### **Summary of Legislation**

The bill authorizes the Department of Revenue (DOR) to issue and lift administrative holds on the movement of regulated marijuana products pending an investigation. It also gives the DOR the authority to embargo marijuana products when required for the health, safety, or welfare of the public, and order the destruction of marijuana products after notice and a hearing opportunity is provided to a licensee. The DOR is required to promulgate rules covering administrative hold, embargo, and destruction procedures and to seek assistance from the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE).

## Background

Currently, the DOR has rules in place to issue administrative holds and manages approximately 50 product safety cases per year.

#### **State Expenditures**

Beginning in FY 2023-24, the bill may increase workload for the DOR, as well as the Department of Law and CDPHE, based on the additional authority to embargo and destroy non-compliant marijuana products. This workload consists of rulemaking, as well as potential administrative hearings and destruction of marijuana. Based on the relatively low occurrence of product safety cases, this workload increase is expected to be minimal and absorbable within existing resources.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on March 23, 2023, and takes effect August 7, 2023, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
