 - Residential waitlists

Current Trends - Opioids

- Opioid admissions (heroin and prescription drugs) have increased 540% since 2008.
- Prescription drug admissions are declining, and heroin use is increasing.
 - 29% decrease in prescription painkiller admissions, over the last 12 months.

- SB202 funding
- Increased public awareness
- Private insurance parity
- SB1351 study




Challenges and Gaps

- Highly regulated and underfunded, even for priority populations
 - Pregnant and post-partum women
 - Justice-involved men and women
- Workforce shortages
 - 22 vacant clinical positions
 - 50% staff turnover rate



Challenges and Gaps

"The field is experiencing high turnover rates, worker shortages, inadequate compensation, and insufficient training especially for trauma-informed care, medication assisted treatment, and treatment for adolescents. Workforce vacancies for master's level clinicians, counselors and social workers; nurses; peer support specialists; and mobile crisis staff all contribute to many of the service gaps identified by stakeholders across the regions."



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Policy Recommendations

- Statewide solution to expand workforce
 - Tuition assistance
 - Loan forgiveness
 - Training
- Funding models that cover the true cost of services
- Support patient-centered programs, based on readiness to change
