The Senate Finance Committee Report (01/31/23) includes an amendment to the bill. This amendment makes technical adjustments to the bill, which define the circumstances in which the owner of special mobile machinery is issued a registration-exempt certificate in lieu of registration, license plates, annual validating tabs, or identifying decals, as well as the timing of payment for fees and surcharges associated with the registration-exempt certificate. This amendment results in a slight workload reduction and decreases the appropriation required to \$1,075,368 and 13.6 FTE. Legislative Council Staff and JBC Staff agree with this change to the fiscal impact.

Current Appropriations Clause in Bill

The bill requires but does not contain an appropriation clause.

Description of Amendments in This Packet

J.001 Staff has prepared amendment **J.001** (attached) to add a provision appropriating a total of \$1,075,368 cash funds to the Department of Revenue for FY 2023-24 from the Colorado DRIVES Cash Fund. This provision also states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department will require an additional 13.6 FTE. Additionally, the amendment includes a provision reducing the FY 2023-24 Long Bill appropriation to the Department of Revenue by \$3,748 cash funds from the License Plate Cash Fund for license plate ordering.

L.003 and J.002

Bill Sponsor amendment **L.003** (attached) changes the number of owned mobile machinery from one item to 250 items, reducing the fiscal impact, and requiring an appropriation of \$122,165 cash funds from the Colorado DRIVES Cash Fund and 0.9 FTE. Appropriation amendment **J.002** (attached) adds a provision appropriating a total of \$122,165 cash funds from the Colorado DRIVES Cash Fund to the Department of Revenue for FY 2023-24. This provision also states that the appropriation is based on the assumption that the Department will require an additional 0.9 FTE.

If the Committee adopts L.003 it should adopt J.002 and not J.001.

Points to Consider

TABOR/ Excess State Revenues Impact

The December 2022 Legislative Council Staff (LCS) revenue forecast projects a TABOR surplus liability of \$1.53 billion for FY 2023-24 and \$1.37 billion for FY 2024-25. These sums must be refunded to taxpayers out of the General Fund. Legislation that decreases non-exempt revenue (such as cash funds) to the State will decrease the TABOR refund made out of the General Fund. This will increase the amount of General Fund available for programs.

The Joint Budget Committee (JBC) is developing a budget package for FY 2023-24. This bill is estimated to decrease cash fund revenues by \$3,748 in FY 2023-24 and FY 2024-25, which will increase the available General Fund in each fiscal year by an equal amount. Additionally, this bill is estimated to decrease General Fund revenues by \$40,490 in FY 2023-24 and FY 2024-25, which will result in a decrease in the TABOR surplus liability of an equal amount.
