A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 **CONCERNING EXPANDING A PROGRAM TO CONTINUE RESPONDING TO**
102 **YOUTH BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISES.**

Bill Summary

Legislative Oversight Committee Concerning the Treatment of Persons with Behavioral Health Disorders in the Criminal and Juvenile Justice Systems. Under current law, the department of human services (department) offers statewide access to crisis system services (services) for children and youth. The bill expands the services provided through the creation of the crisis resolution team program (program) in

the department. The behavioral health administration (BHA) shall administer the program to provide community-based services to de-escalate and stabilize children or youth experiencing high-acuity behavioral health crises. The BHA shall contract with crisis resolution team providers (providers) to provide community-based de-escalation and stabilization services to children or youth.

A child or youth is eligible for services provided by the program if the child or youth:

- Is 21 years of age or younger;
- Has experienced high-acuity behavioral health crises as identified by the behavioral health crisis response system or emergency departments; and
- Is safe to remain in the home or the community while receiving intensive, short-term stabilization interventions.

Providers shall offer the following services to children or youth and their caregivers:

- Counseling or therapy;
- Case management to help meet treatment plans;
- Peer support or family skills coaching to foster connectedness, goal setting, and new routines to achieve positive, lasting change;
- Medication management; and
- Care coordination to provide tailored support and connection.

Providers shall offer services to a child or youth a minimum of 3 days per week with a variety of services offered daily depending on the child's or youth's clinical needs. Services must be offered to the child or youth for a minimum of 4 weeks up to a maximum of 6 weeks depending on the child's or youth's clinical needs.

The BHA shall:

- Maintain existing relationships with community partners;
- Conduct outreach and educate community partners regarding providers' services;
- Provide technical assistance to providers regarding specialized training and the use of screening and assessment tools; and
- Conduct an annual evaluation of the program.

On or before September 1, 2025, the BHA shall submit to the general assembly a feasibility study to determine whether the program can be further expanded statewide.

8 (5.5) (a) (I) THERE IS CREATED IN THE STATE DEPARTMENT THE
9 CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROGRAM. THE PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM IS TO
10 PROVIDE COMMUNITY-BASED DE-ESCALATION AND STABILIZATION
11 SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH WHO ARE EXPERIENCING HIGH-ACUITY
12 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISES AND THEIR CAREGIVERS. THE BHA SHALL
13 ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM AND CONTRACT WITH CRISIS RESOLUTION
14 TEAM PROVIDERS TO OFFER THE SERVICES DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTIONS
15 (5.5)(a)(III) AND (5.5)(a)(IV) OF THIS SECTION.

16 (II) A CHILD OR YOUTH IS ELIGIBLE FOR THE PROGRAM IF THE
17 CHILD OR YOUTH:

18 (A) IS TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF AGE OR YOUNGER;

19 (B) HAS EXPERIENCED HIGH-ACUITY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISES
20 AS IDENTIFIED BY THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISIS RESPONSE SYSTEM OR
21 AN EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT; AND

22 (C) IS SAFE TO REMAIN IN THE HOME OR COMMUNITY WHILE
23 RECEIVING INTENSIVE, SHORT-TERM STABILIZATION INTERVENTIONS.

24 (III) THE CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER SHALL OFFER THE
25 FOLLOWING SERVICES TO CHILDREN OR YOUTH AND THEIR CAREGIVERS:

26 (A) COUNSELING OR THERAPY;

27 (B) IN-HOME SERVICES;

1 (C) CASE MANAGEMENT TO SUPPORT CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND
2 THEIR CAREGIVERS IN MEETING TREATMENT PLANS;

3 (D) PEER SUPPORT OR FAMILY SKILLS COACHING TO FOSTER
4 CONNECTEDNESS, GOAL SETTING, AND NEW ROUTINES TO ACHIEVE
5 POSITIVE, LASTING CHANGE;

6 (E) MEDICATION MANAGEMENT; AND

7 (F) CARE COORDINATION TO PROVIDE TAILORED SUPPORT AND
8 CONNECTION THROUGH THE USE OF ADDITIONAL COMMUNITY RESOURCES.

9 (IV) THE CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER SHALL OFFER
10 SERVICES TO A CHILD OR YOUTH A MINIMUM OF THREE DAYS PER WEEK
11 WITH A VARIETY OF SERVICES OFFERED DAILY DEPENDING ON THE CHILD'S
12 OR YOUTH'S CLINICAL NEEDS. SERVICES MUST BE OFFERED TO THE CHILD
13 OR YOUTH FOR A MINIMUM OF FOUR WEEKS UP TO A MAXIMUM OF SIX
14 WEEKS DEPENDING ON THE CHILD'S OR YOUTH'S CLINICAL NEEDS.

15 (b) (I) TO CONTRACT WITH THE BHA PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION
16 (5.5)(a)(I) OF THIS SECTION, A CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER MUST:

17 (A) PROVIDE SUPPORT AND STABILIZATION SERVICES ACCORDING
18 TO THE TIME FRAMES DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (5.5)(a)(IV) OF THIS
19 SECTION; AND

20 (B) ENTER INTO COMMUNITY COORDINATION PARTNERSHIPS
21 PURSUANT TO SECTION 27-60-104 (6).

22 (II) CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDERS MAY CO-LOCATE WITHIN
23 THE FACILITY OF A COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATION OR PARTNER.

24 (III) CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDERS THAT ENTER INTO A
25 CONTRACT WITH THE BHA PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (5.5)(a)(I) OF THIS
26 SECTION SHALL COLLECT DATA AND OUTCOMES ON THE FOLLOWING:

27 (A) THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN OR YOUTH SERVED BY THE

1 PROGRAM, DISAGGREGATED BY GENDER, RACE, GRADE LEVEL, DISABILITY,
2 ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNER STATUS, AND UNHOUSED STATUS TO THE
3 MAXIMUM EXTENT POSSIBLE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE "COLORADO
4 PRIVACY ACT", ESTABLISHED PURSUANT TO PART 13 OF ARTICLE 1 OF
5 TITLE 6;

6 (B) THE ORGANIZATIONS THAT REFER CHILDREN OR YOUTH TO THE
7 PROGRAM;

8 (C) THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN OR YOUTH HOSPITALIZED WHILE
9 RECEIVING SERVICES FROM THE CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER;

10 (D) THE NUMBER OF REFERRALS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH TO
11 OUT-OF-HOME PLACEMENTS WHILE RECEIVING SERVICES FROM THE CRISIS
12 RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER; AND

13 (E) THE NUMBER AND TYPES OF SERVICES AND SUPPORTS THAT
14 CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND THEIR CAREGIVERS RECEIVE.

15 (c) TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM, THE BHA SHALL:

16 (I) USE EXISTING COMMUNITY COORDINATION PARTNERSHIPS
17 PURSUANT TO SECTION 27-60-104 (6) TO MAINTAIN RELATIONSHIPS WITH
18 COMMUNITY PARTNERS, AS INDICATED BY A MEMORANDUM OF
19 UNDERSTANDING AND ACTIVE PARTICIPATION ON EXISTING
20 MULTIDISCIPLINARY PROBLEM-SOLVING COMMUNITY ROUNDTABLES, SUCH
21 AS INTERAGENCY OVERSIGHT GROUPS THAT DETERMINE COLLABORATIVE
22 MANAGEMENT PROGRAM PROCESSES, COMMUNITY PREVENTION
23 PROGRAMS, OR LOCAL JUVENILE SERVICES PLANNING COMMITTEES.

24 COMMUNITY PARTNERS INCLUDE:

25 (A) LOCAL COMMUNITY MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH
26 PROVIDERS;

27 (B) COUNTY DEPARTMENTS OF HUMAN OR SOCIAL SERVICES;

1 (C) ORGANIZATIONS THAT SERVE JUSTICE-INVOLVED CHILDREN OR
2 YOUTH;

3 (D) SCHOOL DISTRICTS;

4 (E) ORGANIZATIONS THAT SERVE CHILDREN OR YOUTH WITH
5 INTELLECTUAL AND DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES;

6 (F) LOCAL HOSPITALS AND EMERGENCY DEPARTMENTS;

7 (G) LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES; AND

8 (H) PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENTS;

9 (II) CONDUCT OUTREACH AND EDUCATE COMMUNITY PARTNERS
10 REGARDING CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM SERVICES AVAILABLE THROUGH THE
11 PROGRAM;

12 (III) PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO CRISIS RESOLUTION
13 TEAM PROVIDERS REGARDING SPECIALIZED TRAINING AND THE USE OF
14 SCREENING AND ASSESSMENT TOOLS FOR CHILDREN OR YOUTH;

15 (IV) COLLECT DATA AND OUTCOMES FROM CRISIS RESOLUTION
16 TEAM PROVIDERS AS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (5.5)(b)(III) OF THIS
17 SECTION;

18 (V) CONDUCT, OR CONTRACT WITH A THIRD-PARTY EVALUATOR TO
19 CONDUCT, AN ANNUAL EVALUATION OF THE PROGRAM USING THE DATA
20 AND OUTCOMES COLLECTED FROM CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDERS
21 PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (5.5)(c)(IV) OF THIS SECTION; ■

22 (VI) CONDUCT, OR CONTRACT WITH A THIRD-PARTY EVALUATOR
23 TO CONDUCT, A FEASIBILITY STUDY TO:

24 (A) DETERMINE HOW TO CONTINUE TO EXPAND THE PROGRAM
25 STATEWIDE;

26 (B) DETERMINE COSTS TO PROVIDE SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND
27 YOUTH FOR UP TO EIGHT WEEKS;

1 (C) ALLOW ACCESS TO THE PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN OR YOUTH
2 WITHOUT A BEHAVIORAL HEALTH DIAGNOSIS;

3 (D) DETERMINE HOW TO ALIGN THE PROGRAM WITH THE
4 EVIDENCE-BASED YOUTH MOBILE RESPONSE AND STABILIZATION SERVICES
5 MODEL;

6 (E) IDENTIFY THE NECESSARY TOOLS TO CONTINUE THE EXPANSION
7 OF THE PROGRAM STATEWIDE; AND

8 (F) CREATE A PHASED APPROACH TO CONTINUE THE EXPANSION OF
9 THE PROGRAM; AND

10 (VII) DEVELOP A SURVEY FOR CHILDREN OR YOUTH AND THEIR
11 CAREGIVERS WHO PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM FOR THE BHA TO
12 MEASURE SATISFACTION WITH PROGRAM SERVICES AND OUTCOMES. THE
13 BHA MAY INCLUDE OTHER INFORMATION IN THE SURVEY AS NECESSARY.
14 THE BHA SHALL DISTRIBUTE THE SURVEY TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH AND
15 THEIR CAREGIVERS AS SOON AS REASONABLY POSSIBLE AFTER THE
16 DISCONTINUATION OF CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER SERVICES. THE
17 BHA MAY REDISTRIBUTE THE SURVEY TO CHILDREN OR YOUTH AND THEIR
18 CAREGIVERS AFTER A PERIOD OF SIX MONTHS. THE BHA SHALL COLLECT
19 SURVEY RESULTS AND INCLUDE THE RESULTS AS PART OF THE REPORT
20 DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (6)(a)(II) OF THIS SECTION.

21 (d) ON OR BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1, 2025, THE BHA SHALL SUBMIT
22 THE FEASIBILITY STUDY SET FORTH IN SUBSECTION (5.5)(c)(VI) OF THIS
23 SECTION TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES HEALTH AND HUMAN
24 SERVICES COMMITTEE AND THE SENATE HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES
25 COMMITTEE, OR THEIR SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES, AND THE JOINT BUDGET
26 COMMITTEE.

27 (e) AS USED IN THIS SUBSECTION (5.5), UNLESS THE CONTEXT

1 OTHERWISE REQUIRES:

2 (I) "CAREGIVER" MEANS A PARENT, FOSTER PARENT, KIN,
3 GUARDIAN, OR LEGAL CUSTODIAN.

4 (II) "CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROGRAM" OR "PROGRAM" MEANS
5 THE CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROGRAM CREATED IN SUBSECTION
6 (5.5)(a)(I) OF THIS SECTION.

7 (III) "CRISIS RESOLUTION TEAM PROVIDER" MEANS A SERVICE
8 PROVIDER THAT SUPPORTS CHILDREN OR YOUTH WHO ARE EXPERIENCING
9 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISES AND MAY BENEFIT FROM INTENSIVE,
10 SHORT-TERM, IN-HOME SERVICES AND ONGOING SUPPORT.

11 (6) (a) (I) Beginning in January 2014, and every January
12 thereafter, the BHA shall report progress on the implementation of the
13 crisis response system, as well as information about and updates to the
14 system, as part of its "State Measurement for Accountable, Responsive,
15 and Transparent (SMART) Government Act" hearing required by section
16 2-7-203.

17 (II) BEGINNING IN JANUARY 2025, AND EVERY JANUARY
18 THEREAFTER, THE BHA SHALL REPORT PROGRESS ON THE CRISIS
19 RESOLUTION TEAM PROGRAM CREATED IN SUBSECTION (5.5) OF THIS
20 SECTION AS PART OF ITS "STATE MEASUREMENT FOR ACCOUNTABLE,
21 RESPONSIVE, AND TRANSPARENT (SMART) GOVERNMENT ACT" HEARING
22 REQUIRED BY SECTION 2-7-203.

23 (III) NOTWITHSTANDING THE REQUIREMENT IN SECTION 24-1-136
24 (11)(a)(I), THE REQUIREMENT TO SUBMIT THE REPORT REQUIRED IN THIS
25 SUBSECTION (6) CONTINUES INDEFINITELY.

26 **SECTION 2. Safety clause.** The general assembly finds,
27 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate

1 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for
2 the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state
3 institutions.
