LAD's legacy has amplified Latino voices across the state of Colorado to speak on the structural inequities that have historically plagued their communities. Their voices have been critical in advancing policies to improve the lives and economic well-being of current and future generations of all Coloradans; and

WHEREAS, Latinos are a key part of Colorado's constituency, with communities hailing from Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean, and South America. Latinos have persevered through adverse experiences, making their presence revolutionary in itself. Their organizing efforts have played a crucial role in building momentum across various spectrums and all segments of society as educators, artists, community organizers, healthcare workers, elected officials, small business owners, and farmers, among the many lives that contribute to our vibrant and diverse Colorado communities; and


WHEREAS, Engaging Latinos in the political process ensures that the voices and lived experiences of all Coloradans are respected and honored, and helps create policies that impact the daily lives of people in their communities across the state; now, therefore,


Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:




