




Housing: Improve Contracting Process (slide 1 of 2)



Our Goal

Reduce the median processing time to execute housing development loans and grants contracts from **240 days** to within **120 days** by December 31, 2023 and within **90 days** by June 30, 2024.








Building Resilient Communities: Energy Savings (Slide 1 of 3)






Funds Remaining as of December 2023







Request	Amount	Description
Continuation of HB 19-1009 Voucher Program	\$999,479	DOLA seeks continued funding to prevent homelessness and support addiction treatment for Coloradans beyond FY 2023-2024.
Executive Director Office IT Business Product Manager	\$97,247	Requesting a Business Product Manager to manage IT system developments and replacements, vital for departmental effectiveness.
State Demography Office Statistical Analyst	\$113,935	Requesting an additional analyst and a data subscription to strengthen housing data capabilities, vital for informed decisions and advancing equity.
Defense Counsel on First Appearance Grant Program Reduction	-(\$500,000)	Proposing a \$500,000 reduction from the General Fund for the DCFA Grant Program, which provides grants to Colorado municipal courts for defense counsel costs at defendants' first appearances.
Property Tax Exemption Filing Fees Adjustment	\$O	Requesting a fee increase to sustain the Property Tax Exemptions Program due to escalating operational costs, without needing extra appropriations.
DPA Capital Construction: Decentralize Fort Lyon Building Heating	\$13,494,113	Upgrading heating at Fort Lyon by installing individual hot water boilers in five main buildings. Current central steam system inefficient and costly.







- Division of Housing funds 13% of capital stack.

Special Session Implementation: SB23B-001



The Division of Local Government provided statewide guidance.

- 99% local governments finalized their budgets and mill levy submission by January 10.
- January 15, 2024 draft equitable backfill methodology due to DOLA Executive Director and is onn track.
- April 15, 2024 backfill warrantsdeadline.

Emergency Rental Assistance



Since 2021, we have served **44,000 households**, across all **64 counties** in Colorado.

Currently, on average DOLA is assisting **201 cases a week**, totaling **\$471,475**.

We have contracts with two non-profit organizations

- La Puente Home, Inc.



Impact of Emergency Rental Assistance Two





Special Session Implementation: House Bill 23B-1001 Rental Assistance



\$30 million in Temporary Rental Assistance Grant

Will help approximately **3,800 Colorado households** that are past-due on rent stay in their homes.

- Request for Applications published on November 29, 2023
- Request for Applications Closed December 18, 2023
- Five nonprofits selected December 29, 2023
 - o Brothers Redevelopment, Inc.
 - Community Economic Defense Project
 - La Puente Home, Inc.
 - Neighbor to Neighbor
 - Total Concept
- Funds must be expended by June 30, 2024
- Applications will start in February 2024



Rapid Rehousing	Awarded 25 applicants totaling \$1.14 million.

Proposition 123 - Update on Division of Housing Programs (Slide 3 of 3)



Homelessness Programs - \$28.8 million for Fiscal Year 2023-2024

Homeless Prevention	Awarded 20 applicants totaling \$1.31 million.
Emergency Shelter	Awarded 56 applicants totaling \$4.53 million.
Supportive Services	Notice of funding availability released November 22, 2023 for \$2.5 million.

Proposition 123 - The Division of Local Government Program Update



Local Planning Capacity Grant Program - \$3.2 million for FY 2023-2024

- Extensive statewide technical assistance has been provided and will continue.
- Local Planning Capacity Grants: Division of Local Government received 34 Letters of Intent requesting over \$3 million in funds, and invited 31 to submit a formal application for a local planning capacity grants.
- Approximately \$3 million is available in FY 2024 and \$6 million in FY 2025.
- The next funding cycle will open in late spring 2024. Financial need and geographic diversity will be a consideration.
