### **Summary of Legislation**

Status:

The bill requires institutions of higher education (IHEs) to stock a supply of epinephrine auto-injectors (injectors) in student housing facilities and cafeterias. IHEs are encouraged to store these injectors in sufficient quantities and at an emergency public access station. IHEs must accept any donations of injectors that meet federal standards. A person who uses injectors in good faith on another person believed to be experiencing anaphylaxis is not liable for civil damages.

### **State Expenditures**

Costs to place injectors at IHE student housing facilities and cafeterias will vary by institution. For institutions with a large resident student population, costs to acquire injectors may be up to \$75,000 initially, with ongoing costs to replace expired injectors. The fiscal note assumes that institutions will either procure injectors through gifts, grants, and donations, or purchase them using institutional revenue.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
