






CMU Retention & Graduation Rates





Percent Pell-Eligible Students, by Institution




Federal Pell Grants are awarded to students on the basis of financial need and do not have to be repaid.



CONCERNING THE CREATION OF AN OUTCOMES-BASED FUNDING MODEL FOR HIGHER EDUCATION, AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, MAKING AND REDUCING APPROPRIATIONS.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add part 3 to article 18 of title 23 as follows:

PART 3 HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING

23-18-301. Legislative declaration. (1) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Capital letters indicate new material added to existing statutes; dashes through words indicate deletions from existing statutes and such material not part of act.

HB 14-1319

- (a) Institutional mission. ROLE AND MISSION FUNDING MUST INCLUDE AN AMOUNT FOR EACH GOVERNING BOARD TO OFFSET THE COSTS INCURRED IN PROVIDING UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS AT EACH INSTITUTION. IN ESTABLISHING THE COMPONENTS OF THIS FACTOR, THE COMMISSION SHALL INCLUDE, AT A MINIMUM:
 - (I) THE SELECTIVITY OF THE INSTITUTION:
 - (II) THE NUMBER OF CAMPUSES OF THE INSTITUTION;
 - (III) THE RURAL OR URBAN LOCATION OF THE INSTITUTION;
- (b) Support services for Pell-eligible, first-generation, and underserved undergraduate students. Role and mission funding must include an amount for each governing board to offset the costs incurred in providing additional support services to Pell-eligible undergraduate students enrolled in the institution. The amount of funding for support services for each Pell-eligible undergraduate student enrolled in the institution must be at least equal to ten percent of the amount of the college opportunity fund stipend, as set by the general assembly pursuant to section 23-18-202, for the applicable state fiscal year. The commission may include an amount for each governing board to offset the costs incurred in providing support services to first-generation undergraduate students enrolled in the institution after the commission establishes in consultation with the institutions a consistent definition and data collection


