HB 23-1213

Summary of Legislation

The bill requires the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) to distribute bleed control kits and training materials to schools that opt into receiving them. Bleed control kits and training materials are developed by the American College of Surgeons' Committee on Trauma and contain first-aid materials for treating blood loss. CDPHE will distribute kits to schools on a first-come, first-served basis as funds allow. The legislature is required to appropriate \$150,000 for FY 2023-24, FY 2024-25, and FY 2025-26 to cover the costs for kits and training materials to be distributed to schools. Unspent money may be used in future years until FY 2025-26 and does not revert to the General Fund. CDPHE must report to the legislature the number of schools that opt into receiving the kits, the number of people trained in "stop the bleed" and the cost of distributing the kits and training materials. The bill is repealed on July 1, 2026.

State Expenditures

The bill increase state expenditures by \$157,161 in FY 2023-24, and \$157,713 in FY 2024-25 and FY 2025-26, paid from the General Fund. Expenditures are shown in Table 2 and detailed below.

Administrator. CDPHE will have staff costs of 0.1 FTE for contract development, monitor requests and distribution and complete invoices for delivered kits as well as prepare the required report to the legislature. Costs are prorated for the General Fund pay date shift in the first year.

Bleed control kits, materials, and shipping. CDPHE will distribute kits to schools that request them. CDPHE will purchase these kits from the federal program developed by the American College of Surgeons. Each kit costs \$54, including shipping, allowing approximately 2,777 kits to be distributed to schools each year between FY 2023-24 and FY 2025-26.

Centrally appropriated costs. Pursuant to a Joint Budget Committee policy, certain costs associated with this bill are addressed through the annual budget process and centrally appropriated in the Long Bill or supplemental appropriations bills, rather than in this bill. These costs, which include employee insurance and supplemental employee retirement payments, are shown in Table 2.

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School Districts

School districts that request training materials will see a small increase in workload to coordinate with CDPHE and arrange times for training to be conducted. This increase is assumed to minimal and accomplished within existing school district resources.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on May 15, 2023.

State Appropriations

For FY 2023-24, the bill requires and includes a General Fund appropriation of \$155,541 to the Department of Public Health and Environment, and 0.1 FTE.
