MEMORIALIZING FORMER REPRESENTATIVE JIM SNOOK.

1 2	WHEREAS, Our respected former colleague, James Irvin Snook, a past member of the Colorado General Assembly, departed this life on
3	January 31, 2023, at the age of 83; and
4 5	WHEREAS, Representative Snook was born on November 14, 1939, on a 40-acre farm near Fruita, Colorado, to John and Elizabeth
6 7	Snook and spent the first four years of his life there before his family moved to the town of Fruita; and
8 9 10 11	WHEREAS, Representative Snook earned a bachelor's degree in Vocational Agriculture from Colorado State University and earned a master's degree in Counseling from the University of Northern Colorado; and
12 13	WHEREAS, In 1990, Representative Snook married his wife Carolyn, who he was married to for 33 years until his passing; and
14 15	WHEREAS, Representative Snook developed a love for agriculture and livestock at a young age when he began herding sheep in

the mountains northwest of Fruita, and pursued this passion later on by serving as a horse show judge for 4-H, an assistant Colorado State Fai Horse Show Director, and the Private Treaty Bull Sales Manager for the National Western Stock Show; and
5 WHEREAS, Before serving in the General Assembly 6 Representative Snook worked as an educator, school administrator
7 vocational and rehabilitation counselor, and insurance agent; and
8 WHEREAS, In 2000, Representative Snook ran for and wa
9 elected to the State House of Representatives where he served as the State 10 Representative for District 60 from 2001 to 2002; and
WHEREAS, While in the House of Representatives
Representative Snook served on the Agriculture, Livestock and Natura
Resources Committee and Civil Justice and Judiciary Committee, and
served as the Chair of the Police Officers' and Firefighters' Pension
15 Reform Commission; and
WHEREAS, Representative Snook sponsored legislation that
addressed agriculture, wildlife, and water issues important to the San Lui
Valley, including black bear hunting management and continuation of the San Luis Confined Aquifer; and
WHEREAS, After his time in the legislature, Representative
21 Snook worked as a lobbyist for Colorado Association of Homebuilder
22 and Xcel Energy; and
WHEREAS, Representative Snook is survived by his wife
24 Carolyn, his children J.J., Joel, Eric, David, and Deanna, 24
grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, and many friends and forme

WHEREAS, Representative Snook was a devoted public servan
28 who will be remembered for his hard work, dedication, accomplishments
