This bill requires the Colorado Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice to study and make recommendations on various issues involving young adults aged 18 to 25. The bill increases state and local workload until FY 2020-21.

Appropriation Summary: No appropriation is required.

Fiscal Note Status: The fiscal note has been revised to reflect the introduced bill, as amended by the House Judiciary Committee.

Summary of Legislation

This bill requires the Colorado Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice (CCJJ) in the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to study and make recommendations on various issues involving young adults 18 to 25 years old. Specifically, the bill requires the task force to:

- collect available data regarding criminal filings in the last three years on defendants who are young adults;
- study established brain research on young adults;
- study potential impacts on the juvenile justice system or youthful offender system if they served young adults; and
- create a report with recommendations on the appropriate uses of the juvenile justice system for young adults, to the General Assembly by June 30, 2020.

State Expenditures

Starting in the current FY 2018-19 and continuing until FY 2020-21, state workload will increase for the DPS and other state agencies as described below.

Department of Public Safety. Workload for the CCJJ will increase in order to collect data, study relevant research, and create the report, as required by the bill. The fiscal note assumes that the increase in workload can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Other agencies. Workload will increase in the Judicial Department, the Department of Corrections, and the Department of Human Services to gather and provide any relevant data and to work with the CCJJ on this study. This workload can be accomplished within existing appropriation.

Local Government

To the extent that the CCJJ requests data from the Denver County Court, municipal courts, district attorneys, or from local law enforcement agencies, workload for these agencies will increase.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
