A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 **CONCERNING MEASURES TO PREVENT OPIOID MISUSE IN COLORADO,**
102 **AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.**

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. Opioid and Other Substance Use Disorders Interim Study Committee. **Section 1** of the bill establishes in statute the opioid and other substance use disorders study committee, consisting of 5 senators and 5 representatives from the general assembly, to:

- ! Study data and statistics on the scope of the substance use disorder problem in Colorado;

- ! Study current prevention, intervention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery resources available to Coloradans, as well as public and private insurance coverage and other sources of support for treatment and recovery resources;
- ! Review the availability of medication-assisted treatment and the ability of pharmacists to prescribe those medications;
- ! Examine measures that other states and countries use to address substance use disorders;
- ! Identify the gaps in prevention, intervention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery resources available to Coloradans and hurdles to accessing those resources; and
- ! Identify possible legislative options to address gaps and hurdles to accessing prevention, intervention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery resources.

The committee is authorized to meet 6 times in a calendar year and may report up to 6 legislative measures to the legislative council, which bills are exempt from bill limitations and introduction deadlines. The committee is repealed on July 1, 2020.

Section 2 specifies school-based health care centers may apply for grants from the school-based health center grant program to expand behavioral health services to include treatment for opioid and other substance use disorders.

Section 3 directs the department of health care policy and financing, starting July 1, 2018, to award grants to organizations to operate a substance abuse screening, brief intervention, and referral program.

Section 4 directs the center for research into substance use disorder prevention, treatment, and recovery to develop and implement continuing medical education activities to help prescribers of pain medication to safely and effectively manage patients with chronic pain, and when appropriate, prescribe opioids. Sections 2 through 4 also direct the general assembly to appropriate money to implement those sections.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** article 22.3 to
 3 title 10 as follows:

4 **ARTICLE 22.3**

5 **Opioid and Other Substance Use Disorders Study Committee**

6 **10-22.3-101. Opioid and other substance use disorders study**

1 **committee - creation - members - purposes.** (1)(a) NOTWITHSTANDING
2 SECTION 2-3-303.3, THERE IS HEREBY CREATED THE OPIOID AND OTHER
3 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS STUDY COMMITTEE. THE COMMITTEE
4 CONSISTS OF TEN MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY APPOINTED ON OR
5 BEFORE JUNE 1, 2018, AS FOLLOWS:

6 (I) FIVE MEMBERS OF THE SENATE, WITH THREE MEMBERS
7 APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND TWO MEMBERS
8 APPOINTED BY THE MINORITY LEADER OF THE SENATE; AND

9 (II) FIVE MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, WITH
10 THREE MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF
11 REPRESENTATIVES AND TWO MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE MINORITY
12 LEADER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

13 (b) THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES SHALL
14 APPOINT THE CHAIR OF THE COMMITTEE IN EVEN-NUMBERED YEARS AND
15 THE VICE-CHAIR IN ODD-NUMBERED YEARS, AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE
16 SENATE SHALL APPOINT THE CHAIR OF THE COMMITTEE IN ODD-NUMBERED
17 YEARS AND THE VICE-CHAIR IN EVEN-NUMBERED YEARS.

18 (2) THE COMMITTEE SHALL:

19 (a) STUDY DATA AND STATISTICS ON THE SCOPE OF THE
20 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER PROBLEM IN COLORADO, INCLUDING TRENDS IN
21 RATES OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE, TREATMENT ADMISSIONS, AND DEATHS FROM
22 SUBSTANCE USE;

23 (b) STUDY THE CURRENT PREVENTION, INTERVENTION, HARM
24 REDUCTION, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY RESOURCES, INCLUDING
25 SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION OUTREACH AND EDUCATION, AVAILABLE
26 TO COLORADANS, AS WELL AS PUBLIC AND PRIVATE INSURANCE COVERAGE
27 AND OTHER SOURCES OF SUPPORT FOR TREATMENT AND RECOVERY

1 RESOURCES;

2 (c) REVIEW THE AVAILABILITY OF MEDICATION-ASSISTED
3 TREATMENT AND WHETHER PHARMACISTS CAN PRESCRIBE THOSE
4 MEDICATIONS THROUGH THE DEVELOPMENT OF COLLABORATIVE
5 PHARMACY PRACTICE AGREEMENTS WITH PHYSICIANS;

6 (d) EXAMINE THE MEASURES THAT OTHER STATES AND COUNTRIES
7 USE TO ADDRESS SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS, INCLUDING
8 EVIDENCE-BASED BEST PRACTICES AND THE USE OF EVIDENCE IN
9 DETERMINING STRATEGIES TO TREAT SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS, AND
10 BEST PRACTICES ON THE USE OF PRESCRIPTION DRUG MONITORING
11 PROGRAMS;

12 (e) IDENTIFY THE GAPS IN PREVENTION, INTERVENTION, HARM
13 REDUCTION, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO
14 COLORADANS AND HURDLES TO ACCESSING THOSE RESOURCES; AND

15 (f) IDENTIFY POSSIBLE LEGISLATIVE OPTIONS TO ADDRESS GAPS
16 AND HURDLES TO ACCESSING PREVENTION, INTERVENTION, HARM
17 REDUCTION, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY RESOURCES.

18 (3) (a) THE COMMITTEE SHALL MEET AS NECESSARY UP TO SIX
19 TIMES PER CALENDAR YEAR DURING ANY LEGISLATIVE SESSION OR ANY
20 INTERIM BETWEEN LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS. THE COMMITTEE MAY
21 INTRODUCE UP TO A TOTAL OF SIX BILLS IN EACH OF THE 2019 AND 2020
22 LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS. BILLS THAT THE COMMITTEE INTRODUCES ARE
23 EXEMPT FROM THE FIVE-BILL LIMITATION SPECIFIED IN RULE 24 (b)(1)(A)
24 OF THE JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

25 (b) NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 1, 2018, AND NO LATER THAN
26 EACH NOVEMBER 1 THEREAFTER, THE COMMITTEE SHALL MAKE A REPORT
27 TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CREATED IN SECTION 2-3-301 THAT MAY

1 INCLUDE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR LEGISLATION.

2 (4) (a) MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ARE ENTITLED TO RECEIVE
3 THE USUAL PER DIEM AND NECESSARY TRAVEL AND SUBSISTENCE
4 EXPENSES AS PROVIDED PURSUANT TO SECTION 2-2-307 FOR MEMBERS OF
5 THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY WHO ATTEND INTERIM COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

6 (b) THE DIRECTOR OF RESEARCH OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL
7 AND THE DIRECTOR OF THE OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE LEGAL SERVICES SHALL
8 PROVIDE STAFF ASSISTANCE TO THE COMMITTEE.

9 **10-22.3-102. Repeal of article.** THIS ARTICLE 22.3 IS REPEALED,
10 EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2020.

11 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add 10-16-124.8** as
12 follows:

13 **10-16-124.8. Colorado consortium for prescription drug abuse**
14 **prevention - create process for recovery - report.** (1) THE GOVERNOR
15 SHALL DIRECT THE COLORADO CONSORTIUM FOR PRESCRIPTION DRUG
16 ABUSE PREVENTION WITHIN THE UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO TO:

17 (a) CREATE A PROCESS WITH THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE RECOVERY
18 COMMUNITY TO DEVELOP A STRATEGIC PLAN THAT ADDRESSES THE FULL
19 CONTINUUM OF RECOVERY SERVICES, INCLUDING DETOXIFICATION
20 SERVICES AND REINTEGRATION INTO THE COMMUNITY WITH PEER SUPPORT,
21 FOR INDIVIDUALS WHO EXPERIENCE SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER;

22 (b) DEVELOP A DEFINITION FOR RECOVERY RESIDENCES AND ISSUE
23 RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING WHETHER RECOVERY RESIDENCES
24 SHOULD BE LICENSED; AND

25 (c) REPORT THE RECOMMENDATIONS PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION
26 TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2020.

27 (2) MONEY IN THE GENERAL FUND MAY NOT BE USED FOR THE

1 IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS SECTION.

2 **SECTION 3.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-20.5-503, **amend**
3 (2) as follows:

4 **25-20.5-503. School-based health center grant program -**
5 **creation - funding - grants - repeal.** (2) (a) Operators of school-based
6 health centers may apply for grants for the benefit of school-based health
7 centers. The grant program shall provide grants for school-based health
8 centers selected by the division. The division, in consultation with
9 school-based health centers, shall develop criteria under which the grants
10 are distributed and evaluated. In developing the criteria for grants, the
11 division shall give priority to centers that serve a disproportionate number
12 of uninsured children or a low-income population or both and may award
13 grants to establish new school-based health centers; to expand primary
14 health services, behavioral health services, INCLUDING EDUCATION,
15 INTERVENTION, AND PREVENTION SERVICES FOR OPIOID, ALCOHOL, AND
16 MARIJUANA, AND OTHER SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS, or oral health
17 services offered by existing school-based health centers; to expand
18 enrollment in the children's basic health plan; or to provide support for
19 ongoing operations of school-based health centers. None of the grants
20 shall be awarded to provide abortion services in violation of section 50
21 of article V of the state constitution.

22 (b) (I) ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2018, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
23 SHALL APPROPRIATE SEVEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS
24 TO THE DEPARTMENT FROM THE MARIJUANA TAX CASH FUND CREATED IN
25 SECTION 39-28.8-501 FOR THE PURPOSES OF EXPANDING BEHAVIORAL
26 HEALTH THERAPY, INTERVENTION, AND PREVENTION SERVICES FOR OPIOID,
27 ALCOHOL, AND MARIJUANA, AND OTHER SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS

1 PURSUANT TO THIS SUBSECTION (2).

2 (II) THIS SUBSECTION (2)(b) IS REPEALED EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER
3 1, 2019.

4 **SECTION 4.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **amend 25.5-5-208**
5 as follows:

6 **25.5-5-208. Additional services - training - grants - screening,**
7 **brief intervention, and referral - repeal.** (1) On or before June 30,
8 2016, the state department shall grant, through a competitive grant
9 program, up to five hundred thousand dollars to one or more
10 organizations to provide evidence-based training and outreach to health
11 professionals statewide related to screening, brief intervention, and
12 referral to treatment for individuals at risk of substance abuse for whom
13 Colorado provides optional services in accordance with section
14 25.5-5-202 (1)(u). For any fiscal year beginning on or after July 1, 2016,
15 UNTIL THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2018, the state department shall
16 award additional grants for this training and outreach, subject to available
17 appropriations. Any moneys appropriated for grants pursuant to this
18 section are not subject to federal financial participation.

19 (2) (a) ON OR AFTER JULY 1, 2018, THE STATE DEPARTMENT SHALL
20 GRANT, THROUGH A COMPETITIVE GRANT PROGRAM, ONE MILLION TWO
21 HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS TO ONE OR MORE ORGANIZATIONS TO
22 OPERATE A SUBSTANCE ABUSE SCREENING, BRIEF INTERVENTION, AND
23 REFERRAL SCREENING PRACTICE. THE GRANT PROGRAM MUST REQUIRE:

24 (I) TRAINING FOR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS STATEWIDE THAT
25 IS EVIDENCE-BASED AND THAT MAY BE ATTENDED EITHER IN PERSON OR
26 ONLINE. THE TRAINING MUST INCLUDE TRAINING FOR REIMBURSEMENT
27 AND BILLING CODES IN THE "COLORADO MEDICAL ASSISTANCE ACT",

1 ARTICLES 4 TO 6 OF THIS TITLE 25.5.

2 (II) CONSULTATION AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR HEALTH
3 CARE PROVIDERS, HEALTH CARE ORGANIZATIONS, AND STAKEHOLDERS;

4 (III) OUTREACH, COMMUNICATION, AND EDUCATION TO PROVIDERS
5 AND PATIENTS;

6 (IV) COORDINATION WITH PRIMARY CARE, MENTAL HEALTH CARE,
7 INTEGRATED HEALTH CARE, AND SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION,
8 TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY EFFORTS; AND

9 (V) CAMPAIGNING TO INCREASE PUBLIC AWARENESS OF THE RISKS
10 RELATED TO ALCOHOL, MARIJUANA, TOBACCO, AND DRUG USE AND TO
11 REDUCE ANY STIGMA ASSOCIATED WITH TREATMENT.

12 (b) (I) THE STATE DEPARTMENT CONTRACTOR SHALL DEVELOP A
13 PATIENT EDUCATION TOOL FOR WOMEN OF CHILDBEARING AGE TO LEARN
14 ABOUT THE RISKS OF SUBSTANCE-EXPOSED PREGNANCIES, TO BE
15 DEPLOYED FOR PUBLIC USE IN THE STATE.

16 (II) (A) ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2018, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
17 SHALL APPROPRIATE ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS TO
18 THE STATE DEPARTMENT FROM THE MARIJUANA TAX CASH FUND CREATED
19 IN SECTION 39-28.8-501 FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS SUBSECTION (2)(b).

20 (B) THIS SUBSECTION (2)(b)(II) IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE
21 SEPTEMBER 1, 2019.

22 **SECTION 5.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** 26-6.8-107 as
23 follows:

24 **26-6.8-107. Opioid prevention grant pilot program - fund -**
25 **report.** (1) (a) THERE IS CREATED, IN THE TONY GRAMPSAS YOUTH
26 SERVICES PROGRAM, THE CHARLIE HUGHES AND NATHAN GAUNA OPIOID
27 PREVENTION PROGRAM TO IMPROVE YOUNG LIVES, WHICH IS A

1 THREE-YEAR GRANT PILOT PROGRAM, REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION AS
2 THE "PROGRAM", FOR PREVENTING OPIOID USE AMONG THE STATE'S YOUTH
3 POPULATION AND SUPPORTING YOUTH WHOSE FAMILY MEMBERS
4 EXPERIENCE ADDICTION. AN ENTITY THAT RECEIVES A GRANT PURSUANT
5 TO THIS SECTION SHALL APPLY THE GRANT TO ADMINISTER AN
6 EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAM WITH CLEAR METRICS AND BENCHMARKS TO
7 DEVELOP, IMPLEMENT, AND IDENTIFY PROOF POINTS AND BEST PRACTICES
8 FOR PREVENTING OPIOID USE AMONG THE STATE'S YOUTH POPULATION.

9 (b) (I) THE STATE DEPARTMENT SHALL OVERSEE THE GRANT
10 PROCESS, INCLUDING THE PUBLICATION OF THE REQUIREMENTS TO RECEIVE
11 A GRANT, THE REVIEW OF APPLICANTS, AND THE SELECTION OF GRANT
12 RECIPIENTS.

13 (II) IN CHOOSING THE GRANT RECIPIENTS, THE STATE DEPARTMENT
14 SHALL CONSIDER THE NUMBER OF YOUTH TO BE SERVED BY THE
15 APPLICANT, THE GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION OF THE APPLICANT, AND THE
16 DEMONSTRATION OF NEED IN THE GEOGRAPHIC AREA TO BE SERVED. THE
17 STATE DEPARTMENT MAY AWARD A GRANT TO ONE OR MORE, BUT NOT TO
18 EXCEED FIVE, GEOGRAPHICALLY DIVERSE APPLICANTS.

19 (2) THE STATE DEPARTMENT SHALL REQUIRE THAT AN APPLICANT
20 FOR A GRANT THROUGH THE PROGRAM MEET THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:

21 (a) THE APPLICANT SERVES YOUTH FIVE YEARS OF AGE AND OLDER
22 BUT YOUNGER THAN NINETEEN YEARS OF AGE;

23 (b) THE APPLICANT SERVES YOUTH LIVING IN COMMUNITIES
24 EXPERIENCING AN OPIOID CRISIS;

25 (c) THE APPLICANT DEMONSTRATES THAT IT WILL ADMINISTER AN
26 EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAM WITH CLEAR METRICS AND BENCHMARKS;

27 (d) THE APPLICANT HAS CONDUCTED NATIONAL RESEARCH THAT

1 SHOWS THAT THE APPLICANT HAS THE CAPACITY TO DELIVER PARTICIPANT
2 OUTCOMES ASSOCIATED WITH DECREASED LEVELS OF OPIOID OR OTHER
3 SUBSTANCE USE;

4 (e) THE APPLICANT HAS A HISTORY OF DELIVERING YOUTH
5 PREVENTION PROGRAMS; AND

6 (f) THE APPLICANT HAS AGREED THAT DURING EACH GRANT YEAR:

7 (I) THE APPLICANT WILL MEASURE THE YOUTH PARTICIPANTS'
8 ATTITUDES ON OPIOID USE AND OTHER SUBSTANCE USE; AND

9 (II) THE APPLICANT WILL TRACK DEMOGRAPHICS, ATTENDANCE,
10 AND PARTICIPATION IN THE INDIVIDUAL GRANTEE PROGRAM AND COMPILE
11 AGGREGATED FEEDBACK ON THIS INFORMATION FOR THE REPORT
12 REQUIRED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION.

13 (3) THE TONY GRAMPSAS YOUTH SERVICES PROGRAM SHALL
14 AWARD THE GRANTS TO THE SELECTED RECIPIENTS ON OR BEFORE
15 OCTOBER 1, 2018, AND CONTRACT WITH THE GRANT RECIPIENTS NO LATER
16 THAN NOVEMBER 1, 2018.

17 (4) (a) THERE IS CREATED IN THE STATE TREASURY THE YOUTH
18 OPIOID AND SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION FUND, WHICH CONSISTS OF
19 MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE FUND BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
20 BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2018, FOR THE DIRECT AND INDIRECT COSTS
21 ASSOCIATED WITH THE PROGRAM. THE STATE DEPARTMENT MAY USE UP
22 TO TWO PERCENT OF THE MONEY APPROPRIATED BY THE GENERAL
23 ASSEMBLY FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND EVALUATION OF THE PROGRAM.
24 ANY MONEY IN THE FUND NOT EXPENDED FOR THE PURPOSE OF THIS
25 SECTION AT THE END OF THE THREE-YEAR PROGRAM MAY BE INVESTED BY
26 THE STATE TREASURER AS PROVIDED BY LAW UNLESS THE PILOT PROGRAM
27 IS EXTENDED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. ANY UNEXPENDED AND

1 UNENCUMBERED MONEY REMAINING IN THE FUND AT THE END OF EACH
2 FISCAL YEAR OF THE PROGRAM SHALL REMAIN IN THE FUND AND SHALL
3 NOT BE CREDITED OR TRANSFERRED TO THE GENERAL FUND OR ANY OTHER
4 FUND UNTIL THE PROGRAM HAS EXPIRED.

5 (b) THE STATE DEPARTMENT SHALL WORK WITH THE GRANT
6 RECIPIENTS AT THE CONCLUSION OF THE PROGRAM. THE STATE
7 DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON OR
8 BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2021, REGARDING THE PROGRESS OF THE GRANT
9 RECIPIENT BASED ON THE DATA AND PERFORMANCE METRICS SPECIFIED IN
10 THE GRANT APPLICATION.

11 **SECTION 6.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 27-80-118, **add** (4)
12 as follows:

13 **27-80-118. Center for research into substance use disorder**
14 **prevention, treatment, and recovery support strategies - legislative**
15 **declaration - established - repeal.** (4) (a) THE CENTER SHALL DEVELOP
16 AND IMPLEMENT A SERIES OF CONTINUING EDUCATION ACTIVITIES
17 DESIGNED TO HELP A PRESCRIBER OF PAIN MEDICATION TO SAFELY AND
18 EFFECTIVELY MANAGE PATIENTS WITH PAIN AND, WHEN APPROPRIATE,
19 PRESCRIBE OPIOIDS OR MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT. THE
20 EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES MUST APPLY TO PHYSICIANS, PHYSICIAN
21 ASSISTANTS, NURSES, AND DENTISTS.

22 (b) THE CENTER SHALL ALSO DEVELOP EDUCATION AND TRAINING
23 FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS AND FIRST RESPONDERS CONCERNING
24 THE USE OF OPIOID ANTAGONISTS FOR OPIOID OVERDOSE AND
25 COMMUNITY-BASED TRAINING FOR PERSONS AT RISK OF OPIOID OVERDOSE.

26 (c) (I) ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2018, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
27 SHALL APPROPRIATE SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS TO THE

1 CENTER FROM THE MARIJUANA TAX CASH FUND CREATED IN SECTION
2 39-28.8-501 FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS SUBSECTION (4).

3 (II) THIS SUBSECTION (4)(c) IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER
4 1, 2019.

5 **SECTION 7. Appropriation.** (1) For the 2018-19 state fiscal
6 year, \$675,000 is appropriated to the department of health care policy and
7 financing. This appropriation is from the marijuana tax cash fund created
8 in section 39-28.8-501 (1), C.R.S. To implement this act, the department
9 may use this appropriation for the screening, brief intervention, and
10 referral to treatment training grant program.

11 (2) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$750,000 is appropriated to
12 the department of higher education for use by the regents of the university
13 of Colorado. This appropriation is from the marijuana tax cash fund
14 created in section 39-28.8-501 (1), C.R.S. To implement this act, the
15 regents may use this appropriation for the center for research into
16 substance use disorder prevention, treatment, and recovery support
17 strategies.

18 (3) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$1,500,000 is appropriated
19 to the youth opioid and substance use prevention fund created in section
20 26-6.8-107 (4)(a), C.R.S. This appropriation is from the marijuana tax
21 cash fund created in section 39-28.8-501 (1), C.R.S. The department of
22 human services is responsible for the accounting related to this
23 appropriation.

24 (4) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$500,000 is appropriated to
25 the department of human services for use by the division of child welfare.
26 This appropriation is from reappropriated funds in the youth opioid and
27 substance use prevention fund under subsection (3) of this section. To

1 implement this act, the division may use the appropriation for the Charlie
2 Hughes and Nathan Gauna opioid prevention program to improve young
3 lives in the Tony Grampsas youth services program.

4 (5) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$90,928 is appropriated to
5 the department of human services for use by the division of child welfare.
6 This appropriation is from the marijuana tax cash fund created in section
7 39-28.8-501 (1), C.R.S., and is based on the assumption that the division
8 will require an additional 0.5 FTE. To implement this act, the division
9 may use this appropriation for administration and evaluation of the
10 Charlie Hughes and Nathan Gauna opioid prevention program to improve
11 young lives in the Tony Grampsas youth services program.

12 (6) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$39,249 is appropriated to
13 the legislative department. This appropriation is from the general fund. To
14 implement this act, the department may use this appropriation as follows:

15 (a) \$18,414 for use by the legislative council, which amount is
16 based on an assumption that the council will require an additional 0.3
17 FTE;

18 (b) \$7,725 for use by the committee on legal services, which
19 amount is based on an assumption that the committee will require an
20 additional 0.1 FTE; and

21 (c) \$13,110 for use by the general assembly for member
22 reimbursement and per diem.

23 (7) For the 2018-19 state fiscal year, \$775,000 is appropriated to
24 the department of public health and environment for use by the prevention
25 services division. This appropriation is from the marijuana tax cash fund
26 created in section 39-28.8-501 (1), C.R.S. To implement this act, the
27 division may use this appropriation for school-based health centers.

1 **SECTION 8. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,
2 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
3 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
