CONCERNING THE RECOGNITION AND HONORING OF

WHEREAS, Women have courageously served the United States in military roles since the founding of our nation, dating back to the American Revolutionary War in 1775 when women served as nurses, spies, and couriers and in defense roles alongside the Continental Army; and

WHEREAS, Throughout every major national and global conflict, including the Civil War, World War I, World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Gulf War, the Global War on Terror, and ongoing missions around the world, women have answered the call to serve with honor, sacrifice, and unwavering patriotism; and

WHEREAS, Women formally became permanent members of the United States Armed Forces with the passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act of 1948, paving the way for expanded leadership, responsibility, and recognition within the military; and

WHEREAS, Women have served with distinction across all branches of the United States Armed Forces, including the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Space Force, Coast Guard, Reserves, and National Guard, contributing critical skills, leadership, innovation, operational excellence, and a warrior spirit; and

WHEREAS, Women have served the United States Armed Forces in many specialities, including as pilots, sailors, infantry leaders, intelligence specialists, doctors, medics, engineers, cyber operators, scientists, and builders, and, by 2016, all military positions were open to women, reflecting their proven capability, resilience, and commitment to mission success; and

WHEREAS, The establishment of the United States Space Force in 2019 further expanded opportunities for women to lead and protect our nation in emerging and highly technical domains critical to national security; and

WHEREAS, Women veterans and service members have endured extraordinary sacrifices, including time away from family, physical and emotional hardship, and the lasting impacts of service, all while strengthening the readiness, effectiveness, and moral foundation of the United States Armed Forces; and

WHEREAS, The contributions of women in uniform have not only defended freedom and democracy at home and abroad but have also inspired future generations of women to serve their country with strength, confidence, courage, and honor; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-fifth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

(1) That we honor and recognize our brave and honorable women veterans and women currently serving in the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Space Force, Coast Guard, Reserves, and National Guard for their historic and ongoing contributions to the security and freedom of the United States; and




