HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 23-1014

101 **CONCERNING THE FIFTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE CAPTURE OF THE**
102 **U.S.S. PUEBLO BY NORTH KOREA.**

1 WHEREAS, The U.S.S. Pueblo was originally launched as a
2 United States Army cargo ship in 1944 but was transferred to the United
3 States Navy and renamed the U.S.S. Pueblo in 1966; and

4 WHEREAS, The U.S.S. Pueblo was named for the city of Pueblo,
5 Colorado, and the county of Pueblo, Colorado, and was the third ship in
6 the naval fleet to bear the name Pueblo; and

7 WHEREAS, After leaving Japan in early January 1968 on an
8 intelligence mission, the U.S.S. Pueblo was attacked by the North Korean
9 military on January 23, 1968; and

10 WHEREAS, According to United States naval authorities and the
11 crew of the U.S.S. Pueblo, the ship was in international waters at the time
12 of the attack; and

13 WHEREAS, One crew member of the U.S.S. Pueblo was killed
14 during the attack, and eighty crew members and two civilian

1 oceanographers were captured and held for eleven months by the North
2 Korean government; and

3 WHEREAS, This year marks the fifty-fifth anniversary of North
4 Korea's attack on the U.S.S. Pueblo and her crew; and

5 WHEREAS, The U.S.S. Pueblo is still in commission in the
6 United States Navy but continues to be held by the North Korean
7 government and is currently in a museum in Pyongyang, North Korea;
8 now, therefore,

9 *Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the*
10 *Seventy-fourth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate*
11 *concurring herein:*

12 (1) That we, the members of the General Assembly, recognize the
13 bravery and sacrifice of the crew of the U.S.S. Pueblo;

14 (2) That we take pride in the fact that the U.S.S. Pueblo bears the
15 name of a city and a county in Colorado, and, therefore, the citizens of
16 Colorado should be aware of the incident that occurred with the U.S.S.
17 Pueblo fifty-five years ago;

18 (3) That we continue the call for Kim Jong Un and the North
19 Korean government to return the U.S.S. Pueblo to the people of the
20 United States; and

21 (4) That we hereby designate January 23 of each year as "U.S.S.
22 Pueblo Day", a day to remember and honor the brave crew of the U.S.S.
23 Pueblo.

24 *Be It Further Resolved,* That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent
25 to President Joseph R. Biden, Jr.; Governor Jared Polis; President Pro
26 Tempore of the United States Senate Patty Murray; Speaker of the United
27 States House of Representatives Kevin McCarthy; and the members of
28 Colorado's Congressional delegation.
