# SENATE MEMORIAL 17-002

101 CONCERNING MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO HOLD THE UNITED
 102 STATES DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS ACCOUNTABLE.

1 WHEREAS, Colorado is home to more than 400,000 veterans; and WHEREAS, The United States Department of Veterans Affairs 2 3 (VA) spent more than \$3.5 billion on health care and benefits for 4 Colorado veterans in 2015; and 5 WHEREAS, Two years ago Congress and the VA implemented a 6 \$16 billion program to drastically decrease the amount of time veterans 7 wait for health care, yet today veterans wait longer than ever to see a 8 provider; and 9 WHEREAS, The VA is having trouble attracting doctors--a recent survey showed that only 1.9 to 2.5 percent of physicians found 10 11 government or military employment a desirable practice setting; and 12 WHEREAS, The shortage of providers and subsequent lack of 13 care is reflected in the fact that the rate of suicide is 21 percent higher for 14 veterans and has increased by 32 percent since 2001; and

- 1 WHEREAS, On average, 20 veterans commit suicide every day; 2 and
- WHEREAS, Until recently, the VA was treating chronic pain almost exclusively with opioids, resulting in an addiction and fatal overdose rate among veterans that is almost double the national average; and
- WHEREAS, All America's veterans have unique needs, and the
  VA should refocus its work and prioritize veterans with
  service-connected disabilities and specialized needs; and
- WHEREAS, The VA has repeatedly come under fire from veterans
   groups and lawmakers for its failure to punish corrupt employees and
   address the systemwide failure that has resulted in false, misleading wait
   times and serious medical care issues; and
- WHEREAS, Two measures to hold the VA accountable for its
  egregious lack of service to and neglect of the nation's veterans passed
  unanimously out of the United States House of Representatives but
  remain stalled in the Senate; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Congress must act to hold all VA employees19 responsible, particularly those in leadership roles; and
- WHEREAS, Documented cases of whistleblower retaliation
  continue to plague the VA, exposing the harassment and attempted
  bribery of former VA employees who have brought the department's
  failures to light; and
- WHEREAS, The VA needs much stronger whistleblower protections, as ideas for systemwide change and reform need to come from within and those who expose abuse and waste should be protected; and
- WHEREAS, As the demographics of America's veterans rapidly change, their system of care needs to change as well to ensure high-quality, consistent health care and benefits for all veterans; now, therefore,
- 32 Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Seventy-first General Assembly

### 1 of the State of Colorado:

That we, the members of the Senate, in recognition of the need to hold the United States Department of Veterans Affairs accountable for the health care of our nation's veterans, declare that the United States Congress must pass reforms that prioritize our country's service men and women over bureaucracy to ensure that those who risked everything for our country receive the best care possible.
