A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING MODIFICATIONS TO THE TONY GRAMPSAS YOUTH  
102 SERVICES PROGRAM.

---

Bill Summary

*(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <http://leg.colorado.gov>.)*

The bill makes the following modifications to the Tony Grampsas youth services program (program) in the state department of human services (state department):

- Eliminates state agencies and state-operated programs from the list of entities that can apply for a grant to participate in the program (**section 1** of the bill);

Shading denotes HOUSE amendment. Double underlining denotes SENATE amendment.  
Capital letters or bold & italic numbers indicate new material to be added to existing statute.  
Dashes through the words indicate deletions from existing statute.

- Changes the definition of "entity" to ensure compliance with federal case law (**section 1**);
- Adds prevention services to the services provided for youth and their families through community-based programming, including services for reducing crime and violence, abuse and neglect, drug and alcohol use, and school dropouts (**section 2**);
- Changes certain criteria for adult and youth members to be appointed to the Tony Grampas youth services board (**section 3**);
- Requires the grant application process for participating in the program to identify and prioritize funding programs that meet a need in the community (**section 3**);
- Requires entities that provide evidence-informed services for the youth mentoring services program to meet certain criteria (**section 4**);
- For entities providing services for the Colorado student before-and-after-school project, specifies that the services may include alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use intervention, prevention, and education components (**section 6**);
- For the funds that provide grant money to entities for providing services for the program, requires unexpended and unencumbered money remaining in the funds at the end of a state fiscal year to remain in the funds and available for expenditure by the state department in the following state fiscal year without further appropriations (**sections 2 to 6**); and
- Makes technical changes and corrections to the program.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2           **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-101, **amend**  
 3 the introductory portion and (2) as follows:

4           **26-6.8-101. Definitions.** As used in this ~~article~~ ARTICLE 6.8,  
 5 unless the context otherwise requires:

6           (2) "Entity" means a local government, a Colorado public or  
 7 ~~nonsectarian secondary~~ NOT-FOR-PROFIT school, a group of public or  
 8 ~~nonsectarian secondary~~ NOT-FOR-PROFIT schools, a school district or

1 group of school districts, a board of cooperative services, an institution  
2 of higher education, the Colorado National Guard, ~~a state agency, a~~  
3 ~~state-operated program~~, or a private nonprofit or not-for-profit  
4 community-based organization.

5 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-102, **amend**  
6 (1)(b), (2)(d)(I), and (2)(d)(III); and **repeal** (2)(b) as follows:

7 **26-6.8-102. Tony Grampas youth services program - creation**  
8 **- standards - applications.** (1) (b) The Tony Grampas youth services  
9 program is established to provide state funding for ~~the following purposes~~  
10 COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAMS:

11 (I) ~~For community-based programs that target, youth, and their~~  
12 ~~families for~~ TO PROVIDE PREVENTION AND intervention services in an  
13 effort to reduce incidents of youth crime and violence;

14 (II) ~~To promote prevention and education programs that are~~  
15 ~~designed~~ TO PROVIDE PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION SERVICES IN AN  
16 EFFORT to reduce the occurrence and reoccurrence of child abuse and  
17 neglect and to reduce the need for state intervention in child abuse and  
18 neglect prevention and education; ~~and~~

19 (III) ~~For community-based programs specifically related to~~ FOR  
20 the prevention and intervention of ~~adolescent and~~ youth ALCOHOL,  
21 TOBACCO, marijuana, AND OTHER DRUG use; AND

22 (IV) FOR THE PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION OF STUDENT DROP  
23 OUT.

24 (2) (b) ~~For one grant cycle, up to three hundred thousand dollars~~  
25 ~~of the appropriation made for the purpose set forth in this paragraph (b)~~  
26 ~~may be used to award technical assistance grants for community-based~~  
27 ~~prevention and intervention organizations that work with youth.~~

1 Organizations that apply for moneys pursuant to this paragraph (b) must  
2 use the moneys to assist with independent certification as an  
3 evidence-based program. Evidence-based programs must demonstrate an  
4 ability to meet rigorous requirements for evaluation and effectiveness to  
5 reflect an ability to change targeted behaviors and promote positive youth  
6 development outcomes.

7 (d) (I) The youth services program fund is created in the state  
8 treasury. The principal of the fund consists of tobacco litigation  
9 settlement moneys MONEY transferred by the state treasurer to the fund  
10 pursuant to section 24-75-1104.5 (1.7)(e). ~~C.R.S.~~ Subject to annual  
11 appropriation by the general assembly, the state department may expend  
12 moneys MONEY from the fund for the Tony Grampsas youth services  
13 program, including the compensation of youth members of the Tony  
14 Grampsas youth services board, as described in section 26-6.8-103  
15 (1)(e)(II). ~~All unexpended and unencumbered moneys in the fund at the~~  
16 ~~end of any fiscal year remain in the fund and shall not be transferred to~~  
17 ~~the general fund or any other fund.~~ ALL UNEXPENDED AND  
18 UNENCUMBERED MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE FUND AT THE END OF A  
19 FISCAL YEAR REMAINS AVAILABLE FOR EXPENDITURE BY THE STATE  
20 DEPARTMENT FOR THE TONY GRAMPSAS YOUTH SERVICES PROGRAM IN  
21 THE FOLLOWING FISCAL YEAR WITHOUT FURTHER APPROPRIATION AND  
22 MUST NOT BE TRANSFERRED OR REVERT TO THE GENERAL FUND STATE AT  
23 THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR.

24 (III) If an entity seeks a grant from the board for a program  
25 directed at providing ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, marijuana, AND OTHER DRUG  
26 use prevention and intervention services to youth, one of the criteria the  
27 board ~~shall~~ MUST consider is whether the program utilizes evidence-based

1 practices in the delivery of services.

2 **SECTION 3.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-103, **amend**  
3 (1)(b), (1)(d)(I)(A), (1)(d)(III)(B), (1)(d)(III)(C), (1)(d)(IV), (2)(b)  
4 introductory portion, (2)(b)(III)(A), (2)(b)(III)(C), and (5); and **add**  
5 (2)(b)(II.5) as follows:

6 **26-6.8-103. Tony Grampsas youth services board - members**  
7 **- duties.** (1) (b) In addition to the appointed board members, the  
8 executive director OR THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S DESIGNEE shall serve  
9 as a member of the board.

10 (d) (I) In appointing adult members to the board, the governor, the  
11 speaker of the house of representatives, and the president and the minority  
12 leader of the senate shall:

13 (A) Choose persons who have a knowledge and awareness of  
14 innovative strategies for youth crime AND VIOLENCE prevention and  
15 intervention services and for reducing the occurrence and reoccurrence  
16 of child abuse and neglect; and

17 (III) In appointing members to the board, the governor shall:

18 (B) Appoint at least one person who is knowledgeable in the area  
19 of child abuse AND NEGLECT prevention AND INTERVENTION; and

20 (C) Appoint at least one person who is knowledgeable in the area  
21 of ~~community planning for youth~~ CRIME AND violence prevention AND  
22 INTERVENTION.

23 (IV) In appointing youth members to the board, the governor shall  
24 appoint members who are ~~at least~~ fifteen years of age ~~and younger than~~  
25 OR OLDER BUT UNDER twenty-six years of age. A YOUTH BOARD MEMBER  
26 WHO REACHES TWENTY-SIX YEARS OF AGE DURING THE YOUTH BOARD  
27 MEMBER'S TERM MAY REMAIN ON THE BOARD FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE

1 TERM.

2 (2) (b) In addition to the guidelines developed pursuant to  
3 ~~paragraph (a) of this subsection (2)~~ SUBSECTION (2)(a) OF THIS SECTION,  
4 the board shall develop criteria for awarding grants under the Tony  
5 Grampsas youth services program, including but not limited to the  
6 following requirements:

7 (II.5) THAT THE GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS IDENTIFIES AND  
8 PRIORITIZES FUNDING PROGRAMS THAT MEET A NEED IN THE COMMUNITY,  
9 INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE PRESENCE OF RISK FACTORS IN A  
10 GRANT APPLICANT'S INTENDED POPULATIONS; AND

11 (III) (A) That the program is directed at providing PREVENTION  
12 AND intervention services to CHILDREN, youth, and their families in an  
13 effort to decrease incidents of YOUTH crime and violence; PREVENT CHILD  
14 ABUSE AND NEGLECT; OR DECREASE YOUTH ALCOHOL, TOBACCO,  
15 MARIJUANA, AND OTHER DRUG USE, or that the program is directed at  
16 providing services to ~~at-risk~~ students and their families in an effort to  
17 reduce the dropout rate in secondary schools pursuant to section  
18 26-6.8-105.

19 (C) If an entity is seeking a grant from the board for a program  
20 directed at providing PREVENTION AND intervention services to youth and  
21 their families in an effort to decrease incidents of YOUTH crime and  
22 violence, one of the criteria that the board shall consider is whether the  
23 program includes restorative justice components. It is not required,  
24 however, that the program include restorative justice components for the  
25 board to award a grant to the entity.

26 (5) In addition to the duties relating specifically to the Tony  
27 Grampsas youth services program specified in this section, the board shall

1 operate the prevention AND intervention ~~and treatment~~ programs specified  
2 in this ~~article~~ ARTICLE 6.8 and such other prevention AND intervention ~~and~~  
3 ~~treatment~~ programs as may be assigned to the board by executive order  
4 to be funded ~~solely~~ by federal ~~funds~~ MONEY, STATE MONEY, OR BOTH. ALL  
5 UNEXPENDED AND UNENCUMBERED MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE FUND  
6 AT THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR REMAINS AVAILABLE FOR EXPENDITURE BY  
7 THE STATE DEPARTMENT FOR THE TONY GRAMPSAS YOUTH SERVICES  
8 PROGRAM IN THE FOLLOWING FISCAL YEAR WITHOUT FURTHER  
9 APPROPRIATION AND MUST NOT BE TRANSFERRED OR REVERT TO THE  
10 GENERAL FUND AT THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR.

11 **SECTION 4.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-104, **amend**  
12 (2), (3), (4), (5)(a), (5)(b), and (6) as follows:

13 **26-6.8-104. Colorado youth mentoring services. (2) Legislative**  
14 **declaration.** (a) The general assembly ~~hereby~~ finds and declares that  
15 mentoring programs ~~such as big brothers, big sisters, and partners~~ have  
16 been active in Colorado for many years. The general assembly finds that  
17 national research has indicated that structured mentoring programs are  
18 effective tools in combating youth substance ~~abuse and~~ USE, youth crime  
19 and violence, AND OTHER CHALLENGES FACED BY YOUTH. The general  
20 assembly further finds, based upon recent national research results, that  
21 ~~at-risk~~ youth who are matched in a ~~minimum of year-long~~  
22 PROFESSIONALLY SUPPORTED mentoring relationships are less likely to  
23 become involved in substance and alcohol ~~abuse~~ USE, less likely to be  
24 truant, less likely to commit violent acts against other persons, and more  
25 likely to show improvements in academic performance and positive peer  
26 relations.

27 (b) The general assembly further finds that, despite the positive

1 results that may be achieved through structured youth mentoring  
2 programs, ~~as many as thirty-eight~~ counties in the state of Colorado do not  
3 have the organizational resources necessary to carry out successful  
4 mentoring programs or lack ~~the adult~~ volunteers to establish such  
5 programs or both. The general assembly finds that even counties in which  
6 there are established youth mentoring programs, such programs are  
7 unable to meet the demand for mentors. ~~and that such established~~  
8 ~~programs have waiting lists that exceed two thousand youths.~~

9 (c) The general assembly therefore declares and determines that  
10 the provision of youth mentoring services that would use public and  
11 private entities to recruit, train, screen, and supervise ~~adult~~ volunteers to  
12 serve as mentors for ~~at-risk~~ youth would be beneficial and in the best  
13 interests of the citizens of the state of Colorado.

14 (3) **Definition.** For purposes of this section, "~~at-risk youth~~"  
15 "YOUTH" means a person who is ~~at least~~ five years of age OR OLDER but  
16 ~~who is less than eighteen years~~ UNDER TWENTY-FIVE YEARS of age and  
17 who is challenged by such risk factors as poverty, residence in a  
18 substance-abusing household, family conflict, association with peers who  
19 commit crimes, residence in a single-parent household, exhibition of  
20 indicia of delinquent behavior, or being the victim of child abuse.

21 (4) **Provision of youth mentoring services.** There is created the  
22 Colorado youth mentoring program to provide state funding for the  
23 provision of ~~community-based~~ EVIDENCE-INFORMED youth mentoring  
24 services ~~that target at-risk youths~~ in an effort to reduce YOUTH substance  
25 ~~abuse and to~~ USE, decrease the incidents of youth crime and violence, AND  
26 INCREASE PROTECTIVE FACTORS FOR YOUTH. The funding ~~shall~~ MUST be  
27 used to provide ~~new~~ EVIDENCE-INFORMED YOUTH mentoring services in

1 communities that do not have existing mentoring programs as well as to  
2 enhance established ~~community-based~~ EVIDENCE-INFORMED YOUTH  
3 mentoring programs that are already in existence.

4 (5) **Administration - duties of contracting entities.** (a) To be  
5 eligible for ~~moneys~~ MONEY from the youth mentoring services cash fund  
6 created in subsection (6) of this section for the provision of  
7 EVIDENCE-INFORMED youth mentoring services, an entity must apply to  
8 the board in accordance with the timelines and guidelines adopted by the  
9 board pursuant to section 26-6.8-103 and must meet the requirements of  
10 ~~paragraph (b) of this subsection (5)~~ SUBSECTION (5)(b) OF THIS SECTION.

11 (b) ~~The entities that the board selects~~ AN ENTITY SELECTED BY THE  
12 BOARD to provide ~~community-based~~ AN EVIDENCE-INFORMED youth  
13 mentoring ~~services are responsible for~~ PROGRAM SHALL:

14 (I) ADHERE TO EVIDENCE-INFORMED STANDARDS OF PRACTICE. AN  
15 EVIDENCE-INFORMED YOUTH MENTORING PROGRAM USES A MODEL THAT  
16 IS EVALUATED ANNUALLY AND INCORPORATES RESEARCH EVIDENCE INTO  
17 ITS DESIGN AND DELIVERY. AN ENTITY THAT IS AWARDED A GRANT SHALL  
18 ANNUALLY DEMONSTRATE PROOF THAT EVIDENCE-INFORMED STANDARDS  
19 ARE APPLIED THROUGHOUT THE PROGRAM. AN ENTITY MUST  
20 DEMONSTRATE PROOF THAT IT APPLIES EVIDENCE-INFORMED STANDARDS  
21 BY PRESENTING CURRENT PROOF OF COMPLIANCE FOR ACHIEVEMENT FROM  
22 AN EVALUATION CONCERNING THE APPLICATION OF EVIDENCE-INFORMED  
23 STANDARDS ADMINISTERED BY AN OUTSIDE ORGANIZATION; AND

24 (II) ENSURE MENTORING IS THE PRIMARY SERVICE PROVIDED BY  
25 THE PROGRAM AND MAKE INTENTIONAL MATCHES OR FORMAL  
26 CONNECTIONS BETWEEN YOUTHS AND MENTORS.

27 ~~(I) Actively recruiting qualified and appropriate adult volunteers~~

1 who are willing to serve as youth mentors for a period of not less than one  
2 year and to commit to spending an average of three hours per week with  
3 the at-risk youth;

4 ~~(II) Effectively screening adult volunteers to serve as mentors,~~  
5 ~~including but not limited to conducting criminal background checks of~~  
6 ~~such adult volunteers;~~

7 ~~(III) Providing training and ongoing support to adult volunteers~~  
8 ~~to prepare them to serve in one-year mentoring relationships with at-risk~~  
9 ~~youths;~~

10 ~~(IV) Carefully matching each adult volunteer with an at-risk youth~~  
11 ~~based on the unique qualifications of the adult volunteer and the specific~~  
12 ~~needs of the youth;~~

13 ~~(V) Supervising closely and through case managers the activities~~  
14 ~~of the adult volunteer and the mutual benefits and effectiveness of the~~  
15 ~~mentoring relationship;~~

16 ~~(VI) Making available life skill workshops, recreational activities,~~  
17 ~~and community service opportunities to the at-risk youth and adult~~  
18 ~~volunteer;~~

19 ~~(VII) Implementing a method of evaluating the effectiveness of~~  
20 ~~the community-based youth mentoring program and tracking the youths~~  
21 ~~served by the program to evaluate the impact of the services provided~~  
22 ~~through the program; and~~

23 ~~(VIII) Reporting annually to the board concerning the results of~~  
24 ~~the entity's evaluation of youths served by the community-based youth~~  
25 ~~mentoring program as well as the fiscal contributions made by the entity~~  
26 ~~to the program and such other information that the board may require.~~

27 **(6) Youth mentoring services cash fund.** There is created in the

1 state treasury the youth mentoring services cash fund, referred to in this  
2 subsection (6) as the "fund". The money in the fund is subject to annual  
3 appropriation by the general assembly for the direct and indirect costs of  
4 implementing this section. ALL UNEXPENDED AND UNENCUMBERED  
5 MONEY APPROPRIATED TO THE FUND AT THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR  
6 REMAINS AVAILABLE FOR EXPENDITURE BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT FOR  
7 YOUTH MENTORING SERVICES IN THE FOLLOWING FISCAL YEAR WITHOUT  
8 FURTHER APPROPRIATION AND MUST NOT BE TRANSFERRED OR REVERT TO  
9 THE GENERAL FUND AT THE END OF THE FISCAL YEAR. The executive  
10 director may accept on behalf of the state any grants, gifts, or donations  
11 from any private or public source for the purpose of this section. All  
12 private and public money received through grants, gifts, or donations  
13 must be transmitted to the state treasurer, who shall credit the same to the  
14 fund. The general assembly may appropriate money from the marijuana  
15 tax cash fund created in section 39-28.8-501. All investment earnings  
16 derived from the deposit and investment of money in the fund ~~must~~  
17 ~~remain~~ REMAINS in the fund and must not be transferred or revert to the  
18 general fund of the state at the end of any fiscal year.

19 **SECTION 5.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-105, **amend**  
20 (3), (4), (5)(a), and (6)(b) as follows:

21 **26-6.8-105. Colorado student dropout prevention and**  
22 **intervention program. (3) Definitions.** For purposes of this section,  
23 ~~"at-risk students"~~ "STUDENT" means ~~students~~ AN INDIVIDUAL ENROLLED  
24 in A PRIMARY OR secondary ~~schools~~ SCHOOL who ~~are at risk of~~ IS FACING  
25 ADVERSITY SUCH AS dropping out of school because of ~~their~~ THE  
26 INDIVIDUAL'S socioeconomic background, lack of adult support, language  
27 barriers, or other identified indicators that cause ~~students to drop out of~~

1 school DROP OUT.

2 (4) **Colorado student dropout prevention and intervention**  
3 **program.** There is created the Colorado student dropout prevention and  
4 intervention program in the Tony Grampsas youth services program to  
5 provide services to ~~at-risk~~ students and their families in an effort to  
6 reduce the dropout rate in secondary schools through an appropriate  
7 combination of academic and extracurricular activities designed to  
8 enhance the overall education and edification of students in secondary  
9 schools.

10 (5) **Administration.** (a) The state department shall administer the  
11 student dropout prevention and intervention program. Subject to the  
12 designation in ~~paragraph (b) of this subsection (5)~~ SUBSECTION (5)(b) OF  
13 THIS SECTION, the board shall select those entities that will receive grants  
14 through the student dropout prevention and intervention program and the  
15 amount of each grant. In addition, the state department shall monitor the  
16 effectiveness of programs that receive funds through the student dropout  
17 prevention and intervention program. To be eligible for grants from the  
18 board for the provision of student dropout prevention and intervention  
19 programs ~~targeting at-risk~~ FOR students, an entity ~~shall~~ MUST apply to the  
20 board in accordance with the timelines and guidelines adopted by the  
21 board pursuant to section 26-6.8-103.

22 (6) **Receipt of money.** (b) All private and public ~~moneys~~ MONEY  
23 received through funds, grants, gifts, or donations pursuant to this  
24 subsection (6) shall be transmitted to the state treasurer, who shall credit  
25 the same to the student dropout prevention and intervention fund, which  
26 fund is hereby created. The ~~moneys~~ MONEY in the fund ~~are~~ IS subject to  
27 annual appropriation by the general assembly for the direct and indirect

1 costs associated with the administration of this section. The executive  
2 director may expend ~~moneys~~ MONEY appropriated to the state department  
3 from the fund to provide a grant for implementing and administering a  
4 student dropout prevention and intervention program. All investment  
5 earnings derived from the deposit and investment of ~~moneys~~ MONEY in  
6 the fund ~~shall be~~ IS credited to the fund. ~~Any moneys not appropriated~~  
7 ~~shall remain in the fund and shall~~ ALL UNEXPENDED AND UNENCUMBERED  
8 MONEY IN THE FUND AT THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR REMAINS AVAILABLE  
9 FOR EXPENDITURE BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT FOR STUDENT DROPOUT  
10 PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION IN THE FOLLOWING FISCAL YEAR  
11 WITHOUT FURTHER APPROPRIATION AND MUST not be transferred or revert  
12 to the general fund ~~of the state~~ at the end of ~~any~~ A fiscal year.

13 **SECTION 6.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 26-6.8-106, **amend**  
14 (2) and (4) as follows:

15 **26-6.8-106. Colorado student before-and-after-school project**  
16 **- creation - funding.** (2) **Colorado student before-and-after-school**  
17 **project.** There is created, in the Tony Grampsas youth services program,  
18 the Colorado student before-and-after-school project to provide grants to  
19 entities to provide high-quality before-and-after-school programs that  
20 may include an alcohol, ~~or drug abuse~~ TOBACCO, OR OTHER DRUG USE  
21 INTERVENTION, prevention, and education component. Entities that  
22 receive grants pursuant to this section shall apply the grants to creating  
23 and implementing before-and-after-school programs that primarily serve  
24 youth enrolled in grades six through eight or youth who are twelve to  
25 fourteen years of age. The before-and-after-school programs are designed  
26 to help youth develop their interests and skills in the areas of sports and  
27 fitness, character and leadership, or arts and culture and may provide

1 education regarding the dangers of the use of alcohol, TOBACCO, and  
2 OTHER drugs. Before-and-after-school programs that are designed  
3 primarily to increase academic achievement or that provide religious  
4 instruction are not eligible for funding pursuant to this section.

5 (4) **Colorado student before-and-after-school project fund.**

6 There is created in the state treasury the Colorado student  
7 before-and-after-school project fund that ~~shall consist of moneys~~  
8 CONSISTS OF MONEY that the general assembly may appropriate to the  
9 fund. The ~~moneys~~ MONEY in the fund ~~are~~ IS subject to annual  
10 appropriation by the general assembly to the state department for the  
11 purpose of providing grants as provided in this section and the direct and  
12 indirect costs associated with the implementation of this section. Any  
13 ~~moneys~~ MONEY in the fund not expended for the purpose of this section  
14 may be invested by the state treasurer as provided by law. All interest and  
15 income derived from the investment and deposit of ~~moneys~~ MONEY in the  
16 fund ~~shall be~~ IS credited to the fund. ALL UNEXPENDED AND  
17 UNENCUMBERED MONEY IN THE FUND AT THE END OF A FISCAL YEAR
