planned facility maintenance at the Colorado State Fairgrounds and will aid in the Committee's oversight of the Authority. The information will allow for greater accuracy in planning future appropriations for this purpose.
