Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill includes an appropriation clause that appropriates \$114,007 from the Medical Marijuana Program Cash Fund to the Department of Public Health and Environment for FY 2019-20. This provision also states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department will require an additional 0.2 FTE.

Additionally, the amendment adds a provision appropriating \$560,143 from the Division of Professions and Occupations Cash Fund to the Department of Regulatory Agencies for FY 2019-20. This provision also states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department will require an additional 0.4 FTE. Of that amount, \$535,456 is reappropriated to the Department of Law and is based on the assumption that the Department of Law will require an additional 2.9 FTE.
