### **Summary of Legislation**

The bill extends, modifies, and finances behavioral health programs throughout state government. The affected programs are listed in Table 2 in the State Expenditures section. In addition, the bill makes several other changes in law including:

- continuing the requirement that podiatrists adhere to opioid prescribing limitations;
- making the Harm Reduction Grant Program Fund continuously appropriated to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE);
- continuing the Building Substance Use Disorder Treatment Capacity in Underserved Areas Grant Program indefinitely and repealing its July 1, 2024, repeal date;
- requiring the Perinatal Substance Use Data Linkage Project to use additional data sources from state-administered programs when examining issues related to pregnant and postpartum women with substance use disorders and their infants; and
- continuing the public awareness campaign about safe storage of opioid medication beyond the program's September 1, 2024 repeal date.

#### **State Expenditures**

The bill increases state expenditures by \$33.9 million and 3.2 FTE in FY 2021-22 and \$12.7 million and 3.2 FTE in FY 2022-23. Cost are paid from the General Fund, Marijuana Tax Cash Fund (MTCF), and federal funds, as detailed below. In subsequent years, costs for each program continue at FY 2022-23 levels on an ongoing basis unless otherwise noted.

# **Local Government**

Local governments and school districts may receive grants or allocations of funding from some of the state programs affected by the bill.

#### **Technical Note**

For Medicaid residential and inpatient SUD treatment, the bill requires initial authorization for intensive residential treatment to be at least seven days, and transitional residential treatment to be at least fourteen days. HCPF has indicated that the waiver authorizing the inpatient SUD benefit only

allows for days deemed medically necessary, which these minimums may not be consistent with, and that the department is not authorized to make expenditures outside of federal compliance. For this reason, the fiscal note does not include a cost estimate for this provision.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.

#### **State Appropriations**

For FY 2021-22, the bill includes appropriations of \$22,025,000 as follows:

- \$3,000,000 to the Colorado Department of Education, of which \$2,500,000 is from the MTCF and \$500,000 is General Fund;
- \$16,405,000 General Fund to the Department of Human Services;
- \$1,900,000 General Fund to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment;
- \$600,000 General Fund to the Department of Higher Education for allocation to the Center for Research into Substance Use Disorder Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Support Services; and
- \$120,000 General Fund to the Department of Law.

In addition, for FY 2021-22, the bill requires appropriations totaling \$11,914,358, as detailed below:

- \$6,040,000 to the Department of Human Services from the General Fund, and 2.0 FTE;
- \$2,000,000 General Fund to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, and 1.2 FTE;
- \$3,650,000 from the MTCF to the Department of Higher Education for allocation to the Center for Research into Substance Use Disorder Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Support Services; and
- \$224,358 to the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing, of which \$112,179 is General Fund and \$112,179 is federal funds.
