This bill repeals the required \$20 donation for the Craig Hospital special license plate. It will create a minimal workload increase in the Department of Revenue in FY 2018-19 only.

Appropriation Summary: No appropriation is required.

Fiscal Note Status: The fiscal note reflects the enacted bill.

Summary of Legislation

Under current law, an applicant for the Craig Hospital special license plate must make a \$20 donation to Craig Hospital before issuance. This bill repeals the required \$20 donation.

Background

There are currently 14 special license plates that require a vehicle owner to make a donation to a specified nonprofit organization. Nonprofit organizations that collect these donations issue a certificate that can be redeemed at motor vehicle offices for the issuance of a special license plate. Vehicle owners also pay an additional one-time fee of \$50 for special license plates.

The Craig Hospital special license plate was created by House Bill 11-1298, and became effective January 1, 2012. There are currently 416 Craig Hospital special license plates issued to registered vehicles, with an average new issuance rate of five plates per month.

State Expenditures

In FY 2018-19 only, this bill will create a minimal workload increase in the Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Revenue to modify rules, forms, manuals, and websites to reflect any changes in required donations. Title and Registration Section staff and other affected agencies will also require training on the new donation procedures. These workload impacts can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on April 26, 2018, and it took effect on August 8, 2018.
