## **Summary of Legislation**

The bill makes FY 2019-20 appropriations to fund behavioral and mental health programs, as detailed below. Money appropriated that is not expended prior to July 1, 2020, is further appropriated to the relevant department for use between July 1, 2020, and December 30, 2020, for the same purposes.

Office of Behavioral Health, Department of Human Services

- \$3,530,000 directed to the managed service organizations (MSO) for substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and recovery providers for unanticipated expenses related to COVID-19;
- \$3,250,000 for community mental health centers for unanticipated expenses related to COVID-19;
- \$500,000 directed to the MSOs for SUD screening, brief intervention services, referral to treatment, training, and supports;
- \$2,000,000 for services provided to school-aged children and parents by community mental health center school-based clinicians and prevention specialists; and
- \$3,800,000 for co-responder programs, Colorado crisis system services, housing assistance, and treatment for rural communities.

Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment

- \$250,000 to the Office of Suicide Prevention for mental health services for school personnel and educators; and
- \$1,150,000 for the opiate antagonist bulk purchase fund and school-based health centers.

University of Colorado, Department of Higher Education

\$600,000 for education for health care professionals, grant writing assistance, and personal
protective equipment and telehealth supplies for the medication-assisted treatment expansion
pilot program.

#### Department of Law

\$120,000 for the Safe2Tell program.

#### **State Expenditures**

The bill increases state expenditures by \$15.2 million between the effective date and end of calendar year 2020. These expenditures are paid from the CARE subfund of the General Fund. Table 2 summarizes the appropriations in the bill. More detail on each appropriation can be found in the Summary section above.

## **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.

## **State Appropriations**

For the current FY 2019-20, the bill requires the following appropriations from the CARE subfund in the General Fund:

- \$13,080,000 to the Department of Human Services;
- \$1,400,000 to the Department of Public Health and Environment;
- \$600,000 to the Department of Higher Education for use by the Regents of the University of Colorado; and
- \$120,000 to the Department of Law.
