Under current law, the ninth-grade success grant program (grant program) provides funding to local education providers and charter schools to implement a ninth-grade success program to assist students in

ninth grade to develop the skills needed to successfully graduate high school and succeed in their education and careers. Beginning in the 2024-25 state fiscal year, and for each year thereafter, the bill requires the general assembly to annually appropriate \$2.8 million for the grant program.

Under current law, the office of dropout prevention and student re-engagement (office) submits an annual report to the state board of education, education committees of the house of representatives and senate, and the governor regarding findings and recommendations to reduce the student dropout rate and increase graduation and completion rates. Starting with the report submitted in March 2026, the bill requires the office to include certain ninth-grade performance measures for each public school, school district, the charter school institute, and the state as a whole.

25	(1) To implement this act, the appropriation from the general fund made
26	in the annual general appropriation act for the 2024-25 state fiscal year to
27	the department of education for use by student pathways for the ninth

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1	grade success grant program is reduced by \$792,444, and the related FTE
2	is decreased by 0.6 FTE.
3	(2) For the 2024-25 state fiscal year, \$2,000,000 is appropriated
4	to the department of education. This appropriation is from the state
5	education fund created in section 17 (4)(a) of article IX of the state
6	constitution. To implement this act, the department may use this
7	appropriation as follows:
8	(a) \$74,950 for use by management and administration for
9	information technology services; and
10	(b) \$1,925,050 for use by student pathways for the ninth grade
11	success grant program, which amount is based on an assumption that the
12	division will require an additional 1.4 FTE.
13	SECTION 4. Safety clause. The general assembly finds,
14	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
15	preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for
16	the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state
17	institutions.

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
