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## **A BILL FOR AN ACT**

#### 101 CONCERNING THE CREATION OF THE COLORADO IMAGINATION

102 LIBRARY PROGRAM.

#### **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov.)

The bill requires the state librarian in the department of education (department) to contract with a Colorado nonprofit organization (contractor) for the creation and operation of the Colorado imagination library program (program). The contractor shall manage the daily operations of the program, including but not limited to: L

Establishing county-based affiliate programs in all





Colorado counties and city and counties;

- ! Advancing and strengthening the affiliate programs to ensure enrollment growth;
- ! Developing, promoting, and coordinating a public awareness campaign to make donors aware of the opportunity to donate to the affiliate program and make the public aware of the opportunity to register eligible children to receive books through the program; and
- ! Contracting with a national nonprofit foundation that exists for the sole purpose of working with local entities to identify eligible children and mail age-appropriate, high-quality books each month to those children at no cost to families.

The bill requires the contractor to submit a report to the department which shall then submit the report to the general assembly on the total number of eligible children in each county or city and county in Colorado and how many eligible children are enrolled in the program in each county or city and county.

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# **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly

- 3 finds and declares that:
- 4 (a) A child's early years play a pivotal role in the child's literacy
  5 abilities. Literacy skills learned between birth and age 5 often predict
  6 literacy in later years. Children who struggle with literacy in kindergarten
  7 through third grade are unlikely to catch up to their peers, and the
  8 proficiency gap widens as students grow older.
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(b) In 2019, the National Assessment of Educational Progress(NAEP) indicated that just 40% of Colorado students in fourth grade could read proficiently;

(c) NAEP results also demonstrate that Colorado has not made
progress in improving literacy among historically underserved students.
Similar to NAEP results in 1998, in 2019, Colorado's African American
and Hispanic and Latino fourth graders saw average reading scores that

were 24 and 27 points lower, respectively, than the average score of their
 Caucasian peers. Also similar to results in 1998, in 2019, Colorado
 children from low-income families saw an average reading score that was
 30 points lower than higher income students.

5 (d) Access to printed reading materials is a key component in 6 ensuring literacy among young children. Children with more exposure to 7 printed reading materials excel in comprehension, technical reading, and 8 spelling.

9 (e) Children in many of Colorado's small rural school districts on 10 the eastern side of the state do not have access to a public library and 11 therefore see zero per-student circulation of child reading materials 12 through a library;

(f) Some larger rural school districts with larger percentages of
children living in poverty and children of color have only one public
library to serve their student populations and therefore see low circulation
of reading materials; and

(g) Reading proficiently by the end of third grade is essential to
mastering other academic subjects. Students who struggle with literacy
are 4 times more likely to eventually drop out of school without earning
their high school diploma.

(2) Therefore, the general assembly finds that it is imperative for
children from birth to 5 years old have access to high-quality,
age-appropriate books on a monthly basis at no cost to families.

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 24-90-120 as
follows:

26 24-90-120. Colorado imagination library program - creation
 27 - request for proposal - state librarian duties - report - definitions.

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(1) FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION, UNLESS THE CONTEXT
 OTHERWISE REQUIRES:

3 (a) "County-based affiliate programs" means a local
4 Affiliate of the Colorado imagination library program that
5 OPERATES WITHIN A COUNTY OR CITY AND COUNTY.

6 (b) "ELIGIBLE CHILD" MEANS A CHILD FROM BIRTH TO THE CHILD'S
7 FIFTH BIRTHDAY.

8 (c) "NATIONAL NONPROFIT FOUNDATION" MEANS A NATIONAL 9 NONPROFIT FOUNDATION THAT EXISTS FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF 10 WORKING WITH LOCAL ENTITIES TO IDENTIFY ELIGIBLE CHILDREN AND 11 MAIL AGE-APPROPRIATE, HIGH-QUALITY BOOKS EACH MONTH TO THOSE 12 CHILDREN AT NO COST TO FAMILIES.

13 (d) "PROGRAM" MEANS THE COLORADO IMAGINATION LIBRARY
14 PROGRAM CREATED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION.

- 15 (2) SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, INCLUDING ANY
- 16 <u>APPROPRIATIONS REQUIRED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4)(a) OF THIS</u>

17 <u>SECTION,</u> THE STATE LIBRARIAN IN THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION SHALL
18 CONTRACT WITH A COLORADO NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION FOR THE
19 CREATION AND OPERATION OF THE COLORADO IMAGINATION LIBRARY
20 PROGRAM. THE CONTRACTOR SHALL:

21 (a) EXIST FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF CREATING AND OPERATING
22 THE PROGRAM;

(b) MANAGE THE DAILY OPERATIONS OF THE PROGRAM, INCLUDING
BUT NOT LIMITED TO ESTABLISHING COUNTY-BASED AFFILIATE PROGRAMS
IN ALL COLORADO COUNTIES AND CITIES AND COUNTIES AND ADVANCING
AND STRENGTHENING THE AFFILIATE PROGRAMS TO ENSURE ENROLLMENT
GROWTH;

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(c) DEVELOP, PROMOTE, AND COORDINATE A PUBLIC AWARENESS
 CAMPAIGN TO MAKE DONORS AWARE OF THE OPPORTUNITY TO DONATE TO
 THE AFFILIATE PROGRAM AND MAKE THE PUBLIC AWARE OF THE
 OPPORTUNITY TO REGISTER ELIGIBLE CHILDREN TO RECEIVE BOOKS
 THROUGH THE PROGRAM; AND

6 (d) CONTRACT WITH A NATIONAL NONPROFIT FOUNDATION TO
7 PROVIDE AGE-APPROPRIATE, HIGH-QUALITY BOOKS EACH MONTH TO
8 ELIGIBLE CHILDREN AT NO COST TO FAMILIES.

9 (3) NOTWITHSTANDING SECTION 24-1-136 (11)(a)(I), ON OR 10 BEFORE JULY 1 OF THE YEAR AFTER THE STATE LIBRARIAN ENTERS INTO A 11 CONTRACT PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION, AND EACH 12 JULY 1 THEREAFTER, THE CONTRACTOR SHALL SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE 13 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION WHICH SHALL THEN SUBMIT THE REPORT TO 14 THE EDUCATION COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF 15 REPRESENTATIVES, OR ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES, CONCERNING THE 16 TOTAL NUMBER OF ELIGIBLE CHILDREN RESIDING IN EACH COUNTY OR CITY 17 AND COUNTY IN COLORADO AND HOW MANY ELIGIBLE CHILDREN ARE 18 ENROLLED IN THE PROGRAM IN EACH COUNTY OR CITY AND COUNTY.

19 (4) (a) THE CONTRACTOR, IN OPERATING THE PROGRAM PURSUANT 20 TO SUBSECTION (2) OF THIS SECTION, SHALL PAY TO THE NATIONAL 21 NONPROFIT FOUNDATION FIFTY PERCENT OF THE STATEWIDE COST TO 22 PROVIDE BOOKS TO ELIGIBLE CHILDREN ENROLLED IN THE PROGRAM, AS 23 DETERMINED BY THE NATIONAL NONPROFIT FOUNDATION. LESS ANY GIFTS, 24 GRANTS, OR DONATIONS RECEIVED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, 25 THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL ANNUALLY APPROPRIATE MONEY FROM 26 THE GENERAL FUND TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION FOR THE STATE'S 27 SHARE OF THE COST TO PROVIDE THE BOOKS, AND THE STATE LIBRARIAN

1 SHALL DISTRIBUTE THE MONEY TO THE CONTRACTOR.

(b) EACH COUNTY-BASED AFFILIATE PROGRAM SHALL PAY TO THE
CONTRACTOR THE REMAINDER OF THE COST, AS DETERMINED BY THE
NATIONAL NONPROFIT FOUNDATION, TO PROVIDE BOOKS TO THE ELIGIBLE
CHILDREN ENROLLED IN THE COUNTY OR CITY AND COUNTY.

6 (5) THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION MAY SEEK, ACCEPT, AND
7 EXPEND GIFTS, GRANTS, OR DONATIONS FROM PRIVATE OR PUBLIC SOURCES
8 FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS SECTION.

9 **SECTION 3.** Act subject to petition - effective date. This act 10 takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the 11 ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 12 5, 2020, if adjournment sine die is on May 6, 2020); except that, if a 13 referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the 14 state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act 15 within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect 16 unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in 17 November 2020 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the 18 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
