A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING MEASURES TO INCREASE TEACHER MENTORSHIPS IN

102 PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <u>http://leg.colorado.gov.</u>)

Under current law, the teacher mentor grant program (grant program) provides funding to partnerships between local education providers and educator preparation programs to provide training and stipends for experienced teachers who mentor teacher candidates in clinical practice.

The bill expands the grant program to include mentorship of

novice teachers who have fewer than 3 years of teaching experience.

The bill requires the general assembly to appropriate \$500,000 dollars to the department of higher education for the grant program for the 2024-25 state fiscal year. Any appropriation remaining at the end of the 2024-25 state fiscal year may be used for the grant program in subsequent fiscal years.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly 3 finds that: 4 (a) In 2019, the general assembly created the teacher mentor grant 5 program to provide funding to partnering local education providers and 6 educator preparation programs to provide training and stipends for 7 teachers who serve as mentors for teacher candidates participating in 8 clinical practice; 9 (b) In 2023, the department of higher education surveyed over 100 10 mentors who participated in the program from 2021 to 2023. The survey 11 results indicated that: 12 (I) As a result of completing the approved mentor endorsement 13 training program, mentors reported high levels of confidence and skill 14 across all five competency areas identified in the Colorado standards for 15 mentor teachers and were most confident in their expertise around best 16 practices that maximize student achievement; 17 (II) Mentors reported that their preparation encouraged them to 18 carefully reflect on their own profession and practice while encouraging 19 them to implement new evidence-based teaching practices; and 20 (III) Nearly all mentors reported that their preparation experience enhanced their own professional identity, encouraging them to think of 21 22 themselves as teacher leaders and confirmed their commitment to and

satisfaction with the profession. From 2021 to 2023, a total of 177 mentor
 teachers participated in the program, receiving training from four
 educator preparation programs that serve urban and rural school districts
 across the state.

5 (c) In 2023 and 2024, an additional educator preparation program 6 was included in the program and several other preparation programs are 7 interested in seeking approval to offer the mentor endorsement training 8 program, which will greatly expand access to high-quality mentor 9 preparation across Colorado.

10 (2) Therefore, the general assembly declares that the demonstrated
11 success of the teacher mentor grant program warrants continued and
12 increased support of the grant program.

13 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-78-102, amend
 14 (1)(d), (1)(e), and (2); and add (1)(f) as follows:

15 23-78-102. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly
16 finds that:

(d) Research suggests that an effective teacher preparation
program should include opportunities for teacher candidates to spend time
in the classroom beginning in the first year of the program and continuing
and increasing throughout the program, culminating in a full year of
clinical practice using a classroom residency model in the final year of the
program; and

(e) To be effective, clinical practice must be directed and
mentored by an experienced, high-quality master teacher who devotes
significant time to working with the teacher candidate. These master
teachers should receive training for the role of mentor teacher that results
in a license endorsement as well as meaningful compensation for the time

spent working with a teacher candidate and sufficient time within the
 daily work schedule to spend with the teacher candidate; AND

3 (f) EXPANDING MENTORSHIP TO NOVICE TEACHERS NOT ONLY
4 CREATES VALUABLE PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT FOR ADDITIONAL MEMBERS
5 OF THE EDUCATION WORKFORCE, BUT ALSO ULTIMATELY INCREASES THE
6 NUMBER OF CAPABLE, HIGH-QUALITY TEACHERS, PROMOTES JOB
7 SATISFACTION, DECREASES TEACHER TURNOVER, OFFERS OPPORTUNITIES
8 FOR EXPERIENCED TEACHERS TO FURTHER THEIR CAREERS, AND LIKELY
9 IMPROVES STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT.

10 (2) The general assembly finds, therefore, that it is appropriate to 11 direct the department of education and the department of higher education 12 to collaborate with local education providers, approved educator 13 preparation programs, alternative teacher programs, and other interested 14 parties to identify best practices in providing comprehensive, rigorous, 15 and effective teacher preparation and guidelines for implementing these 16 best practices. The general assembly further finds that it is in the best 17 interests of the state to establish a grant program to provide funding for 18 training and reimbursements for mentor teachers who provide guidance 19 and oversight for teacher candidates while they participate in clinical 20 practice OR FOR NOVICE TEACHERS.

SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-78-103, add (9.5)
as follows:

23 23-78-103. Definitions. As used in this part 1, unless the context
24 otherwise requires:

25 (9.5) "NOVICE TEACHER" MEANS A TEACHER WHO HAS FEWER
26 THAN THREE YEARS OF TEACHING EXPERIENCE.

27 SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 23-78-105, amend

(1), (2) introductory portion, (2)(c), (2)(d), and (5); and repeal (2)(e) as
follows:

3 Teacher mentor grant program - created -23-78-105. 4 standards - appropriation - report - rules. (1) There is created in the 5 department of higher education The teacher mentor grant program IS 6 CREATED IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION to provide money 7 to partnering local education providers and educator preparation programs 8 to provide training and stipends for teachers who serve as mentors for 9 teacher candidates participating in clinical practice OR FOR NOVICE 10 TEACHERS. Subject to available appropriations and qualifying 11 applications, the department of higher education shall award grants 12 beginning in the 2019-20 budget year. The department shall establish the 13 duration of each grant as a period of up to three budget years, subject to 14 annual review and renewal.

15 (2) A partnership consisting of at least one local education 16 provider and at least one educator preparation program may submit an 17 application for a grant to the department of higher education in 18 accordance with guidelines adopted by the department. The department 19 shall establish the application requirements which THAT must include a 20 plan by which the applicant intends to sustain the teacher mentor program 21 after the grant period ends. In selecting grant recipients, the department 22 shall ensure, to the extent practicable, that the grant recipients include 23 applicants of varying size from rural, urban, and suburban areas across 24 the state. The department may award grants only to those applicants that 25 commit to implementing a teacher mentor program that:

26 (c) Ensures that the employing local education provider provides
 27 ALLOWS time within the mentor teacher's schedule to provide oversight

1 and support for the teacher candidate OR NOVICE TEACHER; AND

2 (d) Pays each mentor teacher a stipend of at least two thousand 3 dollars per school year or at least two thousand five hundred dollars per 4 school year if the mentor teacher holds a master certificate or is national-board certified. THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION MAY 5 6 PROMULGATE RULES TO CREATE A GRADUATED SCALE FOR THE STIPENDS 7 BASED ON INFLATION, YEARS OF EXPERIENCE AS A MENTOR, NATIONAL 8 CERTIFICATION, AND ANY OTHER RELEVANT CONSIDERATIONS AS LONG AS 9 THE STIPEND AMOUNTS ARE AT LEAST THE AMOUNTS IDENTIFIED IN THIS 10 SUBSECTION (2)(d). THE DEPARTMENT MAY USE ANY AVAILABLE FUNDS 11 TO PAY FOR THE STIPENDS DESCRIBED IN THIS SUBSECTION (2)(d).

12 (e) In addition to mentoring teacher candidates, provides
 13 mentoring for newly employed teachers through an induction program for
 14 at least two school years after employment; and

(5) (a) The general assembly shall annually appropriate money to
the department of higher education to implement the teacher mentor grant
program, including an amount to pay the direct administrative costs
incurred in implementing the teacher mentor grant program.

19 For the 2024-25 state fiscal year, the general (b) 20 ASSEMBLY SHALL APPROPRIATE FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS TO 21 THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION FOR THE TEACHER MENTOR 22 GRANT PROGRAM TO FUND DIRECT ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS INCURRED BY 23 THE DEPARTMENT, GRANT AWARDS, AND DIRECT ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS 24 INCURRED BY GRANT RECIPIENTS TO IMPLEMENT THE PROGRAM. THIS 25 APPROPRIATION MUST SUPPLEMENT AND NOT SUPPLANT CURRENT FUNDING 26 FOR THE TEACHER MENTOR GRANT PROGRAM. ANY UNEXPENDED MONEY 27 REMAINING FROM THE APPROPRIATION IN THIS SUBSECTION (5)(b) AT THE 1 END OF THE 2024-25 STATE FISCAL YEAR:

2 (I) DOES NOT REVERT TO THE GENERAL FUND OR ANY OTHER FUND; 3 AND

4 (II) MAY BE USED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION 5 SOLELY FOR THE TEACHER MENTOR GRANT PROGRAM IN SUBSEQUENT 6 STATE FISCAL YEARS WITHOUT FURTHER APPROPRIATION.

7 SECTION 5. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-60.5-106, amend 8 (3) as follows:

9 **22-60.5-106.** Endorsement of license - effect - rules. (3) The 10 department of education shall collaborate with the department of higher 11 education to create a mentor teacher endorsement for teachers who 12 provide mentoring and oversight for teacher candidates OR NOVICE 13 TEACHERS in accordance with the standards adopted by the department of 14 higher education pursuant to section 23-78-105 (3). The state board of 15 education by rule shall establish the criteria for the endorsement, which 16 must, at a minimum, include successfully completing training provided 17 by an educator preparation program, as defined in section 23-78-103, and 18 at least one full school year of successful experience serving as a mentor 19 teacher for a teacher candidate who is participating in clinical practice OR 20 FOR A NOVICE TEACHER, as defined in section 23-78-103.

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SECTION 6. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-60.5-110, amend 22 (3)(b) introductory portion as follows:

23 22-60.5-110. Renewal of licenses. (3) (b) A professional licensee 24 shall complete the ongoing professional development within the period 25 of time for which the professional license is valid. The professional 26 development may include, but need not be limited to, in-service education 27 programs, including training in preventing, identifying, and responding

1 to child sexual abuse and assault; behavioral health training that is 2 culturally responsive and trauma- and evidence-informed; and laws and 3 practices relating to the education of students with disabilities in the 4 classroom, including, but not limited to, child find and inclusive learning 5 environments; college or university credit from an accepted institution of 6 higher education or a community, technical, or local district college; 7 educational travel that meets the requirements specified in subsection 8 (3)(d) of this section; involvement in school reform; service as a mentor 9 teacher for teacher candidates participating in clinical practice OR FOR 10 NOVICE TEACHERS, as defined in section 23-78-103; internships; ongoing 11 professional development training and experiences; and teacher 12 externships pursuant to section 8-83-602.5. The state board of education, 13 by rule, may establish minimum criteria for professional development; 14 except that the criteria shall MUST not:

15 SECTION 7. Safety clause. The general assembly finds, 16 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate 17 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for 18 the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state 19 institutions.
