# E470 Background

- 47-mile all-electronic public toll road
- 1991 Opened first segment (south)
- 2003 Opened last segment (north)
- 2009 Conversion to all electronic tolling (AET)
- User-financed: **NOT TAX FUNDED**
- \$1.3 billion in outstanding bond debt
- Current Annual debt payments \$100 million
- Scheduled to be paid off in 2041
- Also manage tolling services for CO facilities





# Reducing Tolls and Eliminating Fees

#### Elimination of Fees

- Highway Expansion Fees (2017)
- Vehicle Registration Fees (2018)

#### Toll Rate Reductions and Adjustments

- Toll Plaza C reduced (2018)
- ExpressToll® toll rates frozen (2018-2021 4 Years)
- Reduced 3+ Axle ExpressToll® rates (2020-2021)
- License Plate Toll® rates frozen (2020-2021)
- Considering future toll rates for 2022 and beyond




# Financially Sound - Regional E470 Participant

- Strategic and Work Plan
  - Regional public partner in transportation
  - Projects Policy facilitating transportation projects
  - Funding capital needs with NO new debt planned
- Not financially distressed (even with pandemic and temporary) traffic downturn)
  - Ratings history of upgrades recent affirmations of "A" rating
  - **Debt Plan** Approved Board debt management plan and financial goals to continue to reduce debt service profile over term.
    - No new debt issuances/add debt amounts
    - No extension of debt past the current maturity (September 2041)
    - Continue to build reserves to pay off debt early
    - Maintain sufficient financial metrics including covenant ratios and reserves for entire capital program and rainy-day events
  - Able to satisfy all obligations short and long-term with current financial plan with sufficient cash reserves



## **Traffic Trends 2019 - 2021**



#### **Percentages Through June:**

- 18.5% over 2020
- 22.3% under 2019



### **Master Plan**

- Expected to double number of vehicles per day by 2040
- Adopted in 2018; updated in June 2020
- Level of Service Study
  - Roadway widening
  - Interchange improvements and additions
- Continued maintenance improvements
  - Paving, lighting, signing, safety devices, etc.
- Regional and jurisdiction input into the plan and updates in 2020
- Accommodate growth and improve safety
- Implement mobility solutions
- Plan identified more than \$1.5 billion in capital, infrastructure, and improvements between 2020-2040
- Ongoing evaluation of cost estimates and timing for Master Plan projects (budget)








# **Completed Roadway Projects**

**COMPLETE**: Quincy Avenue to I-70 (~8 miles)

- \$99 million self-funded project
- Added travel lanes and widened bridges (6 lanes); graded for 8 lanes
- 6-mile extension of High Plains Trail

**COMPLETE**: Quincy ramp/Gun Club intersection improvements

- Cooperation and funding with Aurora and Arapahoe County
- Relocated E-470 ramps to improve traffic flow and congestion at intersection






# **Next Roadway Widening Project**

#### **NEXT PHASE:** I-70 to 104<sup>th</sup> Ave (11 miles)

- Widening to 3 lanes each direction; bridges for ultimate build out of 4 lanes; connect local trails
- Design in 2021; Construction anticipated 2022-2024 (3 Years)
- Interchange/Toll Plaza Scope:
  - 38<sup>th</sup> Ave New Interchange
  - 64<sup>th</sup> Ave Expansion
  - Pena Blvd Expansion
  - 88<sup>th</sup> Ave New Interchange (pending)
  - 48<sup>th</sup> Ave New Interchange (pending)
  - Toll Plaza C & D Reconfiguration
- Total project budget \$150M over 3 years
- Plan to fund from CIF unrestricted funds (no new debt will be issued)

# **Potential Legislation**

Recently passed **SB21-257** exempting Special Mobile Machinery from license plates.

- Working with sponsors to identify quantity and types of vehicles as well as options to address tolling concerns.
- License plated vehicles without ExpressToll account will not be tolled (cannot identify).
- Toll revenue is primary source to operate, maintain, and improve roadway.
  - Do not receive federal, state, local funding or taxpayer dollars.
