Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill prohibits a landlord from evicting a residential tenant unless the landlord has cause for eviction. Cause exists only when:

 A tenant or lessee is guilty of an unlawful detention of real property under certain circumstances described in existing law, as amended by the bill; or SENATE

• Conditions exist constituting grounds for a "no-fault eviction".

The following conditions constitute grounds for a "no-fault eviction" of a residential tenant, with certain limitations:

- Demolition or conversion of the residential premises;
- Substantial repairs or renovations to the residential premises;
- Occupancy assumed by the landlord or a family member of the landlord;
- Expiration of time-limited housing operated by a mission-driven organization; and
- Withdrawal of the residential premises from the rental market for the purpose of selling the residential premises.

A landlord that proceeds with a no-fault eviction in violation of certain notice requirements or other restrictions must provide relocation assistance to the tenant in the amount of 2 months' rent plus one additional month of rent if any of the following individuals reside in the residential premises:

- An individual who is under 18 years of age or at least 60 years of age;
- An individual whose income is no greater than 80% of the area median income; or
- An individual with a disability.

If a landlord proceeds with an eviction of a tenant without cause, the tenant may seek relief as provided in existing laws concerning unlawful removal of a tenant and may assert the landlord's violation as an affirmative defense to an eviction proceeding.

Current law allows a tenant to terminate a tenancy by serving written notice to the landlord within a prescribed time period, based on the length of the tenancy. For the purpose of such notices, certain provisions apply, including the following:

- Any person in possession of real property with the assent of the owner is presumed to be a tenant at will until the contrary is shown; and
- Certain provisions concerning notices to quit do not apply to the termination of a residential tenancy if the residential premises is a condominium unit.

The bill eliminates these provisions.

Current law requires the management of a mobile home park to make a reasonable effort to notify a resident of the management's intention to enter the mobile home space at least 48 hours before entry. The bill increases this notice period to 72 hours.

(b) Service of the notice to quit shall TERMINATE TENANCY MUST be as specified in section 13-40-108. C.R.S. Service by posting shall be Is deemed legally sufficient within the meaning of section 13-40-108 C.R.S., if the notice is affixed to the main entrance of the mobile home.

(3) In any notice provided by the management as required by this section, the management shall specify the reason for the termination, as described in section 38-12-203, of the tenancy that is the subject of the

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1	notice. If the management is terminating the tenancy because the mobile
2	home or mobile home lot is out of compliance with local ordinances or
3	state laws or rules relating to mobile homes and mobile home lots, as
4	described in section 38-12-203 (1)(a), or out of compliance with written
5	rules and regulations of the mobile home park, as described in section
6	38-12-203 (1)(c), the notice must include a statement advising the home
7	owner that the home owner has a right to cure the noncompliance within
8	ninety days after the date of service or posting of the notice to quit
9	TERMINATE TENANCY. This ninety-day period runs concurrently with the
10	ninety-day period to sell the mobile home or remove it from the premises
11	as set forth in subsection (1)(c)(I) of this section. Rent payment and other
12	agreed tenant obligations remain in effect during this ninety-day period,
13	and acceptance of rent by a landlord during this ninety-day period does
14	not constitute a waiver of the landlord's right to terminate the tenancy for
15	any noncompliance described in section 38-12-203 (1)(a) or (1)(c).
16	SECTION 10. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-12-204.3,
17	amend (1) introductory portion, (1)(a), and (2) as follows:
18	38-12-204.3. Notice required for termination. (1) Where the
19	tenancy of a mobile home owner is being terminated under section
20	38-12-202 or section 38-12-204, the landlord or mobile home park owner
21	shall provide such mobile home owner with written notice as provided for
22	in subsection (2) of this section. Service of such notice shall MUST occur
23	at the same time and in the same manner as service of:
24	(a) The notice to quit TERMINATE TENANCY as provided in section

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38-12-202 (1); or

(2) The notice required under this section must be in at least ten-point type and must read as follows:

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1	IMPORTANT NOTICE TO THE HOME OWNER:
2	This notice and the accompanying notice to quit TERMINATE
3	TENANCY/notice of nonpayment of rent are the first steps in the eviction
4	process. Any dispute you may have regarding the grounds for eviction
5	should be addressed with your landlord or the management of the mobile
6	home park or in the courts if an eviction action is filed. Please be advised
7	that the "Mobile Home Park Act", part 2 of article 12 of title 38, Colorado
8	Revised Statutes, and the "Mobile Home Park Act Dispute Resolution and
9	Enforcement Program" created in section 38-12-1104, Colorado Revised
10	Statutes, may provide you with legal protection.
11	NOTICE TO QUIT TERMINATE TENANCY: In order to terminate a
12	home owner's tenancy, the landlord or management of a mobile home
13	park must serve to a home owner a notice to quit TERMINATE TENANCY.
14	The notice must be in writing and must contain certain information,
15	including:
16	• The grounds for the termination of the tenancy;
17	• Whether or not the home owner has a right to cure under
18	the "Mobile Home Park Act"; and
19	• That the home owner has the option of mediation pursuant
20	to section 38-12-216, Colorado Revised Statutes, of the
21	"Mobile Home Park Act" and the option of filing a
22	complaint through the "Mobile Home Park Act Dispute
23	Resolution and Enforcement Program" created in section
24	38-12-1104, Colorado Revised Statutes.
25	NOTICE OF NONPAYMENT OF RENT: In order to terminate
26	a home owner's tenancy due to nonpayment of rent, the landlord or
27	management of a mobile home park must serve to a home owner a notice

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1	of nonpayment of rent. The notice must be in writing and must require
2	that the home owner either make payment of rent or sell the owner's unit
3	or remove it from the premises within a period of not less than ten days
4	after the date the notice is served or posted, for failure to pay rent when
5	due.
6	CURE PERIODS: If the home owner has a right to cure under the
7	"Mobile Home Park Act", the landlord or management of a mobile home
8	park cannot terminate a home owner's tenancy without first providing the
9	home owner with a time period to cure the noncompliance. "Cure" refers
10	to a home owner remedying, fixing, or otherwise correcting the situation
11	or problem that made the tenancy subject to termination pursuant to
12	sections 38-12-202, 38-12-203, or 38-12-204, Colorado Revised Statutes.
13	COMMENCEMENT OF LEGAL ACTION TO TERMINATE
14	THE TENANCY: After the last day of the applicable notice period
15	required by section 38-12-202 (1)(c), Colorado Revised Statutes, a legal
16	action may be commenced to take possession of the space leased by the
17	home owner. In order to evict a home owner, the landlord or management
18	of the mobile home park must prove:
19	• The landlord or management complied with the notice

• The landlord or management complied with the notice requirements of the "Mobile Home Park Act";

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- The landlord or management provided the home owner with a statement of reasons for termination of the tenancy; and
- The reasons for termination of the tenancy are true and valid under the "Mobile Home Park Act".

To defend against an eviction action, a home owner must appear in court. If the court rules in favor of the landlord or management of the

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2	time of the ruling to either remove or sell the mobile home and to vacate
3	the premises. If the home owner wishes to extend such period beyond
4	thirty days but not more than sixty days from the date of the ruling, the
5	home owner shall prepay to the landlord an amount equal to a pro rata
6	share of rent for each day following the expiration of the initial thirty-day
7	period after the court's ruling that the mobile home owner will remain on
8	the premises. All prepayments shall be paid no later than thirty days after
9	the court ruling. This section does not preclude earlier removal by law
10	enforcement officers of a mobile home or one or more mobile home
11	owners or occupants from the mobile home park if a mobile home owner
12	violates article 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 10, 12, or 18 of title 18 or section 16-13-303,
13	Colorado Revised Statutes.
14	SECTION 11. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-12-701, amend
15	(2)(b) as follows:
16	38-12-701. Notice of rent increase. (2) (b) A landlord may
17	SHALL not terminate a residential tenancy in which there is no written
18	agreement by serving a tenant with a notice to quit pursuant to section
19	13-40-107 TERMINATE TENANCY with the primary purpose of increasing
20	a tenant's rent in a manner inconsistent with this section.
21	SECTION 12. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-12-222, amend
22	(3) as follows:
23	38-12-222. Residents' right to privacy. (3) Except when posting
24	notices that are required by law or by a rental agreement, the management
25	shall make a reasonable effort to notify a resident of the management's
26	intention to enter the mobile home space at least forty-eight
27	SEVENTY-TWO hours before entry. The notification must include the date

4	SECTION 13. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-12-508, amend

6	38-12-508. Landlord's defenses to a claim of breach of
7	warranty - limitations on claiming a breach. (4) Except as provided
8	in section 38-12-509 (2), a tenant may not assert a breach of the warranty
9	of habitability as a defense to a landlord's action for possession based
10	upon a nonmonetary violation of the rental agreement or for an action for
11	possession based upon a notice to quit TERMINATE TENANCY or vacate.
12	SECTION 14. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-12-509, amend
13	(1.5) as follows:
14	38-12-509. Prohibition on retaliation. (1.5) A tenant may assert
15	as a defense to a landlord's action for possession, including an action for
16	possession based on a nonmonetary violation of the rental agreement or
17	an action for possession based upon a notice to quit TERMINATE TENANCY
18	or vacate, that the landlord retaliated against the tenant in violation of
19	subsection (1) of this section.
20	SECTION 15. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 38-33-112, amend
21	(3) as follows:
22	38-33-112. Notification to residential tenants. (3) Said THE
23	notice DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION constitutes the
24	notice to terminate the tenancy; as provided by section 13-40-107, C.R.S.;
25	except that no A residential tenancy shall NOT be terminated prior to the
26	expiration date of the existing lease agreement, if any, unless consented
27	to by both the tenant and the developer. If the term of the lease has less

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than ninety days remaining when notification is mailed or delivered, as the case may be, or if there is no written lease agreement, residential tenancy may SHALL not be terminated by the developer less than ninety days after the date the notice is mailed or delivered, as the case may be, to the tenant, unless consented to by both the tenant and the developer. The return receipt shall be IS prima facie evidence of receipt of notice. If the term of the lease has less than ninety days remaining when notification is mailed or delivered, as the case may be, the tenant may hold over for the remainder of said ninety-day period under the same terms and conditions of the lease agreement if the tenant makes timely rental payments and performs other conditions of the lease agreement.

SECTION 16. Severability. If any provision of this act or the application of this act to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of the act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this act are declared to be severable.

SECTION 17. Safety clause. The general assembly finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state institutions.

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
