Summary Information

Overview. The bill requires a minor to have written permission from a parent or legal guardian to obtain an instruction permit to drive a motorcycle.

Types of impacts. The bill is projected to affect the following areas on an ongoing basis:

Summary of Legislation

The bill requires a minor to have written permission from a parent or legal guardian to obtain an instruction permit to drive a motorcycle. This requirement does not apply to emancipated minors.

Comparable Crime Analysis

Legislative Council Staff is required to include certain analysis in the fiscal note for any bill that creates a new crime, or that either reclassifies or creates a new factual basis for an existing crime. This section identifies comparable crimes and discusses assumptions on future conviction rates resulting from the bill.

Prior Conviction Data and Assumptions

This bill creates a new factual basis for the existing class A traffic infraction of violating state laws on instruction permits by making it a violation for a minor to obtain an instruction permit for a motorcycle without receiving written permission from a parent or guardian. From FY 2022-23 to FY 2024-25, 1,057 offenders have been sentenced and convicted for this offense. Of those, 692 were male, 364 were female, and in one instance the gender was unknown.

Demographically, 818 were White, 71 were Black/African American, 112 were Hispanic, 8 were Asian, 4 were American Indian, 20 were classified as other, and 24 didn't have a race identified.

The fiscal note assumes that minors will comply with the law and that there will be few additional traffic infractions under the bill. Because the bill is not expected to have a tangible impact on criminal justice-related revenue or expenditures at the state or local levels, these potential impacts are not discussed further in this fiscal note. State Expenditures

The bill requires the Department of Revenue (DOR) to conduct programming to include the new written-permission requirement in the DRIVES system. The DOR can absorb this programming workload with existing resources.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on May 26, 2026, and takes effect on August 12, 2026, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
