

AMPLIFY Act: Digital Soul Property Recognition

Legislating Drafter Working Package — 33-bill modular AMPLIFY build

Legislating drafter file. This chapter draft is designed to stand on its own and to support modular insertion into broader AMPLIFY stacks.

Bill 1. AMPLIFY Act: Digital Soul Property Recognition

Single subject. Recognition and construction of protected resident digital interests as legally cognizable intangible personal property and protected identity interests.

Purpose. Establish the core resident property and sovereignty framework for digital identity, likeness, behavioral exhaust, and derived inferences.

Draft structure

Section	Core draft direction
1. Short title	This act shall be known and may be cited as the “AMPLIFY Act: Digital Soul Property Recognition”.
2. Legislative declaration	The general assembly finds and declares that establish the core resident property and sovereignty framework for digital identity, likeness, behavioral exhaust, and derived inferences.
3. Definitions	Definitions should be alphabetized, lowercase, and drafted in singular form unless a term of art requires otherwise.
4. Operative sections	Substantive rights, duties, approvals, or restrictions listed below.
5. Administration	Rulemaking, designation of administering authority, records, notices, and implementation mechanics.
6. Construction	Independent operation, severability, no implied repeal, and other necessary construction clauses.
7. Effective date	Effective date and any conditional clause required by filing strategy.

Draft definitions

digital soul. the protected bundle of identity-linked biometric, behavioral, derived, and identifying information attributable to a resident.

covered operator. a person or entity that collects, infers, stores, transfers, licenses, or commercializes covered digital soul material.

commercial benefit. direct or indirect monetary, operational, strategic, or training advantage derived from covered digital soul material.

objective anonymization. a state in which data cannot reasonably be used, alone or in combination, to identify, profile, or reconstitute a resident.

Draft operative provisions

Section 4. Recognition of protected interest

- A resident has a protected legal interest in the resident's digital soul, including the resident's biometric identifiers, voice, likeness, behavioral patterns, derived profiles, and associated inferences, to the maximum extent permitted by law.
- The protected interest recognized by this article is inalienable except where a resident grants a specific, revocable, and verifiable authorization under a separate lawfully recognized consent framework.
- A contract term that purports to waive the core protected status of a resident's digital soul is contrary to public policy to the extent it defeats the minimum protections established by this act.

Section 5. Construction and scope

- This act shall be construed liberally in favor of preserving resident control over identity-linked digital material and narrowly against evasive construction that fragments or relabels such material to defeat coverage.
- Commercial exploitation, training use, profiling use, and synthetic or derivative use shall not escape coverage merely because the operator uses transformed, inferred, vectorized, tokenized, or otherwise reformatted representations.

Section 6. Resident baseline rights

- A resident has the right to receive a plain-language statement of the categories of protected material held or attributed to the resident by a covered operator.
- A resident has the right to object to unauthorized commercial exploitation, derivative identity generation, or materially misleading attribution involving the resident's digital soul.
- A resident may pursue any remedies separately authorized by law or companion acts.

Section 7. Construction against circumvention

- A covered operator may not avoid this act by fragmentation across affiliates, by reclassification as deidentified data where objective anonymization has not been achieved, or by using intermediary vendors to perform substantially the same covered acts.

Required construction clauses

- Independent operation. This act operates independently and remains effective whether or not any related measure or companion act is adopted.
- Severability. If any provision of this act or its application is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application.
- Single-subject construction. This act shall be construed to embrace only the single subject described in its title and no separate subject shall be inferred from a remedy, definition, recordkeeping duty, funding mechanism, or construction clause that is necessarily and properly connected to that subject.
