Fiscal note status: The final fiscal note reflects the introduced bill. This bill was postponed indefinitely by Senate Local Government and Housing Committee on February 25, 2026; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.

Summary Information

Overview. The bill would have clarified the regulatory authority of the state and local governments over unmanned aircraft systems.

Types of impacts. The bill was projected to affect the following areas on an ongoing basis:

- Minimal State Workload
- Local Government

Appropriations. No appropriation was required.

Summary of Legislation

The bill creates the “Unmanned Aircraft Systems Rights and Authorities Act,” which clarifies the regulatory authority of the state and local governments over unmanned aircraft systems (drones). The bill prohibits the state and local governments from requiring that individuals register a drone, other than what is mandated in federal law. State and local governments are authorized to regulate drones used by or for their agencies, as well as drones launching from or landing on state or local government property.

State Expenditures

Workload may increase for state agencies to review existing or develop new regulations regarding use of drones. Because state agencies currently operate drones in compliance with state and federal laws, and existing regulations limiting drone use on state property do not conflict with the bill, any impact is expected to be minimal.

Local Government

Legal and administrative costs may increase for certain local governments to review, amend, or repeal existing regulations regarding drone use systems that are not compatible with the bill.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed, and applies to acts, ordinances, resolutions, and rules made on or after the effective date.
