**Current Appropriations Clause in Bill**

The bill neither requires nor contains an appropriation clause for FY 2016-17.

**Points to Consider**

*Future Fiscal Impact*

This bill will reduce future General Fund revenues by a total of \$90.0 million. As detailed in Table 1 on page 2 of the attached Legislative Council Staff Fiscal Note, \$1.5 million of this revenue reduction will occur in FY 2017-18, with the remaining \$88.5 million revenue reduction occurring from FY 2018-19 through FY 2029-30. The March 2016 Legislative Council Staff revenue forecast projects a \$246.1 million TABOR refund for FY 2017-18. TABOR refunds are paid out of the General Fund, so this bill is projected to have a net \$0 General Fund impact in FY 2017-18. However, the bill will reduce the amount of General Fund available for other purposes in any subsequent fiscal years in which the State does not collect money above the TABOR limit.
